Lthough the Judgements and Humours of some Men, be opposite to every serious Performance; whence they assume an unworthy Liberty of Taxing and Traducing what they do not understand, and envy that in others, themselves are ignorant of: yet in this my Appeal to you, I cannot but expect much fairer Quarter, and a far juster Verdict on my

present Pains, from your more scason'd Breasts; since as the Ignorant, so the Intelligent, always judge like themselves.

There are three forts of Persons that seem most of all to oppugn this Noble ART; viz. The Seeming Religious, the Politique, and the Ignorant.

The First of which, (having a Zeal against it, but not according to knowledge) endeavours to render it repugnant to Divinity, and to the Scriptures; and deemeth it as Mortal to Religion, as your Amazza Franchi* is said to be to the Christians.

Now, although these several Objections have been answered, over and over; yet since we have Dwarfs grown up among us, which stand upon the Shoulders of our former Giant-like Opposers, I shall (for their sakes) respond to them again.

The feem 1. If Astrologie were repugnant to Divinity, or to the Oraans objectles of God, the Scriptures; Divines themselves would not with ttor, answer such ardour have been the onely Promoters thereof, and the most industrious therein, as they in all Ages have been. For it is highly contrary to Reason, to believe any Man (much less him that is learned) would advance that which any way thwarts or oppofes him, his Study, or Interest. Besides, If there be a Trush in Altro-*Dr. Brown logie *, it injureth not Divinity, but rather becomes related to it: for by how much the more there is of fruth in any thing , so much the nearer is it time Divingy; and instead of opposing, is most ready to shake hands therewith. I shall not here make a Distinction between the Religious and the Wife, as the learned Mr. Hart-* In spiftle gil hath done *: howbeit, they that suppose Astrologie repugof the fixed nant to Divinity, are not in the number (I suppose) of the Religiously wife. The Kingly Prophet fings, Pfalm 19. Verse 1. The Heavens declare the glory of God, and the Firmament (heweth his handywork, &c. And must not he then be a most resolute and perverse Adversary, that shall brand Astrologie, which treatesh of the Power of the Heavens and Stars, for being contrary to Divinity?

And therefore by the Stars may the Aftrologer prece dict Man's Inclination and Manners; which if good, may be ce heightned by a holy Ambition; if bad, may be prevented by ce good Education. (2.) The Root, it was not Idolatry, but "Innocency: Adam in Paradise was the Father of this Art; and had ce he as well observed the Star of Knowledge for the Direction of chis Will, as the Tree of Knowledge for the pleafing of his ce Fancie, he had not yet been banished. It was not Idolatry, but "Obedience, upon which this Syen was grafted, when the Tree ce was almost withered: Abraham the Friend of GOD, and Father ec of the Faithful, was no Step-Father to Astrologie, if we believe Anse tiquity. It was not Idolatry, but Wildome, from which this "Art got Life, after it long lay bleeding: Solomon, the wifest of ce Men, was the best Astrologer the worldever entertain'd! And why were the Priests of Egypt forbidden the Study of all other Arts, " and yet permitted to study Astrologie? And why do the Arace bicks call their Astrologers Cachin, which comes of Cohu, which se fignifies a Priest? Surely it is to tell the Astrologer, that though se the Presbyter may be his Enemy, yet the Priest may be his Friend, and " allow his Art lawful; not onely for the Root of it, but also (3.) ce for the End of it; -- which cannot be injurious to God, because the Astrologer consesseth, -- Sapiens Dominabitur Astris. Trus far (and farther) this learned Dostor. Yet a little more: we have another learned Divine among us, who makes it a Doctrinat Observation, -- That it is our Duty to study the Heavens, and to be acquainted with the Stars *. The learned Ptolomy affirms in the *Mr. Caryl beginning of his Almagest, - Hanc unam Scientiam esse viam, ac ou Job, femican ad Sciendum Deum altissimum. This equally considered, p.221. plainly evinceth Astrologie not to be contrary, but consonant to, Divinity, and to the holy Scriptures.

2. That Astrologie should be repugnant to Policy, Laws, Insti-The Politick tution, Education, &c. is as impossible as for it to be opposite to Opposer an-Divinity: it may indeed be helpful unto them all, but no way wered. huriful unto any of them. I do allow with the Objectors, that the Laws are good and necessary, as they are intended to bridle the wild and corrupt Passions of Men; and no more to be faulted, when they miss of their right and proper end, then Wine is, when it makerh a Man drunk. Albeit, I must acquaint him, that the Stars have such a Power over the Manners and Minds of Men, that they order and dispose them into such a trame, that when they shall meet with Laws or Institutions contrary to their Nature and Inclination, they esteem it the highest Happiness to break and contound them. Hence it is, that Jayls and Prisons are containtly turnished with variety of Offenders; notwithstanding many are taken thence continually, either to Banishment of Death, or other less Punishment. And therefore it was

Plutarch that Solon*, in the Athenian State, commanded, that their in the Life Law should be always applyed to their Manners; and not their Man-of Solon.

*SirChrist. ners to the Law. And as a learned Knight * observes, although Heydon in the Laws and Institutions under which we live, be never so good Defence of and commendable, yet the Adversary might as well profess to stronger, say lagainst the VV inde and Tyde, or to make a barren Soyle fertile, as to imagine that Laws or Institutions will be of any force, without a Natural Propension to that wherein we are instructed, or unto which we ought to be subject and obedient.

Now certainly Astrologic, which sheweth the Reason why good and wholesome Laws and Institutions miss of their right End and Aim, cannot be thought Anti-Politick, or Anti-Nomical; but may rather be esteemed of good Use unto the Politician, in framing and torming Laws and Institutions suitable to the Constitutions and Inclinations of the People that are to be governed and instructed by them. Had Astrologie been an Enemy to Policie and the Laws, &c. Augustus the Emperour would never have been so great a Friend unto it, as to have stamped the Signe ve Capricorn (it being the Ascendent of his Nativity) on his Coyn, and advanced the same in his Ensigne or Standard; as faith my *SirChrist. Author *. Nay, so eminently honourable was this Science with Tiberius, as Tacitus and Dion testifie, that he learnt the same of Thrasillus at Rhodes, and afterwards brought him over into Rome, honouring him above all Men, and attempting nothing without his Advice. If then the greatest Politicians have had so great a Respect unto, and Honour for this Science, it cannot reasonably be conceived contrary to Policie, &c.

Then for Education; which in the thoughts of all ingenious Men, cannot be held at an undervaluable Price, it being the very best of Ornaments to Mankinde. Beyond all question, it profiteth very much; but then it must meet with a fit and proper Subject. Every Man is not a Socrates; nor have all Men a Power to master or bridle their Affections and Passions. I grant (in a just sense) A mise Man may rule the Stars: yet are there few so prudent, either by force of Nature or Education, but must submit (in a great measure) to the Energie of Coelestial Influences. And although the Stars do not absolutely necessitate the VVill, yet they so strongly incline it, that the Effects of Nature are commonly seen beyond the force of Education. VVere Education of force sufficient in all respects to better Nature, we should have no fuch things as Injury or Injustice in the World. Where Education meets with an apt and proper Inclination, like a skilful Lapidary, it polisheth Nature, and presents the World with a Comparative Miracle. But, where it meets with a morose or violent temper, it is but a Slave to Passion, and makes the Native more mischievous and

cruel. Thus tome Men come to play the Villams and Treachers with the greater Dexterity and Courage; and, uting Education as a Bawd to their corrupt Defires and Pleafures, colour their unworthy Actions at the more confident rate, and make their greatest Villanies and Cruelties, matter of Sport and Pastime.

None will deny, but NERO was most excellently well Educated; yet what unheard-of Actions is he recorded to have done, when once he came to the Government of the Empire? Although Tacitus in many places of his History, speaketh but meanly of Astrologers; yet in this very Example, that he testifieth on their behalf, That they before-hand did astronauthe Agrippina his Mother of his Cruelty, &c. And this power in Galba, Caligula, Dionysius; and others, that were diligently instructed by most excellent and learned Tutors; and yet atterward returned to their Natural Improbity, and became foul Monsters of Men.

Thus we see of what force Education is, when it concurreth with, or contradicteth a Natural Inclination and Temperature. Nature may be bettered by being joyned to Education, or Discipline; but that without Nature, or contrary to it, is Desicient; and of no more use, then if a Husbandman should Till Barren Ground, of which he can reap no Prosit.

It is not onely the Poet, that is Born, and not Made; but Poera natthe Politician, Divine and Lawyer, &c. of which the following fitur, non Treatife affordeth many and eminent Examples. It will therefore plainly follow, that Astrologie may be of good use to the Politician, in making known the Natures, Temperatures and Inclinations of Men: For, they are not onely distinguished, but *Lord Badiscovered from the Predominancies of the Planets at their Births *.



Something touching the several Opinions of the Worlds Nativity.





O question the Worlds beginning, were to depart from the Heaven-like and pleasant Path of Christianism, and to run into the confused and dangerous Road of Atheism: and for any Man to endeavour to confine the fame to any limited certain time, (confidering the uncertainty of History and Chronologie) is every whit, without doubt, as ridiculous and erronious; yea, perhaps, as great and unwarranted a Presump-

Some Authors (and those most eminently learned) have fixed the time of

the Worlds beginning upon the Summer-Seaton; at which time the Sun entred the Regal Signe Lev, which of Aftrologers is termed his House, of Place wherein he is most principally dignified. And of this Opinion was the famous Mercator, who, in his Chronologie, seemeth to render many Reafons thereof, which some have thought Demonstrations.

This Opinion (as some conjecture) was first conceived among the Priests of Egypt; who having observed the River Nilus to overflow about the Sommer Sostilice, (viz. a little before the time above-mentioned) adored it for a god; and esteemed the time of its Inundation, for an infallible beginning

The Arabians and Egyptians were generally of Opinion, That the World was chated in Autumn, when the illustrious Lamp of Heaven entred the right Authors, Tofephus and Calvifius, feem very much to affent to this their Opinion; urging both Reason and Scripture for the proof thereof. Nor did the learned Juntinus fault this Opinion, but rather approved thereof, as appears by his Spec. Astrol. Tom. 1. fol. 660.

Others are of Opinion that the World was made in the Spring-time; and upon that very day the Sun was placed in the very Degree of his Exaltation? viz. in innercen Degrees of Aries. So Perrus de Aliaco concludéth, fol. 102. and with him agreeth the learned Anthor of the abovefaid Figure, as you may read in the before-cited Junctimus. Some have thought Virgit to be of this Opinion, by reason of that eminent and losty Fancie of his, Lib. 2. of his Georgicks:

Non alios prima nascentis origine Mundi,
Illuxisse dies, aliumve habuisse tenorem
Crediderim. Ver illud erat, Ver magnus agebat
Orbis, & Hibernis pascebant slatibus Euti,
Cum primam lucem pecudes hansere virumá,
Ferrea progenies duris caput extulit arvis;
Immissa á, fera Silvis, & Sydera Cœlo.

Which Words are not more elegantly written by Virgil, then Englished by the Polite Quill of his learned Translator, Mr. John Ogilbye, thus:

Sure I bolieve, when first the World was made,
So shone the day; and such bright Conduct had.
That was the Spring; the Spring makes all things fair!
And blushing Eurus did cold Tempests spare.
Then Cattle bred: in unplow'd Fields began
First to appear, that Iron Race of Man:
Wilde Beasts possess the Woods, and Heav'n the Stars.

Mr. Swan, in his Speculum Mundi, pag. 36. and in his Calamus Mensurant, pag. 10. after much Discourse concerning the Worlds Creation, cometh to this Conclusion: That (notwithstanding the strongest and best Objections to the contrary) the World began at the Spring-time of the year; and that on the sourch day of the first week, the Sun was in the sourch object of Aries: which sourch day, according to the Julian account, (saith he) was on the twenty seventh day of April: on which day the Sun was created, and fer in the Firmament of Heaven.

These (in brief) are the several Opinions concerning the Worlds Creation; in respect of time: but how near, or how far wide they are of the Truth.

Truth, let Reason it self be Judge. Divine Plato, in his Dialogue of the Soul; professer feel that he knew nothing of it; and that the very Contemplation there is, and made him blinde. Sperates calls those men that busine themselves in their Discourses or Disputes, concerning the Worlds Originals Mad, and Inconsiderate. And indeed the Knowledge of this Mystery, being onely competent to God that made the World, deceiveth the Generations of Mankind in their Disquisitions and Scrutinies after it.

If the Saviour of the World, as he was Many or the Angels of Heaven, knew not the End of the World, why should for with what hopes can) we endeavour to acquaint our selves with the Creation or Beginning of it? But, alas! in this, as in other deep Mysteries,

The gods our Mindes do muffle up in Clouds.

I shall spare to speak here of the vast and irreconcileable Differences of the Computations of Years, that I finde both Hiltory and Chronologie to abound with; but to shun the Censure of Scepticism, I will willingly and freely deliver my Opinion concerning the Marter in question, thus: I do believe (with Plato) that the World had a beginning, and that God was (Anjustio), munits, is manip T ons) the Creator, Maker, and Father of this goodly and to be admired Frame; yet am of Opinion, that He made it neither in the Spring, Summer, or Autumn) but in all: for it is impossible that one Seafon should be universal or predominant in all the World at once; especially if we consider the Differences of Shadows, and the Diversities and Constitutions of Clymates: unless we should understand the same per Synechdochen, de parte prototo, ut Testum pro Domo; a part of the World for the whole World, and so confine the Conceit to the Land of Indea onely. But this were to subjugate our Reason and lay our Understandings in Shackles. For (faith Dr. Brown) as the Question is generally, and in respect of the whole Earth proposed, it is with manifest injury unto Reason in any particular determined, Pseud. Epid. fol. 241. And, if I should turn Querist, and desire to know under what Elevation of the Pole the Figure of the Worlds Creation could be erected, that it might relate to all Meridians exactly, I suppose it would trouble the greatest Defenders of such Opinions, to return any satisffactory Answer. Let us therefore credit this truth : That the World had a beginning, but the time thereof unknown to the wifest of Men; and to fet the Figure or Scheam thereof; that it should relate to all Elevations above this earthly Globe, is absolutely impossible.

This learned Author faith most true, ---- Snow doth not more resemble Snowsthen this Nativity the Actions, Manners and Fortunes of this prodigious Prince: and it is not to be doubted,

but Cardan's Character (though brief) did exactly correspond both with

his body and Minde.

His harsh Inclinations, Temperature, Manners and Crueltie, are well depainted, and most lively represented by this Figure of his Birth: for it is (indeed) a Scheam so cross, that it denotes the person born under it of Disposition so strange and prodigiously mischievous, that the very worst of Men

cannot possibly be acquainted with greater.

For to fignifie that monstrous and horrid Act of his, towards his Mother Agrippina, (for that washer Name) here is Mars in Opposition of Jupiter Lord of the tenth House, and Mercury Lord of his Ascendent in exact Quartile to the Moon; (who ever generally hath Signification of Mothers, if the Learned in the Syderal Science may be credited, of which there is no doubt) and this hateful Aspect happeneth from Angles, and from Cardinal Signes; Arguments most eminent to denote a Marricide: Yet I remember to have read one, that terms his murthering his Mother an ingenious Cruelty in him, his end being to determine the Cabinet of his Conception. Vide Pseucograph. Anthrop. prope finem.

The Quartile of the Sun and Saturn from Angles, made him not onely hated by those whom he by Prerogative Ruled, but inclined him also to commit things worthy of Hatred and Disdain. In the Black List of his Actions, it is not to be forgotten, that he did not onely murther his Mother, but first committed Incest with her: then he poyson'd his Brother; killed his Sisterin-Law; destroyed his Wife Poppea (being great with Childe) by a Kick: burnt Rome, and rejoyced at the fight of the Flames. Cum multis aliis. After all which unheard-of Cruelties, and bloody and inhumane Acts, he was by the Senate proclaimed an Enemy to the State: Upon hearing of which, he became his own Butcher; and in the thirtieth year of his Age killed himfelf, as fay Calvifins and Isaacson: But Cardan faith it was in the thirty second year of his Age; unto whom I rather affent, in that the Directions for degrading him, and afterwards for cutting off Life, then happen: Which Directions, were the Moon to the Conjunction of Mars, and Opposition of Jupiter, who was Lord of the tenth House: which were most apparent Testimones in Art, both of the Dishonour he underwent, and prodigious End he Thu much for this Nativity. came to.

Rediting the Authority of Plua tarch; we shall finde that this Heroick and Magnanimous Prince descended from the Loyns of Philip King of Macedon, begotten on the Body of Olympias a young Maid, who lived in the Island of Samothracia, and at some time after was married to Philip: vet the learned Plutarch seemeth to differ in the time of this Nativity from Lyndholt; for he recorder h Alexander's Birth to be on the fixth day of the moneth Heca-

tombaan, (i. e.) Inly; where is you see Lyndholt not onely presumeth, but afferteth it to be at the above-noted time in the Figure. But letting pass the Errours and Uncertainties of Chronologie, we will first examine how this Figure represents this illustrious Natives Person, Inclination and Conditions; and secondly, how it agrees with the time of both those eminent

Accidents, his Coronation and Death.

First, for his Person, &c. He was of a Middle Stature; which is very well fignified by the Positions of the Lord of the Ascendent and the Luminaries in Signes of Brevity. He was (as the Author of his Life avers) Titenecked; (i.e.) he held his Head upon one fide: which Deform i vis plainly feen by Saturn his Position in Taurus in Azimene and Pitted Degrees, he being Lord of the Alcendent. Belides, if (as Hermes laith) Venus adorns that part of Mans Body fignified by the Signe wherein the is polited at Birth, then Saturn (being an Enemy to Nature) must necessarily desorm that part represented by the Signe in which he is found; chiefly if he be Lord of the Ascendent, and in such Degrees as Saturn is here. He was also very Cholerick and Hatty; which is notably proved by the Moons being in Conjunction with Mars, Gr. And his Ambition, Courage, Magnanimity, and great Spirit, is conspicuously evidenced by the Polition of Caput Draco is in Afcendente, in the Horoscope, and Saturn (who is Lord thereof) his eine in Trine to the Moon and Mars; together with the Location of the Sun in the Exaltation of Jupiter, in Sextile to them all. Thus you fee, this Figure, and the several Configurations of the Stars therein, exactly correspond with the Description of this eminent Natives Person, Inclination and Conditions, as related by the Author of his Life.

Secondly. I shall observe how it agrees with the times of his Coronation and Death; and what Di ections those Accidents may be caused by. First, for his Coronation; which feems admirably well to be fignified by the occurse of the Mid heaven to the Trine of Venus, who is in Conjunction (Platickly) with the Benign Planer Jupiter in the seventh House, and he Lord of the Tenth . which happened near the one and twentieth year of his Age; at which time this Princely Native received the Royal Diadem.


Secondly-for his Death: which Accident was well denoted by the Moons Progress to the Quartile of Mercury, Lord of the eighth House, which hap-

pened

pened in the eighth House in Libra, and the Promittor of the Evil posited in Cancer Retrograde; the Moon being Hylech in his Nativity, and Mer-

cury Anareta.

And it is an Evidence sufficient in Art, that he was poysoned, (although Plutarch endeavors to excuse it) because the Direction was celebrated in fo obscure a House or part of Heaven, and the Moon being in Conjunction of Mars, in the House of Mercury, whom you see is Retrograde in the fixth House of the Figure. And the matter seems to me the more clear, and fully confirmed, by Olympias his Mother, her making a Discovery thereof fix years after, and cauling divers Persons to be put to Death for the



Hen I confider the turbulencie and unset ledness of this Kings Reign, I begin to conclude our late miserable Times no Wonder: for this King came to his Fathers Crown at two moneths old; and after he had reigned the space of nine and thirty years, was by the Earl of March degraded, and kept a Prifoner in the Tower of London twelve years, where at the last he was murthered by Ri-

chard Duke of Glocester. Sir Richard Baker faith he was a Pious Prince, and one of so gentle and mild a Disposition, that few men could equal; and he gives one remarkable instance thereof :--- When being in his greatest & Mileries and Afflictions, one rudely struck him, he gently replyed, --- For south, you wrong your (elf more then me, to strike the Lords Anointed!

Upon November the 6. 1429. being aged eight years, he was crowned King at Westminster; the Mid-heaven was then directed ad Trinum Lune: And near ten years of Age, he was crowned King of France at Paris; the

Ascendent then came to the Body of the Moon by Direction.

Being aged twenty four years, he was married to that illustrious Lady, Margaret, Daughter to the Duke of Anjou; a Princels of most Masculine Resolution and Courage, as is eminently seen by Mars his being in Scorpio in the seventh House, in Sextile of Venus in the Tenth: he had then the Ascendent directed to the Sextile of Inpiter, who is Radically in Trine and Reception of the Sun.


When this great Prince was aged thirty nine years, he was captivated by the Earl of March, and by the consent of the People degraded of his Kingship, and afterwards sent Prisoner to the Tower of London: the Mid-heaven

was then directed to the Quartile of the Moon, and inddenly after to the Quartile of Mars; and the Ascendent nigh about the same time, to the Oppolion of Mercury.

On the 21 of May, 1642. being then aged fifty one years, and after his being twelve years imprisoned, he was murthered by the Hand of Richard then Duke of Glocester: the Alcendent was then directed ad Quartilum

Sir Richard Baker saith, Although he was a Pious Prince, no Enterprise of War, where-ever he was present, did prosper with him, as if it had been a Destiny attended him. Had this learned Knight but been acquainted with Astrologie, and considered that the Moon had been in Opposition of Mars in his Nativity, and this from Angles; and Mars (which fignified his Enemies) the most potent Planet in the Figure, he might have concluded it a Destiny indeed, and very hard to be withstood. The Reasons of his Captivity are, Venus, Lady of the Horoscope, in Quartile of Saturn: Jupiter, Lord of the Twelfth, in Quartile to the Ascendent: and, thirdly, Luna in Opposition of Mars, from fixed Signes and Angles. Which later being confidered together with the Moon her being inter Pleiadum, which are violent fixed Stars, denoted his violent Death.

Thus much for this Great (yet most Unfortunate) Prince his Na-

His Nativity is the very fame that the learned Cardan hath in Latine printed to the World long fince, among his twelve Genitures; and may very probably be the true one: for this illustrious Narive was a perion of a very high and lofty Fancy, and of a Spirit interiour to none: which is admir bly well fignified by the Luminaries being post-

ted in Angles, and in Cardinal Signes, and the Lord of the Ascendent being

located in a Regal, Fiery and Imperious Signe.

One, pretending to Air ologie in England, about fourteen years fince, prefents us with the same Figure out of Cardanus; and telleth his Readers, That this Princely Native was cruel, and that his Cruelty was fignified by Mars his being so near the Ascendent: but it is obvious to all that have eyes, this confident Pretender was mittaken . for Mars is above, five Degrees di-Stant from the Ascendent, and in no Aspect of the Moon and Mercury : Ergo, he can have nothing to do in the Signification of this Princely Natives Inclination or Manners. If he were inclined to Cruelty, it should (in my Opinion) be occasioned rather by the Lord of the Ascendent his being pofited in Eeo, in Opposition to Saiurn, a cruel Planet. But Mercury leing in Sextile of Venus, and the in Time to his Ascendent, should make him more Debonaic, Courteons and Gentle, then Cruel, and of a Temper most worthy to be beloved.

Although this busie Astrologist, mistaking a Non-cause for a true Cause, be pleased to account him Cruel, yet he cloaths him with such Epithets, that do nor belong to a cruel Person : viz. We must (says he) acknowledge him to be the first that permitted the Gospel'to be preached: - And we have cause to account him a brave man that durst in those times oppose a roud insulting Clergie &c. ___ And the English never had any Prince of that largeness of heart, nor any that did so great matters. Sir Walter Rawleigh indeed gives but a bad Character of this illustrious P ince; and it is probable, upon his Credit (which in some things Lesteem worthy, chiefly in such where Prejudice beareth not the sway) the before-mentioned pretended Artist hath endeavoured to stretch his Art, to make that say the same with this Noble Knight. Had his Nativity shewn him so vile, as Envy hath endeavoured to render him. I should have relyed upon Sir Walters Authority; but finding his Geniture to dissent, I shall rather endeavour to preserve the worthy esteem that learned Knight Sir Richard Baker hath of him.


His Manners, Temperature and Inclinations, are to be judged from Mercury's Significations; and he (being in Trine of Luna, and Sextile of Venus, and in Sexule of the Ascendent also) according to Origanus, Facit in-

genii acumene, Excellentes, Studiosos,-- Doctrinarum Capaces, Dociles, Sagaces, antiqua & Secreta in lucem revocantes, Vafros, solertes, cautos, bene connectantes; & cum dexteritate omnia facientes, &c. And that Prince that partakes of such illustrious Qualities cannot (without Envy) be termed Cruel.

The same Gentleman tells us further, That the Moons being in Qof Q, is one Argument of his having many Wives, or Wenches, &c. but he is as far dittant from Truth in this, as a Dis diltant from a *; for the D is in *, not D of Q. The Quadrate of & Lord of the seventh with Sand the Quadrate of the Luminaries, together with 12's I to the Ascendent, might very well portend the unhappy Jars that happened between this Princely Native and his Queens; confidering therewith, the D her being in V, the House of S, and in the West Angle, and Q in & of & S.

The Cautes of this Heaven-favouring Prince, his changing his Religion, and endeavouring a refining thereof, following the Steps of Luther and Calvin, may (Altrologically) be referred to the Quadrate Aspect of 12 and S, and the Polition of Cauda Draconis in the Ninth.

He Reigned 39 years over Great Britain; and lived until he was 56 years old, and upward, viz. until Fanuary the 28. 1547. at which time the Ascendent was directed to the Square of h; upon the Effects of which Direction, this great King expired.



Have taken this Nativity from the Learned Ephemeridist - Master John Stadius, in fol-15. of his Introduction to his Ephemerides.

This Kingly Native received the Crown of Great Britain at ten years of Age, viz. on January 28. 1547. (at which time K. Hen. 8. expired) he having then the Ascendent directed to the Body of Q Lady of the House of Honour,

Dignity and Supreme Power. He Reigned sole Monarch of Great Britain fix years and five moneths: after which time he died, being in the fixteenth year of his Age, and labouring under the malicious Influence of three most cruel Directions: First, the Ascendent to the Body of h, (who is Lord of the fixth House in this Geniture) as may more plainly appear:

The same Author that trifled with King Henry the 8th his Geniture, hath been (to little purpose) busying himself with this likewise; and tells us,-That the Pleiades Culminating, and four Planets being in their Detriments or Falls, (although in Truth there are but three of them which so suffer, viz. the Sun, Moon and Q) together with h's being in the Ascendent of this Nativity, might well give cause to suspect this King should neither live long, or have any quietness in his Reign. His Reign, I willingly grant, was somewhat difquieted and troubled; and indeed, he did not live very long: but he mult needs be an incompetent Artift that shall refer this to the fore-mentioned Arguments in his Nativity. For King Henry the second and third of France, and divers other Princes and meaner Persons, have had as many Planets debilitated in their Nativities, and nevertheless have, out-lived this Princely Natives years. And that glorious Prince, of ever famous memory, King James of England, had the Pleiades Culminating, and & and hin of Q Lady of the tenth House, upon the Cusp thereof, (far worse then the Pleiades Culminating), and yet he was lyable to no such Infortunacies.

The eminent and true Attrological Reasons of this illustrious Natives short Life, and troublesome Reign, are these: The Quadrate of the Luminaries from Tropical and Æquinoctial Signes; and & Lord of the Ascendent being in exact Square of &, from violent fixed Signes, & being in a malitious place of the Heavens. Nor is h's presence in the Horoscope always a Teftimony of short Life; chiefly, if he be fortified, as in this Nativity he is,

viz. by the presence of 2, Oof 4, and *of 2 his Dispositor.

Had this Pious Prince but missed the cruel Directions before-mentioned, in which the three principal Hylech's are concerned, and the Quartiles of the Luminaries, and of Sand g, nor been so Partil, he might have lived as long as most Kings that ever Reigned in England, and have Reigned quietly too, Notwithstanding h's presence in the Ascendent, or the Culminating of the Pleiades. Ill Pontions are bad, but ill Directions are the surest Tokens of a short and troubled Life.

I cannot here omit the falle Play that Gaffendus useth toward Astrologers at large, and Cardanus in particular, about this Princes Geniture: For (faith he) Cardan predicted that King Edward should be very sickly in the 23, 24, and 25th year of his Age; and yet (faith he) the Records of England assure su that he died in the 16th year of his Life : And immediately after subjoyns this scoffing Quere; O! if Cardan had had the luck to have foretold that this King should fall into some dangerous Distemper in that year wherein he died, what joyswhat triumphswhat quacking would there have been among Astrologers?

But is it not a very great Argument that Gaffendus either never read Cardan, or else by halves, and with Prejudice? for had he read him impartially, as an Author ought to be read, he would never have abused him, by relating what out of him ferveth as an Occasion (though weak) whereon for him to fasten his Cerberian Fang. Cardan, it is true, supposing the Horoscope of

this Princes Birth to be the latter Degrees of A, laith, - Ajoendens an naturnum per venit in annis 23. Mensibus 9. diebus 22. Et tunc animi & corporis langorem patietur: which are but the Natural Effects of such a Direction. But Cardan, supposing a possibility for himself to erre in the Ascendent of this Radix, chuseth rather to relie upon the Directions of the Luminaries, as appeareth by these words out of him:

Deduxi (saith he) postmodum oppositum & ad D hoc modo, ut pracipit Pto-Card, in lomaus, & fuit distantia par 15. min. 7. qua si jungatur parti Septuagesima Genit.
Edw. 6. R. fecunda, pertinget oppositum & ad D, in annis 15. mensibus fg. 4. quo tempore Ang. p 19: imminebant insidie à servis propriis & Periculum Vita. Eodem tempore pervenit o ad o d', hoc modo in annis 14. completis paulo plus. Hoc igitur tempore expresse imminebat periculum amissionis etiam regni rebellionis causa. &c. Where you tee that Cardan dis predict danger of Death, and of Rebellion also; and although both were true, Astrologers have neither boasted nor bragged thereof, nor needed they indeed; the Art being demonstrated by Io many eminent Examples: but we see Gassendus hath cracked and quacked (worse then the weakest of Empericks) and altogether of a Falshood, onely to colou-his Harred against Astrologers at the more splendid rare. And let me tell all Gassendusses, that had Cardans Suppositive Ascendent of this Princes Geniture been true, the Judgement he gave thereon had not been fubiect to forash Censure: howneit, Astrologie is sufficiently verified, and Gassendus proved an insulting Lyar, by Cardan his predicting Danger to the Life of this Prince in the year he died.

By this piece of Forgery, you may estimate the Truth of his Quirks and Ouibbles against Nostredame and Morinus, and all others, whom ne labours Tooth and Nayl to render Infamous, Contradictious, always mistaken, &c. I shall leave the whole to be centured by the Learned; and request the Disciples of this lying Impostor, (for such he was, to say no worse of him) to remember the Orators words, Qui semel verecundia fines transierit, eum bene & onaviter impudentem effe oportet: He that is once gone beyond the bounds of Truth and Modelty, it behoves him then to grow impudent to purpose and to lye beyond all line or measure. Mendax semel, mendax semper prasumitur.



Here are divers eminent Reafons in Allrologie, that this is the true Nativity of this great Queen.

First, to fignifie the loftiness of her Resolution, great Spirit, Strictness and Rigorousness in Government, we finde h Lord of the Ascendent in Sagittarius, a fiery, imperial and commanding Signe, and in nature quite contracy to him; and the Moon in & to 4.

nearly from Angles: perhaps a more then ordinary Reason of the grand Troubles and Vexations that then were rife in England concerning Religion. Secondly

Secondly, the Parvity or Smalness of this illustrious Ladies Horour, Estimation, Fame and Repute, by reason of the Persecution of Persons for matter of Conscience in her Reign is eminently discovered from the exact Square of of to the Sun and v in the Ascendent, in the Dignities of 1; and this from Bi-corporeal Signes, & being near Aldebaran, a fixed Star of the first Magnitude, of most malignant influence. Howbeit, I shall not be so bold, as others have been impudent, and lay the blame of all (or indeed any) of the Blood shed in her Reign, at her Door, as if she were the original Cause thereof: for it is obvious in Attrologie, that the Clergie were the eminent Occasioners of that tedious continued unhappiness; which began long before ever she came to the Crown. Doth not 12 oppose D, and that from a fiery Signe? And is not & in Dof @ and &, who are in & in H? May not a wilful and a stubborn people precipitate themselves to Destruction, but their Governour or Governess must needs be Tyrannical and Cruel? It were most monstrous to conclude otherwise.

When the Ascendent came to the * of Osthis illustrious Princess came to the Crown of Great Britain; viz. in the year 1553. being then aged near

37 years : a Direction very pertinent for such an Accident.

Suddenly after, viz. in 1554. this eminent Lady was married to Prince Philip of Spain: (and as a Remembrance very common of that inter-marriage, we have a Coyn that passeth among us with the Essigles of Philip and Mary:) this Accident was caused by the Suns Direction to the \(\Delta \) of \(\mathcal{Q} \).

This eminent Native died five years and a half after she began to Reign. being then aged above two and forty. deg. min.



ftrologers that have published this excellent Princesses Nativity formerly, were inotoriously mistaken: for they make ve (a, cold. dulls earthly, feminine Signe) to afcend on the East-Angle at Birth; when every one, that hath left any thing in print behinde them concerning this magnanimous Lady, report her to have been a most

most Marculme spirited Princets; endued with a high, lofty, and undaunted Resolution: One that feared not the Face or Fury of any Man. Which Princely Quilities are most excellently well portended by the Regal Signe Sagittary, Horoscopating at the time of her Intrat into the World; and Jupiter, Lord thereof, his Polition therein, (though Virtually and Locally in duodecima domo) the Degrees afcending being the Dignities of the Planet

One in England some years since, pretending to present unto the World this illustrion Queens true Nativity, tells his Readers, that she died when the Ascendent came to the Pleiades by Direction: and after a confident manner, (asif it had been impossible for him to have erred) he subjoyns these words; - I know no Reason (fith he) why she should have been angry with any Astrologer that should have faid, - Madam, about the sixty ninth year of your Age, the Ascendent comes to the Pleiades, which denotes not onely sickness to your Person , but disturbance in your Government. But I know no Reason but that she might well have been angry at any one threatning her with so false a Fear: for the must have lived many more years then fixty nine, before ever that Direction could have happened. But befides, if it could have touched in her Life-time, and at the same time that mistaken Person would have had it, there is no Aftrologer that I know of, (except himself) that ever averred such a Direction to portend Death: for the Pleiades, though appearing to us but as feven Stars, are four great Constellations, containing 126 Stars in number, that are (by the Affistance of good Optical Glasses) to be plainly seen; and to which of these the Ascendent should be directed to have such a fatal Effect, (for sure he intends not all at once) requires his better Explication. But I pass by this, as a point too nice for an Ignorant in


To prove this Nativity the true one, I shall verifie it by these three grand Accidents which happened to this eminent Princess in her Life-time: Viz.

- 1. In the 21 year of her Age, she was imprisoned, and laboured under many Crosses and Afflictions: she had then operating the Sun ad Quadratum Saturni, and this in the ninth House; exactly denoting the Cause for which she suffered, viz. Religion.
- 2. In the 25th year of her Age, this illustrious Native was crowned Queen of Great Britain, &c. and at this time the Ascendent was directed ad Trinum Solis; the onely Patron of Honour and Soveraignty.
- 3. Being 69 years old. She died: at which time she had the Ascendent directed ad Quartilum Saturni , in Ariete ; a Signe that Saturn most mischievously hates.

In the Revolutional Figure for that year, there was a Conjunction of the two Infortunes in the opposite place of the Moon in her Nativity, and the Figure it self nearly in Quartile to that at Birth; the Lord of the Ascendent was in the Eighth; and the Sun was falling into the fixth House: And the very day of her death, viz. 24 of March, 1602. the Sun and Mars were in the place of the Direction, and the Moon was in Quadrate Aspect of them

Have Calculated and Reduced the Suns place in this Nativity, by the Tables in my Doltrine of Nativities; and the Planets places I have taken from the learned Staaim his Ephemerides for that time given, having had regard to Reduction.

Without the true place of the Sun, it is impossible to fet the Figure right; and the Consideration hereof neglected, occasioned one among us (fome fourteen

years fince) to erre no less then a Degree and a half in the Mid-heaven and fourth Houses, and a Degree in the Ascendent and seventh Houses, and (by consequence) the same in all the rest of the Figure: and yet the time given is the same by which I have corrected this Nativity, and the Poles Elevation the same also.

Here are several eminent Arguments of Acquisition of Honour and Dignity: as, (1.) The Sun being in exact ** to the Ascendent from the tenth House: (2.) The Moon in Partile ** of **1, who is in d of Pars Fortune in the second House: (3.) 2, who is domina decime, Lady of Soveraignty in this Geniture, is Culminating with divers eminent fixed Stars, and this in her own Dignities, thence cashing a \$\Delta\$ to the second House: (4.) The Luminaries are in a strong Reception each with other, and the Lord of the Ascendent is in the tenth House, in d of O, cashing a ** to the Ascendent.

But notwithstanding these eminent Arguments of Soveraignty, which were truly verified in this prudent and Princely Native, his being vested with the Crown of Great Britain, &c. he had many Dissipulties attended his Reign, as our Chronicles expresly mention. I shall not trouble my self to enumerate them here, but shall acquaint the World, they were well portended by 2 her Position so near 3, and in perfect 1 of 1, and 3, and 2 and 2 their being in 1 of 2 (Lord of the Seventh) from Cardinal Signes.

This Kingly Geniture was chiefly verified by these grand Accidents sol-

First, his Coronation, he being aged near 37 years; which was occasioned by the Ascendents occurse to the Body of 1, and * of 1, just coming upon it.



Some ignorant Artists have Parasitically printed it, that this eminent and famous Prince died by Poyson: which suggestion, as it is most untrue, and scandalous to the memory of an eminent Peer late of this Realm, (whose Nativity was too sympathetical with this Kingly Natives, for the perpetration of so prodigious a Mischief and Murther) it is also purely anti-Altrological, and not to be read in the Heavens at the time of this great Kings Birth; which were it true, must needs have been found there.

Lis Lord of the Eighth in this Nativity, and in in exact * of D, and he friendly disposes of and a in his Exaltation: and although he be in to them, it being from fortenate places of the Heavens, it is rather a Forticude then a Debility, and therefore can no way denote a violent Death. L. Lord of Death, (saith Origanus, fol. 730.) denotes the Native to expire ab angina, Peripneumonia, Apoplexia, Convulsionibus capities, & Stomachi doloribus, a quot quot a pulmonum perversa constitutione of perveniunt. But by Poyson it is abfolutely impossible.

This incomparable & matchless Prince, as he did in Verrue excel most of the Kings of England that went before him; so he did exceeed them in Infortunacie and Trouble. Divers Kings have been privately murthered or ilrangled; but never any publickly murthered. and this under the pretence of Justice, from the Death of our bleffed Saviour, until this Princely Cedar's Fall. The feveral Verifications of this remarkable

Geniture, and the particular Calculations thereof at large, I have in a parti-

cular Treatile handled, and long fince published to the World: I shall therefore forbear to do what I have all eady done, and refer the defitous Readers to that Piece, which contains a brief History of our late Confusions: and entityled, The Nativity of the late King CHARLES Aftrologically per-

Yet confidering this Book may be common when that may be scarce, I shall (for the satisfaction of those that have not seen that Book) demonstrate this to be the true Nativity of this Martyr'd and Murther'd Prince, thus: ___In the 25th year of his Age, he was crowned King of Great Britain, and fuddenly after was married unto the Daughter of King Henry the fourth of France: The Medium Coli was then directed ad Trinum Luna, in the Angle of Dignity.

This Princely Native in the 20th year of his Age, had the Mid-heaven di-

rected ad Oppositum Solis; and then he dissolved his Parliament.

In the 38th year of his Age, the Scots pretend Religions and rebel against him, though their lawful Soveraign: Then was the Moon under the Directi-

on of the Body of Saturn, both with and without Latitude.

In the year 1641, being the forty first year of his Age, he summoned anonother Parliament, and they contend with their King for the Militia, &c. and then (by reason of Sectaries, and their divers pretended religious Outcries and Complaints made against the Bishops) his Mileries and Sorrows began to encrease to purpose: The Ascendent was then directed to the Quadrate of Venus Lady of the tenth House, and the Mid-heaven at the same time to the Quartile of Jupiter.

When he was 46 years old he hazarded his glorious Person in the Scotish Army, and expected fafety among them; but they, to their eternal Dishonour, sell him to the English Army, who kept him close Prisoner: The Ascendent was then directed ad Contrantiscium Luna, and an ill Revolution; besides, the malignant Planet Saturn was then transiting his Medium Cali.

Being aged 48 years, he was basely butchered under the pretence of Juslice and Law, by his own Subjects; his Head being cut off by a Vizarded Villain, upon a Scaffold before his own Palace-Gate: The Ascendent was then directed to the Dof &. All which things you will finde more fully and particularly handled in the Discourse before noted.

After this unparallel'd and prodigious Tragedy was acted, the Regicides allowed some Loyal Persons the Liberty to Interr his Corpse: Which was

done at Windsor, in a Coffin of Lead, with this Inscription upon it;

CHARLES, King of England.

A worthy Person standing by at the same timesthrew this Dyslich into the Vault with him, relating to his innocent suffering:

> Non Carolus Magnus, nec Carolus Quintus; Sed Carolus Aguns, hic jacet intus.

In English thus:

Not Charles the Fifth, nor Charles the Great, lies here; Rut Charles the Lamb! A Prince without a Peer.

Enry, Duke of Glocester, L third Son to Charles the first, King of England, was born at the time within written, at White hall, London.

If I may take the Liberty to speak freely, and according to the Rules of Art. it is one of the most unfortunate Nativities, for a Person of Princely Extraction, that ever I beheld; and yet I have feen fome hundreds of il-Instrious Genitures.

For herein we finde the three superiout Planets Retrograde, and Jupiter Lord of the Ascendent under the Earth in Capricorn, which Astrologers term his Fall; then the Luminaries are in Conjunction (befieging poor Mercary Jupon the Cusp of the eighth House, the most unfortunate part of the whole Heavens: and all of them in direct Quartile to the tenth House,

and in Opposition to the Second.

The fortunate Planets are in Opposition from Angles and Cardinal Signes, and the Infortunes in perfect Conjunction in the second House. I spare to urge the Aphorisms Authors afford us for the true understanding of such Pofitions, their Significations being eafily understood by the meanest Artist: all that I shall urge, is this: When this Princely Native was in a probable Capacity of attaining Dignities suitable to the Honour of his Birth, Death fnatch'd him out of the World; and in the 20th year of his Age, cropt this lovely Flower before he was fully blown, to the unexpressible Grief of Eng-

I was, I confess, once of Opinion that the Sun or Moon could not be Hylech, if posited upon the Cusp of the eighth House; and thence was in good hopes, this hopeful Prince might have lived past the Sun to the Opposition of the Infortunes: but experience hath taught me otherwise, as by this following Demonstration appears: deg. min.



And at the same time the Sun was nearly directed to the Opposition of 3, fine Latitudine. This famous Prince being ill of the Small Pox , the Phytians let him Blood, as I have been told, three times; which, together with his Distemper, brought him to such a pass for weakness, that in very few days afters (notwithstanding the best Cordials they could devise) he died. I should judge this sad Effect of Blood-letting, might occasion our learned Physicians to consider, Whether Phlebotomy be at all proper to a person in such a Distemper; and if so, Whether in this Clymate. The Physitians were Learned and Loyal, but this Princes Fate most Cruel.


I have heard it credibly reported (by persons which very well knew) that this young Lady was generally very fickly; and the Report is no way improbable: for here is one Infortune in her Ascendent, and the other in exact Quartile to it; and both the Luminaries are in Quadrate to it also, and this from the fourth House. But it was also reported of her, that notwithstanding her Assistion of Body, yet in the Intervals of Health, she would discover a most Princely Disposition of Minde: for in most things she was very Ingenious, Witty and Apprehensive. She was very curious in her Disquifitions after Novelties, and expressed very much Desight therein; as indeed most persons do, that have \$\frac{1}{2}\$ in any good Aspect of \$\delta\$; chiefly, from the Ascendent and third House. She loved Poetry and Oratory, and delighted much in Quaint Language: and this is no Wonder at all; for the hath Vin * of & in the Ascendent, and in Reception of his Dispositor; and Q in Dand Reception of &. All which are Arguments of a sharp and active Fancie.

As you see a great many Arguments of a short Life in her Radix, so (to shew the Stars are not void of Influence) she accordingly died Young, being not full fifteen years of Age when she expired; the Ascendent being then directed to the Body of & in





But this I shall acquaint the ingenious Reader, That it was no hard matter, or Prediction imposfible, for the learned Gauricus to foretel the Death of this Princely Native by a Wound in his Head; and this to happen in

his Age: if it be confidered, that the Sun was in γ , (a Signe representing the Head) and squared both by Mars and Saturn, (who are Competitors in the discovery of the kind of Death this illustrious Native should die as being both of them essentially dignified in the Eighth) and opposed by Jupitersa Planet posited in the Sixth, and all from Cardinal Signes: and that in the year of his Death, the Ascendent was directed to the Quadrate Aspect of Mars, Dis-

Now the learned Gauricau having taken pains in the Geniture of this great Prince, (and that five years before he died) did, like a good Arrift, (and Christian too) forewarn him by several Advisoes, to sorbear running at the Tilt; (the grand Exercise then in use) in the forty first year of his Age; for that the Stars did then threaten a Wound in his Head; which would cause either Blindness or Death: which Prediction was most remar-, kably fulfilled in the same year, and by the same Action before noted; for as he was running at the Tilt with the Earl of Mountgomery, a Shiver of his Lance pierced into his Head, through the Vizard of his Helmet; of which Wound he, according to Gauricus's Prediction, died.

But now, if any shall Question how Gauricus could hit so right of the Exercise this illustrious Prince should loose his Life by; or whether Particulars of so rare Signification and Portent can be read in the Heavens or Stars: I answer: Gauricus did not predict the kind of Exercise by which Death should come, tut the time of Death onely, by the Stars. The kind of Death, his Reason led him to consider of; Tilting being the onely Exercise then in use, as was before remembred. So that to mix Reason with Art, is not unworthy the best of Artists; and indeed without so doing, a Man can be no good Astrologer.




N the Figure of this Princely Natives lying down, the Atcendent is the oppofite place of Mars in his Nativity; and the Seventh (qua Morti adscribitur, sicut Ascendens vita, Argol faith) is the place of Mars and Hercules. Saturn. Lord of the Ascendent, is in Quartile of Mercury, Lord of the Ascendent of the Radix, and near the Radical place of the Moon. The Moon is in Quartile of Venus from the Sixth,

and Venus, Lady of the Fifth signifying Pleasures, is Peregrine in the Eighth. Sol, Lord of the Eighth, in the Eighth, (i. e.) within five Degrees thereof. Argol says, D platice Opposite & & ambo in via lastea, quod oculis noceant. I allow they are in the Milky-way both of them; but the Moon is not in Platique Opposition to Mars: howbeit, there are other dangerous Testimonies without it.

Gassendus is so much mistaken, as to tell his Readers, that it was (not this Henry, but) Henry the third of France that died of such a Wound, as is before noted: but that is as true as the rest of his vain and fruitless Cavils against either Astrologie at large, or the learned Gaurieus in particular. What pity is it, that a witty Man should be wilfully vain, and caussely captious!

This is the Figure that Argol (in his Book de diebus Criticis) presents us with for the Nativity of this illufirious Prince. He pretends principally to correct it by the time of his Death: and to prove it agreeable to the time thereof, he tells us, the Directions which occasioned that Mortal Accident, were (1.) The Afcendent ad Q in

m: (2.) Lad Sextilum &: (3.) the Dad & Martis. Risum teneatis

That either of these Directions are of Energie sufficient to kill, we may as soon believe, as that the Sun is in our Antaci, or Antipodes, when it is high Moon with us! Did ever any Astrologer before, aver that such Directions which are naturally fortunate, could kill? If they have, I must acknowledge it beyond, not onely my Reading, but Reason. However the mistake came, Argol himself is of a quite different Opinion, in his Ptol. Parv. Lib.3. lately published.

Had Argol in stead of a 7 deg. 6 min. given 5 16 deg. 30 min. in the Ascendent, h would then have been placed in the eighth house of the Heavens, and the Ascendent (in the thirty eighth year of this Princely Natives Age currant) had come (as without doubt it did) to the 8 of h by Direction; and this in a, the Detriment of h, and the most malignant and contrary place to him in the Zodiack. Which Rectification, I refer to all ingenious Artists to consider.

To prove this Correction of mine yet further, I shall add another Accident by which it is confirmed, viz. his Coronation; and that was admirably well signified by the Ascendents occurse to the * of the Sun by Direction.

His eminent and illustrious Princess, was Queen to King Henry 4. of Prance; surnamed the Great; and Mother to the most illustrious Henrietta Maria, Queen of Great Britain, the Widowed Queen of King Charles the first of ever glorious memory.

She was born at the time within written; and in her Life-time subject to many notorious Scandals, Ca-

lumnies and Reproaches, &c. and was egregiously injured and dishonoured by the unbridled Tongues and Passions of the Vulgar, as well as of their Leaders, viz. the dissenting Clergie.

That the latter should be as Goads and Thorns in the sides of her Honour, Repute and Good Name, is plainly to be seen by that eminent Satellitum of the Planets in and near the ninth House; and the D being in the House of H, in B of S in the Ninth also. And that the Rabble-Rout, the Multitude, should cherish and believe what Reports and Scandals the others should broach and set on foot, is conspicuously evident from the D her being in B of S, Q and g from double-bodied Signes; and from her being so near her South Node, called of the Greeks Katalise Low, or Cauda Dracons, in m in the third House; as also from the cruel Planet H, his casting a malitious I to the Ascendent from I, on the Cusp of the Fourth.

This great Queen was most unfortunate in her Relation, although she was the Daughter of a King, Wise of a King, and Mother of Kings! which is eminently signified by the of h to the Ascendent from the Fourth, and the deliberation in description with in the Third, and in description in description.


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Neither the Happinesses or Missortunes that attended this honoured Ladies Life, shall I trouble either my self or Readers with: a Constration or Confirmation thereof, cannot reasonably be expected from me. Whether she were better then, or so bad as, the Trumpet of Fame hath proclaimed her, I leave to the Artists of after-Ages to consider; who, by beholding her Geniture, will be drawn rather to pity then condemn her. I shall onely say thus much: That notwithstanding the many prodigious Calumnies, Reproaches and Vilisications her whole Life was interwoven with, (by which, as Vertue and true Worth are rated, she may be deemed undeserving and guiltless of all Opprobies cast upon her Name and Honour) yet she went to the Grave in a full Age, wanting not much above three Solar Revolutions of the best of Persons; whereas the Wicked live not out half their days.



M. is most eminently worth the considering; for then the later part of w ascends, and h upon it, it being the Radical place of &; he also is \(\sigma\) to d, Lord of the Ascendent at Birth: the \(\theta\) then upon the very Cusp of the eighth House, in \(\delta\) to \(\hat{b}\)'s Radical place; and \(\varphi\) Lord of the Eighth, in both Figures is in \(\delta\) to the Radical places of \(\delta\) and the \(\otime\); and the \(\otime\) in \(\delta\) to \(\varphi\)'s Radical place also. Which dangerous Positions and Transits, concomitating so dire a Direction, might very well portend Death.



The less wonder at Causinus (the Jefuite) his quarrelling at Astrologie, from the Example of this War-like Persons Nativity fince I finde Aftrologers themselves as little agreed upon the true time of his Birth, as that of his Death. Argol de diebus Criticis. Part 2. pag.39. tells us, he was born near the time, as in the Figure is noted: bur

the last day of November the same year. Argol, in this, comes nearest the Truth, and may therefore be the more credited. But although Argol be credited in the Birth-time of this Potent King, yet in his Death he was much mistaken no less then a whole moneth; for he reports it to have been upon October 16. 1632. when the Gazets or News-books of the particular year in which he was slain, (as my self have seen in Italian, in the Hands of * Francis my worthy Friend Mr. F. B. *) report it to have been on November 16.

This, and other such Missfortunes in the Genethliacal part of Astrologie, shew it in as much want of its History, as any other part of Philosophy, (as a learned Person of this Nation, in the year 1653. complained ingeniously of) it being the onely Via Regia, the Kingly Way, to its Persection.

To prove this the true Nativity of this great King, Observe,

1. He came to the Crown of Sweden, &c. being aged 24 years; and then the Ascendent was directed to the \times of μ , and Δ of μ .

2. He made War upon Prussia, and went himself in Person, being aged 32 years: Medium Cali came then by Direction to the \(\D \) of the D.

3. He wars against the Emperour; takes Franck fort; and by his means poor Germany for many years together was made (Sedes Belli) the Seat of War; and this even to its Ruine: The ① was then directed to the Body

4. Being aged 38 years, and having laboured for a year, (and more) immediately before his Expiration, under many Misfortunes; as well was portended by the Mid-heavens occurse to the Quartiles of h and 4, and to the Body of S. But the Direction that ushered in his Death, was the Otothe S of h in the eighth House, and to the D of S, Lord of the Fourth.

The Arguments of a violent Death, are, (1.) Stars of a violent nature Horoscopating and possessing the opposite Angle: (2.) Land of the Ascendent in & of b, and of & in violent fixed Signes: (3.) The O with Stars of a Malesique nature. Argol makes another Argument of—Luna prope Caput Medusa servata Latitudine: but he is mistaken; for although Caput Medusa have 22 deg. of North Latitude from the Ecliptique, yet the D is above 25 deg. distant from him, her Circle of Position considered. Howbeit, he may the better be excused, because the other Testimonies are sufficient.

I cannot cry out with Argol, Digna admiratione of that fatalis hora! because I know it not; neither in truth did he: but the day of his Expiration is worthy of Admiration enough! for then was the \odot upon the very degree of δ , in δ to $\mathcal L$ Lord of the Ascendent, and in \square to his Radical place. A day most ominous! as indeed to this potent and mighty King it proved.

the time within ten, as it is commonly received among Affrologers. was this illustrious Emperour born: and it is very likely to be the true time of his Nativity,because it so notably agrees with the Nature, Manner and Quality of his Reign, &c. For. first, he was inactive and remiss: and by reason thereof, his Reign was but obscure:

was but obscure: was but obscure: taken notice of, and by all European Princes acknowledged to be Emperour, &c.) The Reason of his Inactivity, and of not making such a bustle in the World as some of his Predecessor, is very significantly seen from the Sun, Moon and Mercury, their Opposition to Saturn Lord of the tenth House, (viz. the House of Honour, Eminencie and Dignity) and he Retrograde upon the very Cusp of the same; as also from Mercury, Lord of the Ascendent, his being Combust; and the Moons Opposition to Mars, who is in Conjunction of Canda Draconis in the tenth House: nor is the Quartile of Jupiter and Mars meanly to be considered herein.

Secondly, although his Reign was (Comparatively) obscure; yet it was Moderately, Quiet and Peaceable; which is singularly well denoted from the Sextile of the Sun and Japiter, and the Position of Pars Fortuna in the Ascendent; and the Moon, Saturn and Mars, cassing friendly Aspects them be Illustrious or Mean) that have unfortunate Genitutes, to content themselves with Moderation, [the Golden Mean!] is no less Vertue and Honour, then for such that have the most Noble and Propitious ones, to aim at, and atchieve the very highest of Things.

As this eminent Native lived peaceably, so he died a quiet and natural Death: which some may wonder at, by considering the before-mentioned Configurations. But, if we consider Saturn (who is wholly Lord of the Eighth) his being posted in Capricorn, we shall finde that he signifies, not a violent, but a natural Death, according to Ptolomy, Lib. 4. Cap. 10. Quadrip. Mortis prafectus, obitus efficit post dinturnos morbos, Pthysin, Rheumatismos, & fabres cumrigore: Item per affectiones lienis; hydropicus, Colicus, Uterine affectiones, & quotquotex frigoris multitudine constant: and of a long-lingering tedious Disease, he did die. The Direction occasioning it, was the Ascendent to the Body of the Sun.



It is eminently worth the noting, that at the same time this Princely Native expired, viz. on April 2. 1657. S. N. 4h. Mare, Mars was upon the opposite place of the Sun, Moon, and of the Direction also; and the Radical place of Mars then ascended on the Eastern Finitor : the Moon was then in Opposition of the Ascendent of the Radix, and unto Venus Lady of the fixth House in that Figure.

Upon the Day of the Revolution that year, Mars was transiting the Radical place of the Moon, and the Moon lately separating from an Opposition of Saturn, Lord of the Eighth, in the Radix. Thus much for this

Nativity.



Hisemin**ent** King was Son King Henry the 4. and Father of the present King of France, and Brother to the illustrious, and of late eminent fuffering, Queen of England. He was born at the time within writcen, and died in the Moneth of April, 1643. being somewhat above 41 years old.

It hath been controverted

much. Whether this eminent Native died a natural or a violent Death. Some will have it that he died a violent Death, viz. by Poylon: Others, that he died a natural Death, viz. of a Fever, &c. But his Nativity doth feem (tome, and I have no reason to be partial herein) to side with the Reports and Opinions of those that affirm he died a violent Death, (and that

For (1.) Saturn is Lord of the Eighth, and he posited in Scorpio, a Signe violent, malitious and poylonous. (2.) He is there in exact Quartile of Mars, a violent fiery Planet, and his Dispositor. (3.) The Moon (Lady of the Horoscope) is going to the Body of one, and Quadrate Aspect of the other. (4.) A violent Star upon the fixth House, and the Lord thereof Combust: and the Sun and he, both, are in Quartile to the Ascendent from Cardinal Signes. (5.) The Moon is in via Combusta. These are eminent

Arguments of a violent Death.

The kind of Death is apparently enough to be discovered; for Saturn being Lord thereof, and polited in a violent venomous Signe, denotes (as I urged before) Death by Poyson. See Cardan, Seg. 2. Aph. 108. Origamu consents to the same Opinion, fol. 726. de Effettib. Albubater says, If Saturn be the alone Significator of a violent Death, he denotes Death by Poylon. And he faith further, The Lord of the Eighth Peregrine, and afflitted of Saturn or Mars, he being in Cancer, Scorpio or Pisces, the Native shall die by the Sting or Venome of a Serpent, or else by Posson. These Aphorisms I have translated from Albubater , and printed them in my Doctrine of Nativities, Part 1. fol.148.

This Kingly Native laboured under many Misfortunes, both of Body and Minde, five years together before he departed this Life; as was most notably and aprly fignified by the Ascendents occurse to the Body of Mars, a-



At the time of this great Kings Expiration , the fiery Planet & was upon the Ascendent of his Radix; a Transit very dangerous, in regard it is his Detriment, and he then in 1 to 12, whose 1 was the Promittor of Death! b was in y, in & to the @ and 4, and & in of them both. All which (together with his bad Revolution) were Arguments eminently prodigious, and remarkably pertinent to the time and manner of this Princely Natives Death; chiefly, as being concomitated by so dire Directions.



Have already published this prodigious Prince his Nativity at large, under the Title of Merlinus Verax : at what time Astrologie (by reason of him) was in danger of an utter and unavoidable Disparagement. For this Prince being engaged with most Princes in Europe, (so lofty and great an undertaking Spirit had he) the more politickly (as he thought) to bring his Delignes about

he bribes a Quack in Astrologie with a Gold Chain, to predict him Victory

and Success over his Enemies from the Stars: which unfortunate Bribe, (for so it proved both to the Attrologer and to himself at last) procured such kind of Predictions from his Astrologers Pen, that Astrologie and Reason were never in the least acquainted with. For the Sibyls and Mother Shipton, &c. are conjured out of their Graves to affilt the Swedish King for the Gold Chains sake; and he is promised to be greater then Charles the Great, and that he is ordained to Kick and Caff the Hogens of Holland, and to make William of Brandenburgh repent in Sackcloth and Ashes: that he shall beat the Dane out of his Kingdom, and write himself Rex Daniæ! & c. (Rare Gipseelike Astrologie!) The ftrongest Purge that ever Physician gave, never expelled so much Filth, as did this his Gold Chain.

Seeing Astrologie so basely abused, and this Princely Native so beflattered by his Altrological Parasite; for the Redemption of the Arts Honour, I printed this Kings Nativity; as well to acquaint this Prince how he was abused, as to oppose the Forgeries and Impossibilities of the Abuser of him: wherein I acquainted the World with his Death; which happened as exactly as any thing in reason could be expected. Veritas Odium parit: 1 got no Gold

Chain for my Labour.

In Tune 1654. this eminent Native was Crowned King of Sweden; Queen Christina, the Daughter of Gustavus Adolphus, then surrendring her Government unto him: he had then operating the Medium Cali ad & Jovis, by Direction.

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

Being aged somewhat above 37 years, on February 13. 1659. he died: he had then operating Medium Coeli ad Corpus Saturni 3-a Direction very dangerous.

And at the same time the Ascendent, Mid-heaven, and Part of Fortune, were directed to the Terms of Mars, near violent fixed Stars. But above all, there happened a little besore his Death, a great Solar Eclipse in the Radical place of his Sun, and opposite place of his Moon; as the certain Prodromu of his Exit. And happy it was for him . that his Life so exactly ended with his Honour, Dignity and Greatness: for you must know the Midheaven to the Body of Saturn, in his Debilities especially, is a never-failing Argument of the Shipwracking of the Natives Estimation and Power. The Figure it self pronounces him a Person prodigious, and all Europe knows it to be true.

Aving published this Agreat Kings Nativity in a Book by it felf entituled, Nuncius Astrologicus; at what time the Difference between him and the Swedish King was at the highest; it will be unnecessary for me to treat largely hereof again: however, knowing that future Ages may be desirous to be acquainted with to glorious a Nativi**37**

logie it self hath been so eminently confirmed, I have thought fit to mention it here, and some Notes upon it, lest the Tyranny of Time should obliviate that lesser Book wherein I sirst printed it. For when the true Astrologer shall read the Story of this mighty Prince, and compare it with this his Geniture, he must of necessity receive it with a Welcome of Admiration! there being, among the best collected, and most choice Nativities of Princes, not a more illustrious Figure of Heaven to be found.

When the King of Sweden twice invaded this Princely Native, and for a long time together blocked him up in his chiefest City, Copenhagen, having once by Treachery took him Prisoner; then had this King both the Sun and the Mid-heaven under the cruel Directions to the Body of &, as I shall thus

times; and all men in Reason yeilded him an absolute lost Prince; yet notnotwithstanding Vox Populisthe Clamors and Noises of all torts, I resolved to consider his Nativity; and finding it so Princely and glorious a one, as you may see; and observing also, that his Hopes and Allistance (I write now Altrologically) was stronger then his Dangers and Fears; (i.e.) & Lady of the eleventh House, was better fortified then h. Lord of the Seventh: I adventured to publish the same : and therein affected, That he should overcome his Enemies; and, That notwithstanding this great Kings (then) present Misfortunes , he should recover all his former Greatness and Glory; yea , and more then ever he loft. And behold! in the year 1660. his Kingdome was made Hereditary, which before was but Elective; and he overcame his violent Adversaries, according to my Prediction exactly. And in page 38. of Nunc. Astrol. I laid down this Axiome, with which I shall conclude: That as this renowned Person obtained his Dignity and Greatness honourably, and hath with much Magnanimity , Courage and Resolution kept and maintained it, even in the greatest of Dangers; so he is likely to keep and preserve it to the end of his Life, and to die Quietly, Peaceably and Honourably, possessed thereof. Thus much for this Nativity.

Have not altered this Geniabove ture twelve minutes in time from the tempus Estimatum given; and presume it to be the onely true one of this magnanimous and great King, because it so exactly accords with many eminent and remarkable Accidents, which have happened to him already.

1. Being aged 25 years, viz. in the year 1630. he was

most miraculously preserved from Burning: near which time, & passed by his Ascendent; and a little before, there happened a & of O and h in the opposite Degree of &. Besides these dangerous Transits, there was then operating the Mid-heaven to the & of O, and the Ascendent to the Body of h with Latitude, by Direction; and the Sun and h both posited in siery Signes.

2. In the year 1633. he was in great danger of Stabbing; and then he had the Ascendent directed to the Body of h without Latitude: h then passed over his Radical Ascendent, & having led the way a little before.



In the year 1659, this King made Peace with France, and suddenly after married his Daughter to the King of France: the Ascendent was then directed to the *of ?, Lord of the Seventh in this Nativity, and the I was then directed ad Sexilum Solis. I need not verifie this Regal Geniture surther, for these several Testimonies are sufficient.



Upon the Influence of the first of these, the Match was propounded; and upon the Operation of the seconds it was confirmed; and the King went in person to fetch his Queen from the Frontiers of Spain, where his Maje-

fly of Spain was personally present.

This present year 1660, toward the later end thereof, this Princely Native was fickly; I conceive it occasioned chiefly from the effects of that great Solar Eclipse, November the 4. 1659. near the Ascendent of his Nativity. 

I would not have any to mitunderstand me in this Prediction; and shall therefore premise, That I do not maintain, or pleadfor, a Stoical Necessity; or positively conclude that this Prince will then die; because Life and Death are in the Hanos of God, and he can shorten or lengthen the same as himself pleases: I aver onely this, that according to Natural Causes, he will be in very great danger of Death about the time of his Age mentioned : and I have known in several Childrens Genitures, the same or like Arguments attended with the Effects I fear will befal this Princely Child. CInce the Writing of this, (and Licensing the whole Book also) we have had News in England, that this young Prince, on Nov.1. Stilo Novo, did depart this Life; wanting (it (eems) some few days of accomplishing full five years of Age. Which inconsiderable Errour, (for it is no other) cannot, I suppose, beget any ill thought of Astrologie in the Breasts of the ingeniously Learned; but rather convince the Antagonists thereto, of its Certainty and excellent Use.







But the King of Sweden at last (being intoxicated

cated with Victory and Success) striving to get more Honour, and greater Advantages against this (then) unfortunate King; and improvidently endeavouring to grasp too much; behold ! he looseth all; and in the year 1877. was too Hyrouted out, and develled of all he had gotten from the King of Poland: and then the exiled King Casimir enjoyed his own Territories and Power again.




this hath been under the handling of the molt able Affrologers the World was ever acquainted with, if we may believe that renowned Person Henricus Ran-Hovim in his Treatise of the Certainty of Astrological Predictions, fol. 97. where he mentions the Prediction of Picus's Death by several Astrologers by Name, in these Words: Joannis Picus Mirandule comes, edidit librum adversus Astrologos : hi (inter quos fuerunt Bellantins Senensis, Antonins Sirigatus Florentinus, & Angelus de Catastivis Carmelita) ut Artem veram Ostenderent, illum annum atatis 33. non transgressurum pradixerunt, ex Directione Ascendentis ad Martem, quemadmodum ex scriptis hinc inde editis constat. (i.e.) John Picus Earl or Mirandula, wrote a Book against A-strologers; and they samong whom were Bellantius of Siena, Amonius Sirigatus a Florentine, and Angel of Catastive a Carmelite) to prove their Art to be true, predicted that the faid Piens should not live past the 33 year of his Age, from the Direction of the Ascendent to Mars: as is evident from what they have written in Relation thereunto. That learned Knight Sir Christopher Heyden, mentions the same thing, thus: Picus being forecold by three Aitrologers, that he should not live above 33 years, (as Lue cas Gauricus, and others, do witness) yet flattering himself with a false Com-· fort, as if he could wrangle away Death by writing against Astrologie, while che sought to prove the Art vain, his own Death concurring exactly with the time forefold by the Astrologers, confirmed it to be true; and more e actually confuted that which he had written against it, then if all the world c besides had conspired to answer him. Def. Astrol. p. 193.

But Monsieur Gassendus is so consident as to deny this truth, viz. That the Astrologers predicted Picus Death exactly, as to the time: and yet saith, . If Bellanius came to near the matter therein, he might easily conjecture e Picus to be no long-lived Man, from his weakly Constitution, continual Labours of Minde, &c. When it is more then probable, that Bellantius knew nothing more of Picus, then by his idle Writings, (be not angry I fo term them; for whoever writes against a thing he doth not understand, writes idlely; but Picus did so, Ergo, &c.) and the Scheme of his Nativity: Ergo, there could be no such Confederacy as Gassendus most dis-ingenuously infinuates. And he would not be well pleased, should an Astrologer cast the fame reproach upon the Cures pretended to be performed by Men of his Profession. But behold the great Justice of the Heavens! Gassendus that quarrelled at Astrologers for to certain and splendid a Demonstration of their Art, had, by an Attrologer, viz. Jonannis Baptista Morinus, his own Death predicted from his Nativity, long before it came to pass, to make him amends for his ignorant and credulous Confidence.

I allow Picus a discreet, prudent and learned Man: But Bernardus non vidit omnia. For notwithstanding his great Parts, both natural and acquired, of which before I have rendred Reasons; yet his rashness was such, that he would (Agrippa-like) oppose even the best of things: as is obvious by the Moon being in Opposition to Mars, and both in Quartile to Mercury, and Saturn. Which Arguments are sufficient to Retrograde (if not confound) the Sagacity of the wisest of Men.

tifying the Horoscope: All which were Arguments of an illustrious Geni-

But that which is strange herein, is that he being a King should be expussed ture. his Kingdom, and subject to Exile for the space of ten years; and afterwards to be detained in Prison not less then twenty six years more. But this is no strange Marvel at all neither, if his Nativity be duely scanned and considered: for here we finde the O, Lord of the Ascendent, posited in the twelfth House, the Angle of Imprisonment, &c. there in d of &, Lord of the Tenth. Nay, although 14 be a Fortune, yet he being Lord of the Eighth, and posited in the Ascendent, is no singular good Position. The D in D of &, Lord of the Eleventh and Third Houses, denoted the Instability and Negligence of his Friends and Relations. 12, Lord of the Seventh, being fronger then the O, Lord of the Ascendent, and in I to him from Cardinal Signes, is an Argument of his being at the Mercy of his Enemies. At what time he was expulsed his Kingdom, the D was directed ad Quartilum Martis, Lord of the Tenth, he being then aged somewhat above 42 years.

In the year 1559. faith Rantzovius, Christiernus 2. trium Borealium Regnorum quondam Rex , nempe Dania, Suecias ac Noruvegia, & Caroli 5. affinis in captivitatesin qua per annos 27. detinebatur, propter tyrannidem, quam exercuit erga Nobiles subditos. The Day this illustrious Native died, viz. on February 11. 1586. the D

was in Conjunction of Saturn, in Saturns Radical place, in the fixth House of this Revolution, and the Sun was in Conjunction of Mars and Mercury, and Quartile of Jupicer in the fourth House thereof; Jupicer being Lord of the Eighth in the Radix, and in it in this Figure.



Hat Emperour Prince that shall have the Sun and Satarn in Quartile from Angles, and Mars and the Moon in the same Aspect from fixed Signes: and shall have nothing good in his Nativity, save a Trine of the Sun and Mars by Reception; might well fay with this great Prince That if any man knew the weight of a Diadem, he would never stoop to take it up.

The learned Ranzovim, fol. 243. saith, he died in the year 1519. on January the 12. he being then aged fixty years: he had then the Moon (if we confider she hath near five Degrees of North Latitude) directed to the Body of Saturn, and this in the fourth House. And had Origanus but removed his Ascendent but a small matter, and in stead of 26 Degrees of Virgo, made it 28. the Ascendent (which must in this Nativity be Hylech) would have come at the fame time to the Quadrate of Mars, Lord of the eighth House. But Origanus minded not (it appears) fo much the true Correction of the Scheme, as the Signification of Saturn in Capricorn in the Fourth; who being in Trine of Jupiter, and no way afflicted of Mars, fignified those rich Mines and Quarries he is reported to have been Master of; and by means of which, he encreased his Power. Origanus then treating of the fourth House onely, his Observation was the more considerable, and he the less to be blamed for not correcting the Figure.

The Moon is Lady of the Horoscope, and in Leo, posited in exact Quartile of Tupiter Lord of the Sixth. and in the same Aspect of Saturn, Lord of the eighth House. Mars from the Fourth, casts a malicious Quartile to the Ascendent : and he being in Conjuncti-

on of Canda Draconis, makes his Afpect the more mischievous.

These are Arguments of a short Life in any Nativity. Argol is pleased to make the Cadencie of Sol, and Saturns Trine to the Ascendent, two other Arguments of a short Life: but I understand not how Trine-Aspects can be any way unfortunate, though of the evil Planets, unless we will make the Oppositions of the Benevolents fortunate. Nor yet, that the Sun cart fuffer Debility by his Cadencie in the third House, it being the second Angle of the third Triplicity, and honours each Native with the Friendships of Men and Kindred, &c. as may be feen by the Cabal of the Twelve Houses, Printed by my learned Friend, Captain George Wharton, in his Calendarium Ecclesiasticum 1659. But there are Arguments sufficient without these, of a short Life to this illustrious Nacive; and Art need not be forced.

The Directions that occasioned his Deaths were the Ascendent ad Quadratum Martin , and the Moon (absque Latitudine , as faith Argol) to the Quadrate of Jupiter, Lord of the fixth House; and herein, the true Sign nificator of Difeases: but the Moon was then (cam Latindine) under the Square of Sannin by Direction, and he Lord of the eighth House the Square of Sample of the control of the control



Lord of the Sixth with violent Stars in Opposition of Satura upon the Sixth, always makes the Native Obnoxions to violent Sicknesses: He should have been a Person of most admirable Accomplishments, as is seen by both the Fortunes, and the Sun cassing friendly Rays to the Ascendent, and the Moons Trine to Saturn, and Sextile of Mars from the Mid-heaven.

forth further: I shall therefore make some short Observations on the Figure Astrologically, and then refer it to the Judgement of those that are

Cirdinal Signes possess the Angles, and the Moon, Lady of the Tenth, (though in her Fall) is in exact Sextile of Venus, who is Lady of the Ascendent, and in her Exaltation, and in Platique Sextile of the Sun: all Arguments of very great Fame, &c. And they are not meanly strengthned by the Conjunction of Mars and Jupiter, and their Trine to the Ascendent; and the Dragons Tayl are posited in the Mid-heaven, he could not want Scandals and Disgraces to be cast upon his Honour, and his highest Actions and Attempts; nor did he.



N the Scheme of this great Durchesses Nativity, Venus is Lady of the Ascendent and eighth Honses, and hath Exaltation in the

fixth House; but she is in Opposition of Mars, and in Trine of Saturn, and in Reception of him also. Luna is with Pallittium, or the Bulls Eye, a violent Martial Star, in Quartile of Mercury, who is Peregrine; and under the Earth joyned to Canda Draconis. Saturn in the Ascendent is but a fickly Position. This Lady could not but be naturally fickly; yet she lived to a great Age, viz. near 65 years: viz. until December 17. 1634, at which time the Sun was directed ad Quadratum Veneris, Lady of the Eighth, and the Direction it self falling in the Eighth, near to the Pleiades.



His Prince is of Conrage and Confidence equal to the Significations of on A. in ** of the O; and should be of a more

then common Prudence, by reason of the \triangle of β and β : and according to this Nativity, (he having five Planets essentially dignified) his Soul should not be more Generous and Liberal, then his Fortune Large and Confiderable.

I have been told by those that have often seen him, that he is naturally troubled with fore Eyes: the Moon (you see) is among the Pleiades, and in [] of 3 from Angles, aptly denoting the same. It is a Rule among Aftrologers, The Pleiades with the Moon in the Ascendent, denotes great Defests in the Eyes of the Native. In this Nativity the Moon is with them, in Opposition to the Ascendent; which is, in effect, all one: for without doubt, the fixed Stars emit benign and dangerous Rays, as do the Etratical.

Anno 1656. in June, this valiant General obtained a great Victory over the French at Valencienne, and gained extraordinary Honour thereby: he had then the Sun directed ad Trinum Jovis.

And at the same time, 12 was upon the place of his Moon, 2 upon his Suns place, and 3 in Trine to his Ascendent. Being not certain that the Ascendent is precisely true, I wanting Accidents to verifie it by, I shall say no more of this eminent Persons Geniture.

His great Duke was an eminent Favorite of that Martyr'd Prince King Charls the First of England; and there

wanted not an admirable Sympathy between their Genitures for the same: for this eminent Persons Nativity is not onely near the same (in respectu Zodiaci) with that Glorious Kings, but 14 herein; is upon the place of the © therein; and 14 therein; is upon the place of the © herein: the D's place is the same in both Genitures, &c. A Harmony and Concordancie so excellent and considerable, that a greater is not to be found (nay, scarcely one so great) between any two Nativities whatsoever.

No Wonder therefore, that there was so great a Concurrencie of Judgements and Affections, yea, and Familiarity between them. This eminent Person wanted not private Enemies that used Means and Endeavours to alienate, or abate of, the Kings Grace and Favours towards him: but in vain they attempted it; for where the Heavens make a Union, it will be too hard for the Subtilty of the greatest Politician to dissolve it.

In the year 1627. on the 27 of July, this great Duke (being then aged near thirty five years) embarqued for the Isle of Rhee; the Success of which Undertaking, proved nothing so well as by the Noble Undertaker was expected: for on the very Day he set sayle, I was in exact Quartile to his Ascendent at Birth, and to the Sun there also: the Moon was then in Square to the places of I, 2, and of the Sun, and in Opposition to U's place. All which unfortunate Transits, argued the Voyage as unsuccessful as at last it proved.

In the year 1628. upon August the 23. this eminent Native (being then aged thirty fix years, within five days) was basely stabbed to Death at Portsmouth in England, by one John Felthom: the D that Day was in \square of the Ascendent at Birth, and the \odot was upon the Radical place of δ . And the very day of his Revolution that year, the D was in exact \square of δ and γ .

But besides this Troop of Transits, which in themselves are mischievous enough, there was a dangerous Direction then operating in this great Duke's Nativity, viz. the Ascendent ad Corpus Martis.



HeEminencie, Honor and Fame of this illustrious Native, are sufficiently known; or were they not, his Nativity doth for

per-sufficiently set them sorth: for here are no less then five Planets most Royally dignified, and the Luminaries are above the Earth, in admirable Reception of each other; the Light of the time being in the House or Angle of Dignity; and the Lord of the Ascendent is in his Essential Glory in the Mid-heaven also ! All which were Arguments of this eminent Natives great Atchievements, and of the heighth of Honour and Fame he enjoyed in his Life-time. But now, although his Life for the most part was honourable, yet his End was Cloudy and Tragical; for he died by the Hands of his Enemies in the 42 year of his Age; having at, or near that time, the Afcendent directed to the \square of the cruel Planer h, in the beginning of n, he being Radically posited in the fourth House. Upon the very day he was routed by Cromwel in Lancashire, viz. August 17. 1648. & was upon the Quadrate place of his Moon, and h Stationary, to Retrogradation, upon the place of Q, Lord of his Ascendent, the Moon being upon the opposite place thereof; the Sun too was in the very opposite place of 4. All which malitious Transits, were eminent Arguments of this eminent Natives being worsted by that (ill) undertaken Engagement; and this the rather, he having then the Medium Cali directed ad Oppositum Saturni.

In the year 1643. on January the third, he was fent Prisoner from Oxford to Pendennis-Castle in Cornwal; where he continued until 1646. To was then in \square of his Sun, and $\mathcal S$ in $\mathcal S$ of the Lord of his Ascendent. A very bad Revolution he had also for that year.

Toward the latter end of the year 1642. King Charles the first, entertained him very honourably, and advanced him to Employment considerable: he had then operating the Mid-heaven to the \triangle of ψ .

To conclude: Upon the very day of his being beheaded, viz on March the 9. 1648. the Moon was in Conjunction of 12, whose Quartile was Promittor in the Direction at his Death; and the Sun was then upon the very Degree of the eighth House of his Nativity, nearly in Opposition of 12; and the fiery Planet 3 had but newly passed Retrograde over the Horoscope of his Birth.



'N the Diary of that Reverend Prelate William Laud, late Archbishop of Canterbury, page 14. I finde the time of this Princes Birth; his words are these :--- Wednesday, May 12. this morning about three of the Clock, the Queen was delivered (before her time) of a Son , he was Christened, and died in (hort space; his Name CHARLES. The next day , being Ascention-day, paulo

ante mediam noctem, I buried him at Westminster.

That this Bitth should naturally be but of short Life, is apparent, in that it was upon a New Moon: for it is the Opinion of the Learned in this Sci-

ence, (and Experience vouches it) that those which are born in the Full Moon, die suddenly by the excess and super-abundance of Humidity; but those born in the New Moon, for want of Moissure.

But this must be when the Luminaries are either applying, or separating to, or from each other: for according to Ptolomy, Cent. Aphor. 13. Cum ambo Luminaria in eodem minuso fuerint, &c. When both Lights shall be in one and the same minute in a Nativity, the Native shall live, and be healthful. &c. Besides, in this Nativity, the New Moon was celebrated near violent fixed Stars, and the Lord of the Eighth (though a Fortune) in exact of the Horoscope, and the Lord of the Sixth in the Ascendent.

On December the 8. 1640. this hopeful Lady died at Rickmond, being then aged near four years. It is very probable she might die upon the Moons Direction ad Quadratum Saturni, h being potent to do mischiest. On the day of her Revolution that year, there was a Platique of 12 and 3, and both of them in 12 to the 0; the Dalso was near the 10 of h and 2; all denoting a sickly and dangerous Revolution. Wanting the true time, I cannot be Positive, but Suppositive onely in this Geniture.

His is the Nativity of that renowned Person.
(the Miracle of his Age) the Duke of Albemarle; as I had it communicated to me by a very

good Friend: and I having an Opportunity to transmit it to Posterity, with the Genitures of divers other Worthies, have adventured the Publication thereof; as well for the Honour of the English Nation, (who in this one Example of true Valour, Honour and good Policie, may vie with the whole World) as for the fignal Merits and Deserts of the Noble Duke himself; whose Princely and unparallel'd Adventures, cannot be too seriously or often acknowledged by any English Man.

To prove this the true Radix of this Princely Native, let it be remembred, that in the twentieth year of his Age, (as I am informed) he had the Small Pox: he had then the Ascendent directed ad Quartilum Saturni; and this in γ , the greatest Dignities of δ .

Being aged 21 years, he was preferred to some Martial Employment in the Low-Countries, and increased in Honour, &c. the Moon was then directed ad Oculum Tauri.

Being aged 31 years, he was created Captain of Horse: he had then to signific the same, in his Nativity, the Ascendent directed to the \triangle of Q; and this in \bigotimes , her chief Dignity.

Being aged 32 years, he was honoured with the Command of a Colonel; and to fignific that, he had the Medium Cali directed ad * &; and this in vp his Exaltation; an eminent Argument of that Honours encreasing.

Being aged 35 years, he was (unhappily) taken Prisoner: the Sun was then directed ad Corpus Saturni, and the Moon (nearly) ad Quadrasum Martis: the first Direction fell in the twelfth House; and h, the Promittor therein, was Lord of the Twelsth.


But above all, let it be remembred, that in the 52 year of his Age currant, viz. May 1660. he brought in his Glorious Majesty King Charles the second, who had been twelve years kept out of his Kingdoms; and brought the Consusons of the three Nations, England, Scotland and Ireland, into a calm Condition of Peace and Tranquillity: He had then the Moon directed ad * 4. Origanus, fol. 751. saith, Dad * 4, natum dignitatibus & honoribus sublimibus auget, &c. and 4 being Lordof the Tenth in his Nativity, made that Action the more eminent and honourable: besides, to en-

crease the same, the \oplus was at that time also directed ad 1 rinum ovus. Now, to signific the Opposition and Struggling he met with in that honourable Undertaking, he had the Ascendent directed ad Contrantiscium Mercurii; perhaps one Reason why the City of London (in some respects) seem'd not satisfied with his Noble Actions and Undertakines.


That this eminent Native was born for illustrious Undertakings, is plain; he having the \odot in the Tenth in a Noble fiery Signe, and thence in \triangle ad Lunamin a Signe of the same Triplicity. And to add to this, he hath \mathcal{U} (Dominus Ascendentis) in \triangle of \mathcal{V} and \mathcal{V} in domo undecima. Sinhe Ascendent in his Triplicity, gave him Courage and Valour; being in \mathcal{V} of \mathcal{V} , that added Reason to his Resolution, and made him not onely Souldier, but Politician. He hath the Moon placed in the very Degree of the Suns Exaltation, and perhaps the Ascendent of England in general; which might apt and fit him for great and to-be-admired Deeds in his own Native Kingdom. I shall say no more hereof, but conclude in the words of the Epigrammatist:

Had Plutarch liv'd till now, to blazon forth His Life, (as sure he would) what Prince of worth, Or Greek or Roman, had his single Story Selected out, to parallel his Glory?




In the year 1655, being the 56 year of his Age compleat, he was (after much thruggling, and with great difficulty) elected Pope the Medium Cali was then directed ad Sextilum Luna, that brought the Honour; but then having the Sun-directed ad 1 1, that occasioned the high opposition he met

In the year 1662. and 62 year of his Age compleat, the Moon (which is Hylech in his Nativity) will be directed to the Quartile of the Sun : it happening in his grand Climacterical year, may denote it the more dangerous and cruel: howbeir, the Revolution being not very bad, I am of opinion he may (by the assistance of that) withstand the Danger threatned. But then the year 1664. will ('Go D' nor contradicting Natures Edicts) prove fatal unto him: for then the Sun will be directed to the Opposition of Saturn; and a dangerous Revolution also, as you may discover by the Scheme thereof.



HEre we finde Mars, Lord of the Eighth of the Radix, exactly oppofing the Sun in this Figure; the Signe of the Fourth ascending, and Saturn upon the Cuip of the Horoscope; the Moon in the Eighth, going to a Quadrate Aspect of Saturn, and in Oppo-fition of the Lord of the fixth House: it is a very dangerous Revolution, though 74piter and Venus be in the Ascendent; and an Artist cannot rea-

fonably be termed Presumptuous for fearing the worst, when he hath such eminent cause, as is herein afforded.


His Nativity I have taken from Cardan; but he having (among his twelve Genitures)

treated largely thereof, I shall be brief in my Observations on it. The Geniture is not onely considerable in that it was so great a Person's; but in that the Person born under it, should from a private Life rise to the greatest Dignities and Government of the Church or Priesthood. My Author says, he was well learned in the Greek Tongue, and a Person most Prudent and Discreet, and well versed in the Mathematicks. All which are admirably well discovered by the exact Trine of Mercury and Jupiter from Angles and Aëreal Signes: Nor doth the Quartile of Mars and Mercury other then adde unto his Parts; nay, it makes them the more eminent and excellent, although at some times it might note a perturbed Fancie and

It is always observed, that Aëreal and Fiery Signes possessing the Angles of a Nativity, adds to the Fame of the Native according to his Condition, be it what it will. Mercury in the first House, in Trine of Jupiter Lord of the Tenth, and Saturn (Lord of the Ascendent) in Sextile to both, are Arguments of great Honour, Dignity and Renown: the Sun in Conjunction of Venus, in Sextile of Mars and the Moon, the same: all which are to be found in this Nativity. But the kinde of Dignity is known from Jupiter chiefly, and partly Mercury, in that they are here in Trine; and Astrologers tell us, when they have Signification of Dignity, &c. the Native riseth thereunto by Learning, and by Ecclesiastical means.

I am apr to believe, that although the Planets places may be nearly true in this Nativiry, the Figure it self is not: for were it, at the time of this Natives Expiration, he had the Ascendent directed ad Q &, & & 11; which is an apparent Solocism in Astrologie. I do not deny but that a Person at 81 years of Age, may die without a killing Direction, it being an Enneatical year; but then there must be none to support Life, as those before menti-



Ope Paul the Fifth, was born at the time within written, under the Latitude of Rome: he

succeeded in the Popedome Clement the Eighth, whose Geniture we presented you with before. Argol thinks the Comer that appeared in the Knee of the Serpent, anno 1604. Was the Prodromns of his great Honour. I have elsewhere proved that Comets (if they have any Signification at all) cannot portend Good , but Mischiefs to Men : See Nicour Aseinops, page 44. and cannot therefore be of his Opinion. I acknowledge with Argol, that the Lord of the Tenth with a Kingly fixed Star, may be an Argument of Grandeur and Greatness: soalso is the strength of the Lord of the Ascendent, and his Trine to Mercury; and Jupiter's being in Sextile of Mercury and Luna, in the same Aspect with Mars, together with a Royal fixed Star culminating. All these (I say) are Arguments of acquiring great Dignity and Renown; and these are sufficient, without being beholding to the unknown Effects of Comets or new Stars.

Anno 1621. 

(i.) \$, 2, D and the D, polited in the Ascendent of a Nativity make most learned and admirable Qrators. And this, he faith, (and it is true Y is in part to be observed in the Genesis of this excellent Person :---

Gu us Judicium gravissimum, & oracio copiosissima, ex scriptis edieis eruditisfimus, omnibus nota eft. He hath & in Conjunction of Q in the Horoscope, in an Aëreal Signe, viz. , and the fortunate Planet 1 beholding them both from the ninth House, and an Aëreal Signe, with the most friendly of Aspects: from all which, his most excellent Parts are singularly well disco-

The learned Cardan (who hath this Nativity as well as Origanus) fays, the Reason of his undertaking so many Journies, and travelling out of his own Country, is seen from the Luminaries possessing the Dignities of &; and although they are not, yet & is, Cadent from an Angle. In my Opinion there is another Argument for Travel as eminent; and that is, the Lord of the Ninth (not onely in the Ascendent, but) in Conjunction of the Lady thereof, in a moveable Signe. Cardan faith also, that while the M. C. was under the Direction of the Sextile of Q, he enjoyed times of happires: this was about the 34 year of his Age, though he says the 32. I spare to speak of what he relates while the Sun was in Opposition to 11, because it is not improbable but that he may be abused by his Printer. The 56 year might very well prove (as it did) a most dangerous year unto him; for he laboured under the Sun and the Moon to the Oppolition of 14, and Quartile of d. 

T is no new thing among Artitls to 🔔 take Nativities upon truft, without fitting them to the utmost : and thus I am perswaded hath Origanus done in the Geniture of this learned Native.

Rantzovius tells us, that this Person died in the 62 year of his Age of a Terrian Fever; but by this Figure there is not one Direction of either of the Hylegiacal Points to any cross Aspect at that

Now, if we (in flead of 197 27.) make = 26 to ascend the Horoscope at the time of his Birth, the Ascendent at the time of his Death will be directed ad Corpus Martis; which is proper, not onely to fignifie the Tertian, (of which he died) but to cut off Life, (non obstance 11 being so near the place of the Direction, and strong also) it happening in so dangerous a Climacterical year. Origanus main Reason for giving me to ascend, is, because this Native was but short of Stature, and of Temperature Dry, &c. and saith, fol. 577. That a Signe of Brevity ascending, and the Lord thereof disposed of by h, might very well denote the same : but allowing the Stature and Temperature of this learned Native to be as Origanus faith, I should judge that the latter part of ascending, and & Lady thereof in & h in V, the House of d, and the Luminaries in such Signes as they are, may much better signific them then those Arguments before mentioned. Q in d of h, in Dof d and 11, and the Moons being in m, and o in the Dignities of h, very plainly denote the excelling Parts of this worthy Person, his great Acquirements in Divinity, his Learning, and Love of Arts. Let it be remembred, that this learned Person (although a Divine) as he was a Friend to all Literature and all commendable Arts: so to Astrologie in particular; as appears by his turning the two last Books of Ptolomy out of Greek into Latine; and in divers Epistles, especially in that to Gryneus, wherein he hath not onely commended, but most strenuously defended the same.

Have seen other Nativi-L ties that are reported to be Martin Luther's, viz. one done by Paulus Eberus, his Contemporary and Friend; and another by a third person : and all the Reason they give why this should not be the true one, is, that they believe him to have been born, not on Octob. 22. but on Nov. 11. which is a Festival held in honour of

St. Martin; and thence (fay they) he had his Name given him: which if true. I conceive their Plea to be the better. But why Guarious should not meer with those Nativities, as this, I understand not; and if he did, without controversie he saw good Reason to reject them, for this. I know Gassendus foits his Venome at Aftrologers to purpose for the same Reason; yet I know not but Gaffendus may very well be deceived; for neither he, nor others give any good Authority, or any at all, (but their Prefumption) for his being born on St. Martin's day. And if probable Reasons in Astrologie may take place, this Figure best suits with Martin Luther his Temper and Actions: for hand I are in Conjunction in m, an eminent Argument of the Activity of his Fancie, and of his great Parts and Learning; and five Planets in the Ninth, noted his Eminency in Religion, and (they being in Sextile to the Ascendent) his great Abilities to perform what he did therein. I meddle not with the Addle-headed stories of great Conjunctions; it being impossible for the short-lived Experience of Man to affix a Judgement on such things that happen to rarely, as great Conjunctions,





The Moon and 2 in Quartile of 6 from fixed Signes, and y bering in Opposition of 5 from Aquinoctial and Cardinal Signes, made him not respected, but envied by the Courtiers: but the foremention'd Arguments railed his better Fortunes above his Adversaries Designes, for that he outwitted them all by his Policie, and died peaceably possessed of this Dignities and Greatness, and left the Realmos France in Quiet and Peace.



Lastly, In the year 1660. in the moneth March, he died: some say of a deep Melancholy, others of a Fever; the last is not without Reason, nor yet the first in a sense; therefore I believe he participated of both: The Assent was directed ad & &, and & upon the & of the D's Radical place.



Monld I have fet this Revolutional Figure to the Lasitude of Birth, the beginning of vo would have afcended the Horoscope, and the Figure of Heaven (except the Planets places) nearly the same with the Radix. But becanse the Revolution is a Radix for a year, it is most reasonable that the Figure thereof be erected for the Latitude of Abode, and

not of Birth; (if there be a difference between them.)

In this Revolutional Figure, the Lord of the Ascendent is in the eighth House, which (concurring with a bad Direction) is always ominous. Secondly, the Moon herein is returned to the Radical place of Mars; which, says Origanus; fol. 788. pars 3. de Effettib. denotes Infirmities proceeding from Hear and Moulture; which are heightned and exasperated, it Luna su mallo statu vel infortunata, (here she is separated from vacua Cursus, and applies ad Quadratum Mercuris Dominus Sexta) neestan Moulture pericula metuenda sint. If such a Return be thus dangerous in general, it must be much more unhappy in that particular year, in which a violent Direction operates.

Some may wonder how any Native having hin the Tenth, should attain to so great Dignities, as did this eminent Native. I affiver: hin this Nativity hath a double Signification: (1.) h quaterns h; being so possed, makes Breaches upon the Natives Greatness; and thus hath he done here.
(2.) h Lord of the Ascendent in the Tenth, is an Argument of Honour; besides, the Luminaries are in exact * of each other, and h Lord of the Ascendent is in Reception and * of 3, Lord of the Tenth.

His Reverend Prelate was born at the time within written, and under a Positi-

on of Heaven suitable to his Birth, pious Inclinations, good Actions, and his great and to-be-admired Acquirements in Honour and Learning, &c. For here is (which of Astrologers is termed Signum justina) ascending, and which the Patron of Arts and Learning, is in Conjunction of Spica Virginis in the Horoscope; and which is in the ninth House with Oculus Tauri, (another eminent fixed Star) in perfect Trine thereunto: the Moon and are in friendly Trine with the Cusp of the Angle of Honour and Dignity, and enjoy the same benigh Configuration with each other, and that from good places of the Figure wand (to make the Nativity the better to correspond with the Dignity of this learned and pious Native) there are several Stars of the nature of wand doing grandia, &c. ex pappertate sublevant ad sublimitatem earn quain non facium speech and give greater Honours, then do the seven Planets. And this was exactly verified in the Original and Progress of this honoured Native.

Another Argument of the Grandeur of this worthy Native, is, Cardinal Signes possessing the prime Angles of the Figure: For as the greatest Astions of the World depend upon the Cardinal Points of the Heavens, via, N. S. M. V. fo the most eminent Persons (I mean now, where there is in the rife of a Man any Wonders or that it feems prodigious to the general or common way of Advancement) have those Points upon the Angles of their Nativities. Thus it was in the Nativity of Marcus Tullius Cicero: whose Parentage (if Authority may be credited) was scarce known, yet was he at last elevated to such a Degree of Honour, that he was called, The Fathen of his Country. Thus it happened in the Nativity of Charles Gustave, late King of Sweden who (though not born to a Kingdom) had one given him by Queen Christina; and afterwards did fuch Acts, that History cannot often paralleli Sd id chanced in Oliver Crommel's Nativity also, who by Birth was but a Geneleman of mean Fortune, yet by the prodigiousness of his Fate, he attained (I will not fay here by what means) to the greatest Dignity that could be, in, and over three flourishing Kingdoms.

If we shall enqui: e Astrologically into the Reason of this eminent Na-

A a

tives Misfortunes, viz. his tedious Imprisonment, and violent Death; we shall finde (by observing the Figure) that the Lord of the Twelsth is in the Alcendent: and Argol and Ogier Ferrier fay, If the Lord of the Twelfth be posited in the First, it argues (not onely Imprisonment, but) many eminent Enemies to the Native; also many Labours, Griefs and Troubles, attended with grievous Treacheries and Deceipts, &c. besides, the fiery Planet Mars is upon the Cuip of the Twelfth, in Opposition to the Moon, and in Quartile to her Dispositor. That he should die a violent Death, is obvious, because &, Author Mortis, is in a humane Signe, in Opposition to the Moon; and the Lady of the Horoscope is in Signo violenti, going to a Conjunction of an Infortune, and he Lord of the Fourth.

I shall not in this place give you many Demonstrations of the Truth of the Correction of this eminent Natives Geniture, because I intend a particular Treatise thereof at large; onely take notice, that the Medium Cali ad Corpus Martis, was the cause of his Imprisonment, though not the instrumental cause, for that was the over-heated Conceptions of the Vulgar, being urged on by some in Power, as mad as they, to so causless an Animosity. And four years after, the Ascendent came to the Body of h cum Latitudine ; at which time he was most barbarously murthered.



N the Diary of this learned Persons Life, (written by his own Hand) I finde the time of his

Birth as it is within written; and do conceive it to be somewhat near the Truth, because about the time of his being imprison'd in the Tower of London, (by reason of that popular Fury that then prevailed against that sacred Function, of which he was an eminent Member) he had the Medium Cali directed ad Cauda Draconis': he was then aged 67 years, and upward. And for to fignifie his Death, which was in the 82 year of his Age, fere; he laboured under the force of the Sun to the Quartile of the Moon. Other Accidents in general I finde scattered among the Passages of his Life; but the times of them being not therein fet down, nor I in any probable way to obtain them otherwise, renders me the more incapable of confirming it by further Astrological Observations.

For to fignific this Reverend Divine should be subject to Imprisonments, there need no other Testimony then the Lord of the Ascendent in the Twelfth, it being the same Position that that illustrious Prince Christiernu King of Denmark had in his Nativity; and how he suffered by Imprison-

ment, I have in his Geniture mentioned.

This learned Divine faith, that at the beginning of the Parliament, he was sent for, by the Kings Writ, to sit therein; but how he took the Tower in his way, he knoweth not. For his Commitment, and the other eleven learned Bishops with him , I never yet heard any just Reason rendred; nor indeed any at all, except such that was urged for our Blessed SAVI OUR'S Suffering, viz. to satisfie the raging and incensed Multitude. Their feveral eminent Accidents to exactly corresponding with the Directions they are compared withal, evince the Hours and Minutes within written, to be the true time of this great Church-mans Birth. We shall in the next place confider how it agrees with him in things of more general Concernment.

The Author of his Life telleth us, that he was inclinable to Acts of Mercy and Compassion; and among many, in page 68. giveth us one incomparable instance, or proof thereof, viz. In the year 1602. (saith he) began the great Plague at York; at which time he carried himself with so much beroical Charity, as will make the Reader wonder to hear it : for the poorer fort being removed to the Pelt-house, he made it his frequent Exercise to visit them with Food, both for their Bodies and Souls. His chief Errand was to instruct and comfort them. ____ And to make his Coming the more acceptable, he carried usually a Sack of Provision with him for those that wanted it, &c.-Now to fignifie this worthy Inclination in him Altrologically, we finde ? his chief Significator to be in Conjunction of Q, and in great Reception of 21, (the most compassionate and friendly Planets in the Heavens) who with his benefique Rays, fortifies the Ascendent of this Nativity, although he be fix Degrees from the same.

He was a Petson of great acquired Parts, a sharp Student; and gained much Honour and Effeem thereby: yea, so much, that the Author of his Life compareth him with St. Remigins; of whom it was faid, - Ut primum disciplinarum capax factus est - Non modo nasu majores , ingenii felicitates discendiq ardore, sed & morum maturitate singulari excelluit : That from the time of his first Capacity of Learning, he out-stripped even those that were his Superiours in Age, both in Excellency of Parts, Proficiency in

Learning, and Maturity of Moral Vertues.

In his Nativity to denote the same, we finde the Moon in Trine of 2 and 2; and although & be in Pisces, he is befriended by both the Fortunes, and in no ill Configuration with any one Planet : therefore is his fingle Debility of being in X , most super-sufficiently supplyed; and accidentally his Polition is very good.

The Pleiades Culminating, and the Sun in his Exaltation, in Trine of E, a superiour Planer, and Q Lady of the Tenth in her Exaltation also, are eminent Arguments of the Honour and great Preferments which this worthy


Person en joyed.

The Dragons Tayl in the Tenth, occasioned those unworthy Scandals cast upon him by divers, of which the History of his Life maketh mention; and was perhaps, by being in II, the Dignities of 2, a main Reason of the sevetal Contells in print, wherein he was in his Life-time engaged: yet nevertheless, by reason of the forementioned Arguments, the Engagements he underwent, and the Prejudices of his Adversaries towards him, turned still to his Honour and Advantage.

One Passage in his Life, I shall take the Opportunity to relate, it being of so eminent Concernment to all ; and therefore cannot be too often printed, nor by too many read : and it is indeed a Demonstration of his great Parts, and of the Profundity of his Judgement; and shews him to have been a Perfon so curiously scrutinous, that he would pierce the very inside of what he once undertook. The Story is thus : The Son of one Edward Perry near e Woolver Hampton in Staffordfhire , (commonly known by the Title of The * Boy of Bilion) being uncapable of Learning, and therefore negligents of goring to School, (yet apt enough it feems for Villany, which made Dr. Ber. when he came comention him and his Practices, to term him, Little e less then a Devil) was wrought upon by some into counterseit himself pose sessed with the Devil; and was promised a good Reward, no doubt, for

his Labour. Which Imposture, this Boy (it seems) had practised so long, e that he began to conceive himself to be possessed; and accordingly eaccused an old Woman for bewitching him: which Counterfeit this Knave s managed to sub-illy, that the Woman at the Assizes was condemned for to die. This learned Bishop hearing thereos (it being in his Diocess, he being schen Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry) and perswaded in his own Thoughts e that the Boy did but counterfeit, (though to strangely, as made it almost bee youd discovery) and again, that if it should not be discovered, the poor · Woman must loose her Life; he requests of the Judges that then went the · Circuit, that he might have the Boy home with him to his own House; affuring them, that he would ute his best Encleavours to finde out the Impofure before the next Assizes: which he did, but not without great Difficulty, &c. as may be seen in a Book of that matter set forth by Mr. Richard · Baddely, this Reverend Bishops Secretary. The Boy would counterfeit fo exactly, that every Man (learned, or not fo) would believe that the whole frame of Nature was out of order with him: his Utine that was always black, yet proved the best Discoverer of the Cheat at last; for there being a hole made through the Wall that belonged to the Chamber where this Boy lodged, he was found thereby to colour his Urine with Ink, or other such-like stuff: in which he being first discovered, the remainder of other his Impostures, himself confessed. And this learned Prelate, upon his · Contrition for it , bound him an Apprentice to a Shoe-maker in Bristol; from whence he went to London, and is full living (as Doctor B. thinks) in the Parish of St. Martins in the Fields.

Thus we see how easie a matter it is for Innocents to be robb'd of their Lives; and also how dangerous it is for Judges to permit the Malice and Wickedness of an Evidence, to heighten the Ignorance of a Jury, or indeed their own Negligence or Credulity.



Do not infert this Revolutional Scheme, as if it contained any Significations of Death therein; but to shew, that when there are dangerous Directions operating, argood Revolution cannot totally enervate their Effects; especially at ninety five years of

Herein you have it ascending the East Angle, and & Lord thereof, in Conjunction of h, Lord of the Ninth, in the Tenth, and both calling a Trine therefrom to the Alcendent, and to the fortunate Planet Q, and (Platiquely) to o also: All which are eminent Arguments of Ingenuity and Leatning; and (indeed) of a more then ordinary Capacity and Understanding because all the Significators thereof are in Aereal Signes. Let but any Aftrologer consult Authors about the Significations of these excellent Positions, and he shall finde that this learned and pious Native was eminently deserving of the honourable Epithets several learned Men, both Papists and Protestants,

have fixed on him; as you may read in the Hillery of his Life at large & unto

which (after I have initianced in a few, 191 the tent) I shall refer you. Morus in his Oration at Geneva dedicated to him, Riles him, The most excellent Servant of God, The most Reverend Man of God, The Athanasius of our Age. Thy Breast (faith he) is a breathing Library : Thou are to Britain , at Autin was to Hippo, &c. Paulus Testardus Blesensis, files him, Seculi, & Ecclesia decus eximium, The greatest Honour of the Church and Age. Arnolaus Boeting faith of him, "That he did excel with a most fingular Judgement in "the Oriental Languages, and in all other abstruce and deep Learning; ve-" nerable to all Europe, whose Authority prevails much with all Men, &c. Mr. Selden terms him , Most Roverend , and a Man of great Piety , singular Judgement, learned to a Miracle, and born to promote the more severe Studies, &c. Dr. Prideanx (sometime Bishop of Worcester) calls him, The most rich Magazine of Solid Learning, and of all Antiquity.

In this Nativity there are fix of the seven Planets Supra terram, and &, Lord of the Ascendent, in the very Heart of Heaven to the Degree thereof, and in & with Q, and the Sun upon the Cuip of the ninth House; which Aftrologically portended the spreading of his deserved Fame; and made him not onely noted, but honoured and beloved for his exquifite Pains and Parts. This in general. I shall in the next place compare some Directions in his Nativity, with some of the particular Accidents of his Life; from which it will follow,

that this Nativity is this Reverend Bishops true one.

1. Anno 1600. being then aged twenty years, he commenced Master of Arts, (a thing not commonly known in any University; and indeed, a great Demonstration of this pious Persons Pregnancie in his yonger years) he had then operating the 10 to the * of 2, and to the Mid-heaven also, which aptly portended the same.

2. Anno 1612. being aged 32 years, he proceeded Dr. of Divinity: he had then operating the Medium Cali ad Sextilum Luna, by Direction.

3. Anno 1624. in the 44 year of his Age, he was created Arch ishop of Armagh, and Primate of Ireland; but was not possessed thereof, until two years afterwards; at which time he had the @ directed ad Sexulum fovis: which Direction fell upon the Cusp of the eleventh House, in the Dignities of 4; ergo, very fignificant to that purpole.

A little after he was elected Archbishop, &c. he had a Sickness that continued with him nine moneths together: which was faid to be a Quartan, but I believe nor truely; because the Ascendent then was directed ad & O, and @ ad D &; which Directions fell in & and X: I rather adjudge it a

Confumption, &c.


4. Anno 1640. he being then fixty years of Age, vie. at the beginning of the Miseries in Ireland, he came to England: he had then the Medium Celi directed ad Quadratum Luna, and + ad Antiscium & Sextilum Martis.

5. Anno 1647, the Benchers of Lincolns-Inne requested him to come and Preach among them (they having a great Honour for him) and allow him a considerable Maintenance, it then being the time of the Bishops Persecution in general: he had then the Moon directed ad * 1, and the Ascendent ad Trinum Veneris.

6. Anno 1635. on March 21. this learned and pious Church-man (after he had been 75 years a Pilgrime on Earth, and 55 years thereof a Preacher of the Gospel, and a strenuous Defender of the Truth thereof other ways) died at Rygate, in the County of Surry: He had then operating the Ascendent to the Opposition of Saturn, and he Lord of the Eighth in the Nativity, and the Part of Fortune (which Ptolomy calls the Lunar Horoscope) directed ad Oppositum Mercuriis qui est Dominus Ascendentis.

From all which Arguments, I conclude this to be the true Nativity of this eminently learned Prelate.



so: yet wanting Accidents whereby to verifie it. I shall request the Reader to excuse me, if I am not so large herein as (the worthy Author deserves,

and) he may expect from me.

Herein we finde m Horoscopical; a Signe, that not onely the best of Prelaces, but of Princes, have drawn their first Breath under: the Moon is fatta ing into the House of 4 scalling a Trine to the Cusp of the ninth House : the Sunx Lord of the Ninth, is in Conjunction of Lin X; and &, Lord of the Ascendent, is in ve his Exaltation, in Sextile to the Sun, 11, Ascendent and the Moon: 4 (the proper Patron of Learning) is in m, in Quartile of the Moon; which doth not so much afflict as some Men believe: and although he have lately been in Opposition of h, yet being not now so, it doth not debarthenoble Effects that & naturally portends. Origanus, de Effett.fol. cos. faith. & falous, non la sus partititer à maleficis prafertim Marte, in bono Coli locosin Signis Aereis, Pracipue 20 - facit ingeniosissimos, ad omnes disciplinas aptos, & semper dat pluritatem linguarum. And he gives an Example hereof in the Geniture of Melaulthon, Wherein & was fo placed & Onde (faith he) ingenii fui felicitate tantum rei literaria pro fuit , ut ex eju institutione foriptis , non modo Germani , sed d'alia nationet maximum senserint commodum. That this learned Native was no way inferiour to Melantthon, his Notes on the Bible, his Stella Nova, his 'Ayyaxonegnia Del, and his Noah's Flood returning, are eminent Testimonies. It may also be remembred of him, that in these late Confusions, he was never known to change. Nat. 1 3.7

Rading over that elegant and well-penn'd Piece, The Life of this learned Native, I

of his Birth, and several eminent Accidents, by which I have endeavoured to sinde out the true Ascendent thereof: yet shall not be so consident or overweening, as to affirm it to a tittle true; I may perhaps (in tanto) fail of the verity hereof. However, I shall adventure to publish some Reasons in Art, that I have been at (no small) pains to excogitate, which seem to me to evince it probably (at least) to be his true Nativity.

- 1. The learned Author of his Life faith, That in his younger years he was fo pregnant in Learning, that at 13 years of Age he was admitted into Magdalen Colledge in the University of Oxford: That he should be of Patts to admirable in his Youth, need not allonish any that shall Astrologically view this Figure: for g, the Patron of Learning, is simply the most powerful therein ; and the O, Lord of the Ascendent, is in Conjunction with him ; and that which so notably sharpned his Understanding, and gave Winge to his Ingenuiry, and made him honour'd thereby, was d'in his Ascendent, and he Lord of the tenth House. And that he should at such years (as the Author of his Life affirms) be so serious a Student, that he generally spent thirteen hours of the Day at his Book, may be denoted by the Lord of the Ascendents being in Conjunction with &, in his greatest Dignities, and this in a melancholy and earthly Signe; the great Reception between hand 4 doth not inconsiderably add unto the same. But as these are Radical Positions, so they are generally to be observed, as well at one time of the Natives Life, as at another. But to fignifie that particular Accident, I finde by Calculation that the M. C. about the 13 year of his Age, came (by Direction) to the \Delta of
- 2. Aged 24 years, he entred into Holy Orders; and at that time he had the Medium Cali directed ad Trinum Jovis, and Luna ad Sextilum Jovis: which Directions are properly natural to cause the Honour they produced.
- 3. Being aged 34 years, he commenced Doctor of Divinity: the Ascendent was then directed ad & Solis, & & cum Latitudine.
- 4. Aged 39. made Canon of Christ-Church in Oxford by the King, and

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chose publick Orator by the University: he had then a most advantagious Revolution, and Inpiter transiting his Medium Cali most of the

COLLECTIO GENITURARUM: Or,

5. He was made Chaplain to the King at 42 years of Age, and more then ordinarily in favour with his then facred Majesty; as may appear by the Kings Message to the Parliament, in Enwis Baondini, wherein his Majesty is pleased to request his Attendance on his Person in the time of his greateit (and most to-be-lamented) Sufferings: He had then the Medium Cali directed to Aldebaran, a Kingly fixed Star of the first Magnitude, and to the Quartile of the Sun also; which in other things wanted not its Significations.

6. Aged 55. on April 24. 1660. he died; having (like Moses of the promised Land) but a Glimpie of his Majesties access to the Throne of his Ancestors, (for whose Cause he had been so great a Sufferer) but was not permitted to see him setled there: he had then the Ascendent directed ad

Quadratum Saturni.

These concurrent Directions, to me, prove this to be the true Nativity of this learned Person. Take however one or two more Testimonies in general, which very much seem to strengthen the truth of these several Particulars.


He was (saith the learned Author of his Life) of a just heighth for Stature, and all proportionare Dimensions; avoiding the Extreams of Gross and Meagre. And in fol. 85. of his Life, 'tis faid, - His Face carried Dignity and Attractions in it; scarce ever clouded with a Frown, or so much as darkned by Reservedness. Which Characters of Description, Mars in Leo in the Ascendent, may justly challenge, as all Astrologers confent.

In Page 50 of his Life, we read, - His Memory was serviceable, but not officious; faithful to Things and Business, but unwillingly retaining the Pun-Etualities of Words: which Defect he frequently lamented, it being harder for him to get one Sermon by Heart, then to Pen twenty.

This may justly (in Astrologie) be attributed to the Combustion of \$\pi\$; for although he be the most potent Planet in the Figure, yet his Combustion must necessarily have its Effects.

Thus much for this learned Doctors Nativity.

Study. The Trine of the Sun and & to 4, from the tenth House, gave him the great Honour he enjoyed by Learning, and his skill in Languages and Antiquity. He was indeed a general Scholar; no Science, either Liberal or


Mechanick, but he was acquainted therewith.

He was born at Amersham in Buckingham-Shire; of Parentage (in the Eye of the World) but mean : yet he being ordained from his Nativity for great Acquirements in Learning, Ge. was about the 15th year of his Age, preferred to Sir William Drake, to wait upon him at Chille Colledge in Oxford: he had then operating Medium Cali ad & O, & Au, & & vich fingular Directions, were the mediate Cautes (next under G o D's Providence, of his laying a Foundation to his future Honour and Preferment: which he failed not to enjoy and partake of , until the Iniquity of the Times prevailed to highly a nong us, that Learning began to be neglected.

When he was 26 years old, he published his Notes on Ridley's Civil Law, and a little before, was made Chaplain of Christs-Church, Prebendary of Chichest rand Sarum: Ascendent was then directed ad * D, and Medium

Cali ad & D. cum & sine Latitudine.

Aged near 40 years, he cied, having been about 20 years (as faith the Hiflory of his Life) before affliored with the Gout: the Ascendent was then directed ad [] D , and the Moon nearly come to the Conjunction of To. Thus then we see that there are other Causes of the Gout besides the Radical Affliction of the Sun and Moon: here is 2, Lord of the Sixth, Combust in m, in the tenth House. Argolfays, - If the Lord of the Sixth be in the Tenth, it notes molest ation to the Native by great Persons &c. and by such means, Sickness and Trouble of Minde will invade and disquiet him: and by the Tyranny of our late Times, he was much molested and disquieted; which gave Opportunity to his (too) cruel Fate to feize upon him; which never deserted him till Death. But that w ich made it the more malitious, was the unhappy I of the two Infortunes from Cardinal Signes.




WE may remember that the O was eclipfed almost 10 Digits in the very Degree of To, Lord of the Ascendent at Birth, on the 26 of December, viz. a little after this Revolution began: and on March the 13. 1646. he died : On which very day, the O was in to the Ascendent of the Racix; and Lana was in 8 of 12, Lord of the Ascendent thereof, and of the Sixth in the Revolutional Figure. In the Re-

volution it self, the D is in domo Martis & Mortis, in to the Ascendent and its Lord, at Birth: an intercepted Signe in the Eighth of the Radix, ascends in the Revolution, and his in & to & Lord thereof. Thus all things concurring together, might well denote the year dangerous: but besides all these, the @ was directed to the eighth House in the Revolution, just about the time he died; and about three weeks or a moneth before it is most probable he first sickned to death, because about that time, the Ascendent of the Revolution was directed to the D of 3, and 8 of h.

Thus much for the Nativity of this worthy Person; whose loss, not onely Amersham, but England, may lament! but yet rejoyce in this that they were truely blessed, in bringing forth so great a Son of Learning.

A Lthough this learned Perfon (for fuch beyond all peradventure he was) was in his Life-time a great

great Enemy to Affrologie, I shall not refuse to give his Nativity a place in my Book; because it forth nor meanly evince the Power and Influences of the Stars, In as much assit truely describes his Person, Temper and Disposition. The Man, I mult confess, I never faw; but relying on the Credit of the Author of his Life, I believe him to have been a Person of Middle Statute, Thin Body; Lively Countenance, and Fresh Complexion, O.c. to fignifie which Astrologically, we finde vo, a Signe of Brevity and Spareness, to ascend the Horoscope, and the D'in &, another Signe of Brevity, in exact \(\Delta \) to the Ascendenc? The Author of his Life reports him to have been Grey betimes: for fightfication of which; we finde in his Nativity & Lord of the Ascendent, posited in 2, a fiery Signe, (quite contrary to his own nature) near Cor Scorpins a violent fixed Star. Now, a Planet Cold and Dry, being posited in a Signe Hor and Dry, may very well abate of its own nature, and receive an Empression of the Nature of the Signe; as we see it apparent in Vegetables, the hottest Ground ripens any thing the soonest. This Native mult'for the fame Reason have been also very Cholerick, although the Author of his Life hath mentioned no such Character of him; and by that Humours wasting of the Humidum Radicale, it is no wonder that he should feein Antient in his Youth. And to affare all Men (that shall Read this) that ellis is no Fiction, or faigned story, cunningly compelled to agree with the Significations of his Geniture, viz. that he was Cholerick, I can demonthrate the same from his own Writings: for he contended with diverseminent Persons under Pretence of Zeal to the Truth, that never were known to begin with him; as Mr. Salimarsh, Mr. Sympson, Mr. Walker, Mr. Canne, as the Author of his Life maketh to appear : so that one may justly say of him. as a learned and ingemous Person once of Gassendus the French Physician, He made that to seem the Severity of his Devotion, which in Truth was the Moroseness of his Nature.

To prove this his true Nativity further, let it be confidered, that he was most fortunate in Wives, as 4 in 5 in the seventh House, might well denote, together with 2 hef \(\Delta \) to b from the seventh House: Nor could be be but very Uxorious, as 4 satisposing of b, aptly argues.

Being aged 16. he was first sent to the University: the @ was then directed

- Aged 23. he commenced Master of Arts: the Sun was then directed ad
Jovis.


Aged 27. he went to Preach at Lincolns-Inne, where he continued ten years together: the Ascendent was then directed to the *of d, the D to the Of the Sun, and the Sun to the *of Q.

Aged 37. he left Lincolns-Inne, and went to Redriff, where he continued 43 years: he had then the Ascendent directed to the \(\Delta \) of \(\mathbf{1} \), and to the \(\times \)

Aged 69 years the was chosen one of the Presbyterian Assembly: \mathcal{M} edium

Aged 80 years, he died: Ascendent ad of to and to the Bulls Eye.

He Ascendent of the Revolution is the opposite place of the Sun in the Raoix, and the Lord of the Eighth is in Quarrile to the Ascendent: h. Lo: d of the Aicencent at Birth, is here polited in the fixth House, and the Sun with? is there also : the Moon is in Oppofition of diane Quartile of O, and o beholds the Sun with a Quartile also. All which are Arguments very dangerous in such a Revolution, wherein

fo dire a Direction happens, as before hathbeen remembred. But besides this, to make the year the more cruel and fatal, we finde that the Moon was eclipted to Digits in the place of the Sun, a few moneths before the Revolution began, and operated in full force near the time of his Death. Nor is it improbable, but that the Suns Eclipse in August 1654. happening on the eighth House of the Radix, and upon the place of h in the Revolution, might confiderably add unto the foregoing difmal Prefages. Thus is a Justice in the Decrees of Gop and Nature most eminently observable, viz. To cut him off (partly) by the Influences of Eclipses, that in his Life-time so surionly enceavoured the Obscuration of their most apparent Effects. See his Discourse against Lilly. Let not any mistake me : I do onely affect the verity of Influences in Defects of the Luminaries, but cannot defend Lilly in any point, because he deserves notoriously to be condemned, in that he pretended unto the Science of the Stars, and was not able to answer Mr. Gataker's Sophisms against the same.

On July the 8. 1654. he was first taken with a fainting Fir: the Moon was then in the opposite place of the Ascendent, going to an of 1, Lord thereof, who was newly become Retrograde.


On July 17. his Tertian grew too strong for Nature: & was then in & of the O, and both near the fixth House of the Revolution, and the D was in the Ascendent of the Radix.

On July 22, he began to be at a little ease, and to talk and discourse freely: the D was then in d of 4, Lord of the Ascendent of the Revolution.

7x/y 26. in the Morning he was in great pain: the D was in \square of δ and

July 27. about feven of the Clock at Night, he departed this Life: the Moon was then exactly in Quartile of b. Lord of the Ascendent of the Ra-

The O in m in the Eighth of the Nativity, in O of o, may very well portend a Tertian Fever to cut off Life; also a violent wasting of the Vital Spirics before Death: both which were true in this Nativity.

He was a Person of Parts most pregnant; a great Scholar, (let his years be considered) as the Sextile Rays of Mercury to Saturn, admirably well denore. His Inclination was apt to any thing of Study: for he had the Sun. Moon and Mercury all posited in earthly Signes. He was of a large Spirits and was aiming at Honour sufficiently; as most do that have Lee ascending: but to add to that, here were the Luminaries in Trine to each other; and one in Conjunction of , and the other in Trine to, Venus; which in fome fense did not want their Significations.



His Native for Parts both Natural and acquired, was, and is, most e-minent and prodi-

gious; it being observable, that (while he was at the University, and afterwards) few of his years were able to equal him. His Acumen, and admirable Memory, are plainly discovered from the great strength of Verm, and her being in so happy Aspect with Mercury, Lord of the ninth House, who is in Trine to the Ascendent. I know the Opposition of Mars and Jupiter s and their Quartile to Mercury, are of no good Signification in Matters of Religlonibut rather encline the Native to Enthulialmas all Aftrologers will judge that shall see it, yet they do not abate of his great Parts, but rather occasion first rashly to employ them. And thus hathit fared with this learned Person: for firthe 12 year of his Age, (he having the M. C. directed ad Quadra-100 Winch the then Powers (thinking Religion not so much honoured (there-2H) as it ought to be by a Divine, committed him to Newgate, where he lay a year and half. Origany says ib. C. Sa in 9 aut 3 in signis mobilibus, force percepting, aut in destrumente, aug. in cadente, a malesticis damnato, significat natum non manjurum in una Religione. Here Siein the Ninth; in a moveable Signe, and Jupiter cadent, and afflicted of Mars, and from moveable Signes; ergo the Aphorism in the greatest parris herein made good. Argol and Ferrier say, If Mercury be ill dignified in the ninth House, the Native will be noted for Errours in Religion : Mercury (you see) is so in this Figure ; and the then Powers (though perhaps as guilty themselves) were pleased to call his Writings Errours.

Many other things might be noted in this Figure; but I, intending not a Calculation, and thence Observations at large, forbear all further scrutiny herein.

IN the Narrative of the Life of this learned Doctor, he is faid to be born on the Day within written, at Strat-

ford-Bow, in the County of Middlefex; viz. within three Miles of London: but the time of the Day is not mentioned. Howbeit, I have been at the pains to discover the true time thereof; as by the following Correction may appear.

He being aged 20 years, he was fent to Cambridge; viz. Anno 1595. he had the Sun then directed to the Scorpions Heart.

When he was aged 28 years, he married an Orphan in the City of Londons formerly the Daughter of an eminent Citizen and Mercer of London: he had then the Sun directed ad Trinum Jovis, Lord of the seventh House; and at the same time \bigoplus ad Sextilum Mercurii, Lord of the Ascendent; the Direction happening on the very Cusp thereof.

Anno 1608. being aged 33 years, he became Rector of Black-fryers, London; where he continued above 45 years, viz. to his Death: he had then by Direction the Moon to the Conjunction of Mercury, Lord of his Ascendent and Tepth, and the Ascendent ad Spicam Virginis, & Sextilum Saturni; which Directions fell in the second House.

Anno 1628, when he was aged 53 years, he commenced Doctor of Divinity: he had then the Moon directed to the Trine of Jupiter, and the Sun to the Body of Venus, cum Latindine.

Anno 1653. Dacember 12. at eight of the Clock in the Evening, being aged a little above 78 years, he died: the Sun was then directed ad 3, and the Ascendent under the Direction to the Body of the Sun, and Cauda Draconis.


The Author of his Life faith, he was Ahstmatical, and sometimes troubled with the Stone; Here is the Sun in Quartile of Jupiter. Lord of the Sixth, and Saturnin Quartile to the Ascendent, aprily denoting the first; and the Sun in Conjunction with the Dragons Tayl in Scorpio, and the Moon and Mercury (who is Dominus Ascendents) in the same Signe, are very significant Arguments of the list.

That this learned Native should be so eminent a Divine, and so much honouted for his Learning and Parts, is apparent from these several remarkable

Configurations: viz. the Moon her being in Sextile of Q, Lady of the ninth House, and the Oposited locally therein. 2. Uhis being in the Eleventh, in Sextile of S, a Planet in the Ascendent. 3. Uhis being in Trine of E, the Dispositor of the Lady of the Ninth, of whom he also disposeth.
4. The Sun and Mercury in Sextile to the Ascendent; 2 being Governour of the prime Angles of the Figure.


Thus then the Figure agreeing with those several Accidents, as well in Particular as General, I dare pronounce it the true one, and commend it to the honest Astrologer for such.



R. Samuel Crook was born on the Day within written, at Great Waldingfield, in the County of Suffolk:

but the time thereof, I have endeavoured to finde out Astrologically: it being either the Moroseness, Ignorance or Negligence of those that write the Lives of famous Men, not onely not to set down the time of the Diy of their Births, but sometimes not the Day it self; and content themselves with a bare knowledge of the Year: which Errour (in this as other things of moment) hath not onely caused Consusion in Chronologie, but in Astronomy also; and is like yet to occasion much more, if the Pains of some serious and industrious Pen and Brain do not endeavour a Rectification thereof.

This learned Native in his time was so famous in his Profession, that the Publisher of his Life terms him A Prophet, and The Son of a Prophet, (his Father having it seems been a Preacher of the Gospel) and the University of Cambridge, in honour of his great Parts and Accomplishments, in their Library have done him a particular Honour, (as he in his Life-time had done them) of which the History of his Life maketh mention.

Upon the first fight of this Nativity, many Artists would wonder where there should be that therein, sufficient to signific, not onely such Honour and Fame, but the Natives Deserts and Merits thereof. Howbeit, upon a setious View, we shall finde many Arguments of weight that fitly portended the same: viz. Q. Lady of the Horoscope, her being in Conjunction of p. Lord of the ninth House, if a most singular Position for a Divine:). 2. 4 his being posited in S his Exaltation, in the House signifying Religion; partly in

Ato the Ascendent. 3. \$\frac{1}{2}\$, Lord of the Ninth, his being in Sextile of \$\frac{1}{2}\$, the Dispositor of the Moon, and \$\frac{1}{2}\$, Lady of the Ascendent, in the same Aspect of him. 4. The Luminaries in Sextile of each other, the one being Lord of the Mid-heaven, and the other partly Governess of the Ninth. 5. The Moon in Trine of \$\frac{1}{2}\$, who disposes of \$\frac{1}{2}\$, \$\frac{1}{2}\$ and the Sun) and he in friendly Sextile to the Ascendent. All which, are not onely Testimonies of great Honour and Fame in the Profession he was bred up unto, but of eminent Ingenuity and Learning.

The Author of his Funeral-Oration hath this Passage, relating to his great Parts, Two things (rarely met in one Man) were eminent in him; A quick Invention, and a sound Judgement; and these accompanied with a clear Expression, and a graceful Electrion. Which seems to be most admirably denoted y all the foregoing Configurations, their happening in the Dignities of h, h and d. I sharpens the Invention; and by his ** with a and p, adds to the Electrion: and h and h give a singular sound Judgement.

To come to particular Accidents: Let it be remembred, this learned Native, when he was somewhat above 26 years old, received Ordination, or entred into holy Orders: the Moon at that time was directed ad * Jovis; and within a year (or less) after, he was inducted to the Patsonage of Wrington in Somerfet-shire, by the means of Sir Arthur Capel: he had then the Sun directed ad Dovis. And U, being the most powerful Planet in the Figure, (I mean effentially) might be an eminent Argument of his continuing in that Benefice so long: for I do not read in all his Life, that he ever had any other, but still remained there.

When he was aged 75 years, he died, viz. on Decemb. 25. 1649. he had the Ascendent directed ad 6 h. Lord of the Fourth; & being upon the very Radical place of the Sun at that time, and the Moon newly separated from his Conjunction, and the Sun was in exact Quartile of the Moons place in his Nativity also.

Thus much shall serve for this Nativity.

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

A Gentleman in Cambridge, (by Profession a Divine) whose Name I have no Commission to annex to his Nativity. was pleased to Communicate his Geniture to me, with several Questions to be resolved therefrom which some years since I resolved in the following Method, and head by way of Example publish them in manner following.



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THe Accidents by which this Nativity was verified are those following:

1. Aged 13 years, a dangerous Fall from a Horse; it happened about Midfummer 1648. And it was occasioned by the Ascendents occurre to the Opposition of him, II, an Aë. cal Signe, near the Stars of Auriga, of the nature of 3, and partly 2. 2 passed by the place of the Direction at the same time, and abated much of its evil subsucce.

Aged near 17 years, the Small Pox; it happened in the moneth of May 16,22 the Sun was then directed ad \$2, and \$2. In ally following, went to the University then the M.C. came to the Body of the Moon with Laplude, the being thoug in the Tenth of the Nativity; the Moon then came to the Terms of 2, and Trine of 3: the O was under the Trine of L. Lord of the Tenth.

In the moneth Depember 1657, elected fellow, aged then about 24 years: the M. C. to the Terms of Q, and going to the D: the O ad Ter. V: Alc. to the Body of Q, and going to the Terms of U: the D and H to the Terms of U. might occasion some difficulty about it. And this he confessed was true.

Arril 1658. a Tertian Ague of short continuance, occasioned by the force of that years Revolution.

From the Nativity thus corrected, the Questions propounded by the Native, received from me these following Answers. 1. When like to come to any Preferment ? If durable?

Ref. The Native may obtain Preferment in the 26 year of his Age; and it may be durable: for then the Mid-heaven comes by Direction to the Trine of \mathfrak{P} , and the Sun to the Conjunction of \mathfrak{P} : both which fignific admirable and durable Preferment.

Quelt. 2. Whether ever like to marry? and when?

Resp q being in a Prolifical Signe, near the Body of 3, and both in Sextile to q Lord of the Ascendent, are eminent Testimonies of the Natives Inclination to Marriage. The time when, may be in his 27 year of Age: for then he is under the force of the before-mentioned Direction, and the Sun at that time comes to the Sextile of q in main the fifth House of the Nativity. But the Moon being about that time directed to a Quadrate of he falling in the eleventh House, may denote some kinde of unexpected Crosses to the Native; and this from some of his Elderly Friends, perhaps his Mother, & by reason of the fore-mentioned Business: which may not onely prove (somewhat) obstructive to his Proceedings therein, but may occasion some Diteratiness in Body, and Grief and Trouble of Minde by reason thereof. But the best on't is, it may go over without much Danger.

Quelt. 3. Whether thrive by his Profossion? and in what place most

like?

Resp. The Native may thrive and advantage himself by his Profession: for 11, the natural Significator thereof, disposes of 15, Lord of the Ninth and Tenth Houses, and casts a friendly Sextile to the Alcendent. The Place the most like to do good therein, should be the North-East part of the Nation; for both the Fortunes are in that Quarter of Heaven, and in Signes representing the same Quarter also.

Quest. 4. Whether many, or few, real Friends? and what kinde of Persons

they shall be , in reference to Temperature and Profession?

Resp. A double-bouied Signe upon the Cusp of the Eleventh, and the States, should portend many Friends: 4, Lord thereof, in 1, a fixed Signe, and in Sextile to the Ascendent, denotes them to be real. For the kinde of Persons, they should for the most part be Civilians and Clergie-men, or Persons of a considerable Quality and Degree; for 4 naturally patronizeth such Persons; and the rather in this Nativity; because he is in the House of the Sun. Those of a middle Statute, full bodied, well made, oval Visage, and a brightish Chemut-coloured Hair, will be the most friendly. The Native may also receive Friendship by the means of Pemale Persons: for 4 being exalted in the Eleventh, and in Trine to the same from the Cusp of the Second, prenotes no less.

Quest. 5. Whether ever like to Travel? and when?


Resp. The Lord of the ninth House in an Angle, and disposed of by a Planet in an Angle, argues small Inclination in this Native to Travel. Nor would it be either pleasant of profitable for the Native so to do, because the Lord of the Ninth is Retrograde, and in a Signe contrary to his nature, and in Opposition to the Ascendent.

Quest. 6. How long it is probable Imay live?

Reft. The Native according to Rules of Art, may live many years, if he escape the thirty third year of his Age, which (according to Natural Causes) cannot but prove very dangerous; for then the Ascendent is directed to the Body of \mathcal{S} , and this happens in \mathfrak{S} , and \mathcal{S} hath great Dignities in the elghith House. The Moon at the same time is directed to the Quartile of Q; Lady of the sixth House; and both these Directions fall in Cardinal Signes. But Sapiens dominabitur Astris.

In this Nativity. Hand & are in Trine-Platique, the one being Lord of

the Ninth, and the other of the Alcendent; and the Moon in Sextile of he from the tenth House: the Sun and Hare in Sextile to the Ascendent; Q and S hold the same Aspect with the Lord thereof, who is in m: Arguments not onely of an accomplished Scholar in general, but of a good Divine.

For he is of Stature tall, and well proportioned; void of the Extreams of Gross and Meagre: his Complexion is very fresh and ruddy; his Hair of a brightish Colour, not much carling, Oc.

To denote his excellent Parts, (for of fuch he is, and in Learning and Reading inferiour to very few), he hash $\mathfrak P$ in $\mathfrak M$, in $\mathfrak K$ to $\mathfrak S$ and to the Afcendent, and holding the same Aspect with $\mathfrak P$. Lord of the Ninth, who is in Δ of his Dispositor; and to add to these, the $\mathfrak D$ (Lady of his Ascendent) is in Platique Δ of $\mathfrak U$, who friendly respects the Ascendent likewise, he being exasted

This learned Person in the lite Times of Consuson, (when Loyalty was held a Crime, and to be Orthodox, no less then Heresie) after several years held a Crime, and to be Orthodox, no less then Heresie) after several years being envied by the (then) prevailing Factions, was in the year 1651. most disgracefully (and without just cause) committed to Prison, and had his Benefice of Clerken-well (not long before) taken from him: he was then upon his Ascendent, and opposite place of his D, above a year together: but that which was more mischievous then this, he laboured under the malevolent Direction of the M.C. ad Oppositum Saturni, cum & sine Latitudine.



The Effects hereof continued until towards 1657. all which time he was kept out of his Right; and then was admitted into a part of his Living again: the Moon was then directed to the Antiscion of 12, and this in the ninth House, and his Part of Fortune at the same time to the Trine of \(\frac{1}{2}\), Lord of the Twelfth; perhaps one Reason why his Enemies became kinde to him.

Other Accidents I have not; howbeit, these seem sufficiently to correct it, because they agree so aprly with the general Significations of the Scheme, as with his Person, Prosession and Parts. Nay, there is an eminent Signification of his suffering by restraint, and the Malice of his Enemies; as the Moon in Opposition of Mars from Cardinal Signes, and Mars and the Dragons Tayl their being posited in the Twelsth House, clearly declare; but such Mischiess should not commonly, or long attend him, because Q is in the Ascendent, and U in Sextile thereunto, and I his being in Reception of the Moon.


Anno 195? on January the twenty second day, this Native told me, he had the greatest Mis-fortune besel him, as ever did in his Life, for the impairing his Estate: He had then the Ascendent directed to the Opposition of \(\frac{1}{2}\), sine Latitudine; but that which was much worse, was, the Sun directed ad \(\sigma\), Lady of his second House, and to the Scorpions Heart; and \(\frac{1}{2}\) ad C. A. \(\frac{1}{2}\) of \(\frac{1}{2}\): and on the day of the Mis-fortune; \(\frac{1}{2}\), Lady of his second, was Retrograde in the Twelsth House of the Nativity, and \(\frac{1}{2}\) was upon the Radical place of the Sun; which Directions and Transits, would not

onely have afflicted his Forume, but Person, had not the Moon at the same time been directed ad Trinum Veneris, and to her own Sextile-A-spect.

Anno 1656. August 24. he had a Quartan Ague, that held him until September 9. 1657. He had then the Sun directed ad \square 15; which Direction happened in exact Quartile to his Alcendent: and (2.) the Part of Fortune directed ad ∂ 3, a Planet pointed in the Ascendent. On the Diy the Ague took him, the Sun, Mars and Venus were passing the opposite place of the Moon, and in Quartile to Jupiter, Lord of his Ascendent: Whence I should adjudge, the Ague to be accompanied with a Fever.

Anno 1658. this Native was entertained Chaplain to an honourable Peer of this Realm: He had the Sun directed then ad * 1, Lord of the Ninth, and the Ascendent ad * 3, and Moon nearly to the same.

Here again we see a Sextile of Saturn and Mercury, and this from the Houtes of Mars and Mercury, and the Moon in exact Trine of Mercury, &c. as if a Divine were necessarily compelled to partake of such admirable Positions. But this learned Person, is Philosopher and Astrologer, &c. as well as a Divine; as is testified by his learned Labours already in Print: Viz. His Indago Astrologica; Collection of Eclipses; Britannia Baconica, &c. In which regard, I shall sortear all surther Enquiry into his Geniture; referring this (as a Testimony of my Respects) to his own Consideration and Examination.

Anno 1661. November 5. he had, not onely a high and violent Fever, but the Dropfie, attended with the Scurvy, seized him at once; of which he was compelled to take his Bed, and lay languishing under the same until November 17. on which Day he was given over for dead. On the Day he was first taken, the Sun was upon the Radical place of h, and h there in Conjunction of him; and &, Lord of the Sixth, nearly Stationary in Quartile to the Ascendent of Birth. In his Revolution that year, of was in Conjunction of the Sun, and hin the Ascendent thereof, all the year; the place of the Dragons Tayl alcending, and the Dragons Tayl in the Sixth of the Figure: All which portended a fickly Year. But besides all theie Arguments, the Ascendent was then directed ad & Saturni cum Latitudine, and also ad □ &: which most aprly signified those violent and redious Distempers he then laboured under. From the time he was given over for dead, until toward May following, viz. near fix moneths, he never went abroad. It is my Opinion, had not Q beheld & (one of the Promittors in this Evil) by a friendly Trine, and the place of the Direction by a Semi-Sextile, it had been impossible for him to have recovered. The Applications of his Physicians (as I have heard him fay) were rather prejudicial and tormenting, then any way assistant to him: Nature at the last turn'd the best Physitian; and by Vertue of his next years good Revolution, and the Abatement of the Force and Fury of the ill Directions, this Native unexpectedly recovered, to the Amazement and Wonder of his Doctors, the Joy and Comfort of his Relations and Friends: is now (by Goo's Mercy) alive and may live until a very confiderable Age.



And this may be admitted for a Truth in some sense, became the ninch Houle bath Signification of Visions, Dreams, &c. and the rather, because h casts a Sextile to of there: nor dots the Moon in Opposition of the Sun from Cardinal Signes, he being posited in the eighth House, meanly augment here into; perhaps a great Reason why this Native is to far perswaded into the Belief of such things as before I have re-

If we may credit the learned Casaubon, Enthusiasm (in some Men) is an Ornament to their Parts; and he seems to prove Cicero and Demosthenes, cum multis alia, embertered by it: nay, he avers, there was hardly any excellent in any Faculty, but in some sense he was Enthusiastical. If therefore this learned Person be so in some measure, it is no great Wonder, he having an earthy Signe ascending, the Lord thereof in Opposition to it, and d in the Ninth, in an earthy Signe, in Trine of 12, Author of Melancholy.

Being ared 39 years, he obtained a Benefice: \mathcal{M} . C. at that time directed $ad \triangle \circ \circ$, and the Sun to their Sextiles, and all in the eleventh House.

A Collection of divers choice Nativities.

From the 41 year of his Age, to the 53. he was troubled with Sectaries, could not be quiet in his Living, (it was indeed in our late Times of Confusion) but yet he overcame them: he had to vex him Ascendent ad 80, and M. C. ad 84; and to help him, Ascendent ad Spicam m. & So, and Oad A.

His learned Minister died in the prime of his years; viz. before he had accomplished 32 years of Age; ha-

ving then two malignant Directions operating together: (1.) The Afcendent ad Opposium Maris: (2.) The Moon ad Opposium Saturni; and both of them with and without Latitude; which was the main Reason of their Estects proving so faral.

In this Nativity there are divers good Arguments of a good Divine, and a great Scholar; and such this Native was. (1.) The Sun Lord of the Ninth, in Trine to the Ascendent. (2.) The Moon in Trine of 3, Lord of the Ascendent, and both of them in Platique Sextile with a Planet in the ninth House. (3.) 4 and 5 their being in exact Trine to each other. The Opposition of 4 and 3 might denote him somewhat Enthusiastical, and give him a greater Measure of Zeal then ordinary; and that he was known to have all the time of his being a Preacher, which was near upon seven years.



felf) have offered to present the same again unto the World without Correction.

Concerning his Oratory, he saith, that he had a good loud Voyce, but it was harsh, and he lacked both Grace and Comelines: which seems well fignish by 2 Conjunction with 9 in Ascendente, there afflicted by the prefence of Canda Drawins, and p. Qualtile, and in Combastion of the Sun. (3.) He attained to great Dignity, and was eminently honoured for his eminent Skill in Science: which is lively denoted by the Essential Dignity of the Sun; and both he, 2, 9 and 3, cashing a Trine to the Angle of Dominion and Soveraignty, the Sun having Exaltation there: then 1, Lord of the Ninth, is in Conjunction of Him the Fish, thence emitting their benign Rays to the Boroscope. All eminent Arguments of Honour, 6, 6.

Plurarch tells us, that his Nurse was told by a Vision, that she gave suck to a Childe, which in time to come should do great good to all the Romans. And yet he was but the Son of a Bond-woman; or at the best; of mean Extraction: which occasioned juvenal (when writing of the force of Fate) to bring him in, as an eminent Proof thereof, Sat. 7.

Si fortuna volet, fies de Rhetore Consul; Si volet hac eadem, fies de Consule Rhetor. Vemidius quid enim? Quid TULLIUS? anne aliud quam Sydus, & occulti miranda Potentia Fati.

And in process of time, he was twice made Consul of Rome: and for discovering and preventing Catiline's Conspiracie, he was by Cato called, Pater Patria, The Father of his Country.

He died in the 64 year of his Age, he having underwent the chiefest of his

Miseries in his grand Climacterical year.

Being in Exile, he was by a Prodigie forewarned of his Death, viz. a Shole of Crows coming toward the Ship in which he was failing, and ferling upon the Mast thereof; at which being terrified, he went to Land; but the Crows (as if not satisfied till they had done their Errand) followed him even to the Chamber-Window where he lay; yea, some of them to his Bed: which caused his Servants to hasten him out of Doors into his Litter for Sasety, (hearing of his Enemies approach, and deeming this strange Army ominous) and behold! he was betrayed by a Youth he had bred up, into the Hands of Herrenius and Popilius Lana, who basely murther him. Thus ended this samous Person by the Violence of the Sword; who in his Listetime was wont to say,—Cedant Arma Toga.

Let Sword and Shield give place to Gown; And give the Tongue the Lawrel Crown.

His famous Judge was a Person both Pious and Prudent, and very full of Charity and true Piry;

Qualities well becoming a Judge, and very aprly portended by the friendly Trine that Q casts to the benign Planet U, he being posted in Signum justicia, and the great Dignities of Q. Nor did this eminent Person want a laudable Portion of Ingenuity, Learning and Oratory; as is aprly signified by Q her Partile Sextile to Q, the natural Patron of Ingenuity and Oratory, &c. as also the Sextile of the Sun and & and their friendly Aspects to the Ascendent.

This prudent Person in the 58 year currant of his Age, but 57 compleat, died suddenly at Kingstone upon Thames, near London: having then the Sun directed ad Quadratum Saturni.



N this Revolutional Figure, the Signe of the Sixth House ascends the Horoscope: and &, Lord thereof, is in Opposition of 4. 

His learned Person (though a Lawyer) had the happy Unhappiness to be engaged on the Kings Behalf

in the late Cruel and Unnatural Wars; and in the year 1647. (at what time our then gracious Soveraign was a Captive by an unheard-of Fate, unto those that had sworn Allegiance to him) was this worthy Person sequestred


for his Loyalty. He had then the Mid-heaven directed ad [] D, and the Afcendent ad & O & h. And by reason of this Mis-fortune (which for his Loyalty and good Affection) be sustained, and seeing no probable Hopes (in those times) of amendment, he fell into a deep Melancholy, which held him near seven years, viz until January 1654. at which time he died thereof. It is remarkable, that in these seven years time, he had many unfortunate Directions operating: viz. @ ad & &, & \ \mathrm{Q}; and \ \mathrm{D} ad \ \mathrm{G}; Asc. ad C. A. &, & C. A. 4. And at the time he died, he had the odirected ad & D in domo Martis, he being but little palt the 12, Lady of the Eighth, and wanting but a little of the I h: the Moon was then under the C. A. of h, by Direction. All which considered, it was little less then a Wondershe combated with his Distemper so long. That Melabcholy should be the Didemper by which this Native should expire, is very eminently denoted by h, the Natural Patron thereof, his afflicting both Luminaries, and he in his great Dignities. The Fortunes in *, made him fa nous in his Profession, viz. the Law. Din * of Q, and O and Iin * of S, gave him both Personal and Intellectual Abilities to manage the same. But all these Endowments, both Natural and acquired, were compelled to yeild to a cruel Fare: and herein was the Wife-man's Words made good, ____ The Race is not always to the Swifts -- nor Riches to Men of Understanding.



The Lord of the Ascendent, and Lady of the 8th in the Radix, in this Figure are in exact Opposition from Angles; and the Lumin ries are in Oppolitionallo. The Figure of Heaven is nearly in Opposition to what it was at Birth ; ergo , most dangerous to Life. it seems experienced the Truth thereof in himself) that, at times, he gave Dr. Fisk (my honoured Friend and Tutor) an hundred pounds for the Calculation of his Nativity; as I have heard the Doctor several times to report.


To denote this Native apt for the Study of the Law, here is &, Lord of his Ascendent, in Conjunction of the Sun, in domo Tovis, and both of them in Sextile of handin exact Trine to the Ascendent. 14 also is very strong in his Exaltation, in a friendly Trine of the Moon; and the Moon is in Conjunction of 2 and 2, in the House of 3. Which Arguments do also admirably well denote his great Parts: for in his time, there was hardly any Man (of that Profession or Study) that equalled him , much less surpassed him. And to denote his great Fame, we finde, not onely 14, the Significator of his Pra-Stice, in his Exaltation, but h, the Lord of the tenth House, in his Exaltation also; and (according to his Latitude) in Conjunction (almost) of that Noble fixed Star called Spica Virginis; and in Sextile of the Sun and &, who are in Conjunction of Cor Scorpii, another eminent and Kingly fixed Star. He died in the 48 year currant of his Age: had then the Sun directed ad 82 Hin ve, a place that H fo eminently hates. If any ask why the Sun ad I h, might not kill as the other ? I answer : h hath no Dignities in the Eighth nor Fourth Houses; so hath 14 in both. (2.) h respects ve, where the Direction fell; and although he were strong, yet was like a Noble Enemy, scorn'd to kill, although he had a Power.

Thus much for this Nativity.

Shall fay no more of this Nativity, then in my Book, entituled, Natura Prodigiorum , I have already faid; and fhall therefore refer all those that are curious after the fearch of this Nativity, thereunto for their fatisfaction: where also they may finde fomething rouching the vanity of Sigils, Lamens, Spirits, Prophecies, Charms, &c. things that this learned Author did mightily countenance in

his Life-time; but a little before his Death, did retract them as Errours, and things vain, idle and superstitious; as I have therein proved: and to that purpose did I there print this learned Persons Nativity; as also to shew the world,——That some Persons were born to spread and promote Lyes and Deceits, as others to believe them.

Eing more acquainted with this eminent Physicians general then particular Fame or Fate, I shall chiefly observe the Regions thereof in his Nativity, and refer the other to be scann'd and confidered by those Artists that shall have the advantage of the Knowledge of the Accidents of his Life, better then my felf. That this Native should be of publick Honour and Estimation, is very plain from

this Scheme of his Birth: for herein we finde Cardinal Signes possessing the principal Angles; as it happened in Charles Gustane's of Sweden, and Oliver Cromwel's Nativities. 2. The Sun, a general Significator of Honour, is in the Ascendent, and in Trine of 4, who is exalted in the tenth K k

Houte, and in exact Trine to the Ascendent alto; besides, they are both with eminent fixed Stars. (3.) The Moon, Lady of the Tenth, is in Conjunction of Q, Lady of the Ascendent, and both in * to 8' their Dispositor, in the Eleventh.

This Native (at what time, I could by no means learn) left his own Country, and came to England: and notwithstanding the many learned Physitians that this Nation did afford, he was accepted of beyond them all, and sworn Physitian in chief to King James; an Honour that sew Aliens any where attain to. I am informed he died anno 1654. at Chelsey, near London: the Ascendent at that time was directed ad Quadratum Saturni, near the Storpions Heart.

I Shall not need to observe any more in this Figures then I finde already, done in an Appendix to an Applogie for Astrologie, published lately by my loving

Friend Mr. Vincent Wing: the Author of which Appendix, is Mr. F. B. and my very good Friend also; who hath responded both like an Artist and Scholar to Gassendus's chief Objections against Astrologie: for a fight of which, I refer the ingenious Reader to the Appendixit self; and shall here onely present him with what relates to the Scheme: Viz.

Here you may see the malignant Planers hand & have the chief Dominion in his Scheme. his the Lord of his Horoscope. Peregrine, Retrograde, in his Detriment, and unfortunate in \$\otin\$; which made his Lungs much oppressed with Phlegm rotten and corrupt: of an ill Habit of Body, very fickly, subject to Catarrh's, &c. That for Manners, hin Quartile of &, both in ill Aspect with the Ascendent, made him of an evil Disposition; envious, suspitious, revengessel; angry peevish, contentious, injurious, fraudulent; a Lyar, a Caluminator, an Imposior; Covetous; a Robber of orher Mens Honour; a salle Friend, a persidious Traytor, a nororious Hypocrite; an Atheist; and (to say no worse of him; then he does of Mr. Des Cartes, though unjustly) a Toad swelled with Pride and malicious Venome; as you may see in the Book against Des Cartes, and other of his Works.


As he had & in Sextile of &, and in the House of &; so he had a Wit apt enough for Mischiefs, Quarrels and Contentions; sharp in Ditputations: as in Quartile to the Moon, so it was turbulent enough; and had not & applyed to a Sextile of & also, he had been so ill nature, that he had not been sociable: but that good Aspect gave him so much Wit, as hypocritically to dissemble it, and cloak it under Zeal to Religion; and make that seem the Severity of his Devotion, that was the Moroseness of his Nature.

But if we go further, we shall finde it agree with the Accidents of his Life, as well as his Disposition. About the time the Medium Cali was directed to the Sextile of the Moon, we finde he had a Journey into Holland. When the Sun was directed to the Trine of 11. he was made Praposition Diriensis:

where for the most part he was Non-Resident.

During the Effects of the Sun to the Trine of Q, and the Mid heaven to Q, he was made Mathematical Professor. Upon the Direction of the Moon to the Quartile of B, he had an Inflammation of the Lungs: which also returned upon him again, when the Horoscope was directed to the Body of B, and after to the Quartile of B; which produced a Consumption: in which Disease, his Physicians being over-free of his Blood at threescore and threes brought him to that excelsive weakness, that he never recovered; and died whining, that his too nuch obsequious so to their Prescriptions, had snatchthim out of the World in virial senetture. Take his Friend Borellus Relation and his own Words, Observ. 11. Cent. 3. Possem his viri semper lunguidi mortem dolorosam toi Europa, imo mundo recensere, imini illo remedio sanguineo, & verba ab ejus ore deprompta referre quibus ante obitum fassus A sum obsequio perisses. & cum heroe suo ad inferos cum viridi adhuc & stante senettute descendisses.

His learned Doctor was a Practitioner in Physick threefcore years, and had fingular success therein; which is plainly known from the

great Dignity of the Lord of the Tenth, and the Position of ${\cal Q}$, Lady of the fixth House, in the Mid-heaven, between the Sextiles of ${\cal U}$ and the Ascen-

dent

dent. He was excellently well versed in the Mathematicks, viz. in all the parts thereof; chiefly in Aftrologie and Aftronomy: in which Sciences, it was my good Fortune to have and receive Instructions from him: and no other Tutor had I ever; nor indeed needed I any, he being the ablett and the best (for Instruction of Tyroes in those Mysteries) in his time. So excellent he was, that in all respects, I am perswaded (and dare undertake to predict it) that England will scarcely (in many Ages) produce his Equal; and yet I am confident that this Nation hath brought forth as many excellent Sons of the Mathematicks, as any Nation in the World, and may again. The Reasons of his Excellencie in these Arts, is, (1.) The great Fortitude of 2, he being not onely in his own Honse, but Exaltation, and in the ninth House posited, which of Attrologers is termed Domus Scientiarum. (2.) 14, a Fortune in the Ninth, in Trine to the Ascendent. (2.) A Platique Trine between the Moon (who is Governess of the Ninth) and 1, and a great Reception also. (4.) Q in m, (a Signe fignifying great Ingenuity and Study) casting an exact * to the Ascendent.

Although his Skill was great, and his Rationative Faculty very strong, yet his Elocution was but mean; which made many to fet the lower Esteem and Value upon his great Acquirements: this I conceive may be occasioned by the Platique of h tog, and D her being in to one, and & to the

other.

The Lord of the Second strong, and the Sun in Trine to the Second, together with Part of Fortunes being in the Eighth House, gave this Native a competent Estate of Annual Rent, near 100 l. besides great Gains by his Practice: Yet the Position of To upon the second House, in Opposition to the Part of Fortune in the Eighth, destroyed all again; so that it was this learned Natives Fate to die not worth much: yet by reason of 11's great Arength, viz. his being in Exaltation, and in Trine and Reception of the Moon, &c. he was not absolutely necessitated, (it is true) but carried Matters even with the World; and so left a good Name, though not a good Eflate, behinde him.


After this worthy Person had lived 84 years of Age, (partaking both of good and bad Fortune) he died of a lingering Consumption, attended with a Meagrim toward his last days: He had then the Ascendent directed ad &

His Native was (in his time) the most famous Oculift living in England; and did very eminent and

wonderful Cures unto the Eyes of many, both Men, Women and Chil-

dren.

In his Nativity, we finde the Moon in &, (her Exaltation) in Trine and Reception of Q; and the Sun (the other Luminary) is in Conjunction of \(\psi, \) who is Lord of the fixth House; and both of them in Trine to &, the Lord of the Tenth, viz. the Angle fignifying Physick, &c. and he exalted in the Ascendent. Besides, if (as some Attrologers contend) we should allow Reception to be an Essential Fortitude, here are no less then five Planets effentially dignified in this Scheme. All which confidered, might aprly denote this Native not onely fortunate and successful in the Practice he used, but famous and eminent for the same: for it is a great Truth in Astrologie, The more Planets there be effentially fortified in any Nativity, the more splendid and spreading is the Natives Fame and Honour. Let his Condition be what it will, still (quoad Capax) this Rule holds true.

Being aged 49 years, viz. in the year 1653. this Native (as I have been told) died of a Fever, and a spice of the Stone: He had then the Ascendent directed ad & 3, sum Latitudine.

There was at the same time the Sun directed to the Head of Hercules, a violent fixed Star of the Nature of &. 
¥ His our Native, is not onely an accomplished Scholar and Phyfitian, but a very excellent Chymid:

as his several Books on that subject already published, &c. do sufficiently prove. To denote which Aftrologically, he hath me, the most ingenious Signe of the whole Zodiack, ascending the Horoscope; and &, Lord thereof, is in II, in Sextile of & and Q, (who are in Conjunction in the eleventh House) and in Trine of h, the Moons Dispositor: and to addito these, the Sun and Caput Draconis very confiderably (by their presence) fortifie the House of Phylick.

Howbeit, this Native hath been subject to Mis-fortunes, as Imprisonments, &c. very much; which are aprly (in the general) occasioned by the Sun his Partile Opposition with 14, and both of them being in Quartile to the Ascendent; as also by h his being in Platique Square to the Sun. Which Politions Altrologers tell us, portend to the Native many Vexations, Crosfes and Contentions: Scandals, Envies, Conspiracies, Suits in Law, &c. of all which this Native hath largely participated. But besides these general Arguments of evil, he hath had the Sun by Direction to the Opposition of the Moon: bendes, notorious Transits, &c. as in 1655. and 1656. H was upon his Ascendent, and the Quadrate place of his Sun, and M.C. And in 1650. If was upon his M.C. and the Suns place, near fix moneths together. And the latter part of 1661, and beginning of 1662. & was passing over the opposite place of his Moon near seven moneths together: such prodigious Transits that are not commonly known to succeed one another at so swift and malignant a rate.

But a time there will be for those turbulent Significations to pass away. and good ones to possess their seat; and this will be, when I hath once passed the opposite Points of 2. M. C. and O.


Aving not the time of any of the Accidents that have happened to this ingenious Native, whereby to verifie his Nativity, I shall be the. briefer in my Ob-

fervations thereon. First, here is the latter part of m ascending, and d, Lord thereof, is posited in me on the tenth House, thence casting a Sextile to the Horoscope: an eminent Argument of an able and learned Phylitian. Secondly, there is a Sextile of hand &, which declares a sharp and serious Understanding, and a Judgement capable of any mysterious Knowledge. It is not improbable, but that this happy Configuration (for such it is) between h and 2, they being both near eminent fixed Stars, might encline this Native to the Study of Chymittry; in which Science he hath had such fingular success, that his Application or Medicines hath been, and is, (mottly) by way of Chymical Preparation.

A Collection of divers choice Nativities.

Thirdly, the Fortification of the tenth House by the presence of the Sun. 2, and \(\Omega\); and the Lord of the Ascendent his being in Conjunction of \(\mathbb{U}_s \) and the Moon applying to his Trine, give the Native not onely good Fortune in his Profession and Practice, but great Credit and Esteem thereby. Indeed he is so highly respected for his Parts, and the success which attends them in his Practice, in Leicestershire, the place of his abode, that there are hardly any other Physicians who have an equal Honour with him; as I have heard several Persons of that Country to aver.

He is also Attrological, as the former Arguments do aprly intimate; and that may be me eminent Caute of his fo great success in Physick: for it is impossible for any Man to make a good Physitian, that is not acquainted with Astrologie.

Native was pleafed to communicate (by his own hands) his Nativity unto me, fome years fince, and gave me also an account of some

Accidents that had befallen him, by which I might be enabled to correct his Geniture truely, viz.

1. Anno A atis 17. he went to the University of Cambridge: the Ascendent came then by Direction to the Virgins Spike, a Noble Star of the Nature of 3 and 9, and of the first Magnitude.


2. Being aged 20 years, he was married: the D (who in this Nativity is Lady or Governess of the *Medium Cœli*) was then directed ad $\triangle Q$.

3. Being near 30 years of Age, this Native commenced Doctor of Physick: he had then the Sun directed $ad \square \mathcal{U}_0$ and \mathcal{U} exalted in the Tenth, and Radically in \triangle thereunto.

4. Anno 1658. he was troubled with a Rheum in his right Eye, in the moneths of June and July: 3 was then upon the Quadrate place of the Sun in his Nativity, and upon the Radical place of the Moon: L was at the same

time Stationary in his Ascendent: all dangerous Transits.

The Nativity is partly the same with Sir Theodore Mayern's; and (notwithstanding so grand a Satellitium of the Planets in the eighth House) it is no inconsiderable one for a Physician: for the fortunate Planet 4 is in Sextile unto four of them there, and they respect the Mid-heaven with the fame friendly Aspect. All which argue not onely Fortune, but Honour unto the Native in and by his Practice; and most eminent Advantage from things fignified by the eighth House, --- whether it be by the Lands or Goods of Persons deceased, or by Legacies, Deeds, Wills, Administrations, or Portion of the Wife, or by all: his good Directions mult acquaint him, and point out the time or times thereof. The Dignities of both the Fortunes, and their friendly Aspect to each other in the descending part of Heaven, (were there no fuch Knot or Conjunction of Planets) must have fome more then ordinary Significations toward the middle or third part of the Natives Life. But I transgress, while I glance at things particular, when my Business is onely of Generals. Let it therefore be remembred, --- Whoever is born under such a Position of Heaven, cannot but make a good and forsunate Physician.



Shall spare to speak of the several Accidents that have happened unto this ingeniously learned Natives they having been very little (if

any thing at all) answerable to his Deserts or Merits. This is a Nativity that may well make the Native(that is born under it)ingenious and industrious in his P-osellion, rather then fortunate or rich thereby: for here is the Moon in the Dignities of \mathfrak{P}_3 , in exact Δ to the Sun and \mathfrak{P}_3 near eminent (though violent) fixed Stars; in the eleventh House; and all three of them are in good Aspect of the Ascendent. But then to darken their good Significations, and prove the truth of the latter part of my Assertion; here is the Moon in \square of \mathfrak{P}_3 , \mathfrak{P}_4 and \mathfrak{P}_3 ; and \mathfrak{P}_3 (though in it his own Dignities) is besieged of the Infortunes; and the Sun and Sure in exact Opposition to his Part of Fortunes.

Any man versed in the Genethliacal part of Astrologie, will easily see, that this Native high passed a great many very dangerous, and some very good. Directions: all which, have (according to the Letter of Astrologie) had their Significations on the Person and Assirts of this Native most exactly.

i observe, that the Moon in good Aspect with some Planets in the eleventh Hose, and in evil Aspect with others there, gives the Native, some faithful, and some perficious Friends; and our Native is eminently sensible of the same. Argol says, hand dill affected, and posited in the Eleventh, declare sem, and faithful strings. Prol. parv. p. 153. This Native hath sufficiently proved the same to be true: for some pretending Friendship unto him, were the occasion of his probable ruine, when he was in a very flourishing Condition; and afterwards perswaded him into a willing and voluntary Exile: which in the latter part of the year 1658. or beginning of 1659, he consented unto; and accordingly left his Native Country. The Ascendent was then directed to the of o, and *of h, who is Lord of the Ninthin the Nativity.

And indeed it is no wonder that that Native is of an enquiring Brain and Fancies, who hath the Lady of his Ascendent in Conjunction of 3, in the House of \$\frac{1}{2}\$; and \$\frac{1}{2}\$ in Conjunction of the Sun and Dragons Head; and in exact Sexule of \$\frac{1}{2}\$, who is the Moons Dispositor. Nor is it a mean Argument of Ingenuity and Apritude in him to Science, that hath one Planer governing both the Ascendent and ninth House, as is in this Nativity; it is a Position that happens in some of the eminentest Genitures of Physicians before mentioned. The Moon being Lady of the Tenth, and in Opposition of \$\frac{1}{2}\$, and \$\frac{1}{2}\$, doth abate much of that Splendout and Fame other Physicians enjoy, whose Parts (perhaps) may not be so meritorious and deserving, as are our Natives. Being aged nineteen years, he had the Small Pox, and that to purpole:


the Sun was then directed ad & Martis, cum & fine Latitudine.

Being aged thirty three years, he was afflicted both with Dropfie, Ague, Scurvey, &c., and this in fo strange and tedious manner, that very sew of his Friends believed that ever he would have recovered thereof again: the Sun was then directed ad Corpus Saturni, both with and without Latitude. He had also an ill Revolution that year, and to but a little before, transiting his Alcendent a long time together.

There are divers other things to be observed in this Figure; but these I have already taken knowledge of, being of the most Practical Concernment to the Sons of Art. I shall forbear all further Discourse here-

His ingenious Native gave me the Tempui assimatum of his Geniture fome years fince, with feveral Accidents to

correct it by: which with my Correction, take as followerh.

1. Anno Ætatis 6. he lost his right Eye by an unhappy Accident: the Sun in his Nativity was then directed ad 6 D. S. L. Origanus says, Solis ad Luna corpus directio, &c. denotes danger to the Eyes, and sometimes brings blindness, &c. the truth of which, this Native sufficiently experienced: but besides this Direction, the day of his Revolution that year, & was upon the Radical place of the D, and the D then applying to his Cl.

2. Aged 11 years, he had an Ague, &c. the D was then directed ad & h.

cum Latitudine; and O ad o D. cum Latitudine also.

3. Aged 21 and 22 years he was much apted to study Physick, and chiefly Chymistry: then was the Ascendent directed ad Sextilum Jovis, Lord of the Tenth, and the D unto her own *: Singular Directions for such an Undertaking; and so they have proved to this Native: for of himself, and by his own Industry, (his Family having had the same Mis-fortunes with others in our late times of Consuson, viz. of being Plundered, &c) he became a Physician; and by Go D's Blessing upon his Endeavours, hath done a great deal of good therein; and is arrived to a considerable Credit and Repute thereby.

4. Aged 27 years, he had a very violent Fever: the @ was then directed ad 3, and the D ad Pleiadum: Directions of so dangerous a tendencie, that had not the D at the same time been directed ad Trinum Jovis, (according to Natural Causes) he could not have escaped Death at that time.



having done the same in one or two Books already by him published; viz. in The Harmony of the World, and The Holy Guide. In which taid Books, he hath been to plain with himself, (as best knowing his own natural Inclinations an Dispositions) that since Cardan's time, I have read and heard of but few Men to ingenuous.

That he should be apt to enquire after many curious Arts, and occule Mysteries, and make them his quondam Studies, is plainly seen by the great strength of g. Lord of his Ascendent, viz. his being not onely in my his own House, but in the fourth House, and in the Degrees thereof, which Astrologers hold (and that truely) to be his Exaltation; and this in the Imum (ali; and the Moon is in m, in exact Sextile unto him, and holding the tame Airect with 11, who is in Partile Trine of the Sun.

Now the Reason why I bring his Geniture among those of the Doctors and Students in Physick, is, in regard he hath writ several things of Physick; as in his Holy Guide, the way to prepare most Chymical Medicines, naming them particularly; and then a Treatise of Rose Crucian Physick, printed some years since: and in several other his Books, something or other tending thereunto. Divers other Secrets he hath published, which (because they come not within the Perimeter of my Apprehension) I shall in modelly junge tenderly of them: but the grand Reason why some persons cavil at him for them, and that they are not (by many Men) with other things equally relented. (though perhaps in themselves may be as deserving) is, the Quartile of the Sun and &, and the Suns beholding the Ascendent with the time Aspect; and hand 4 their Quartile from Cardinal Signes likewise. Howbeit, it is Wildom for every Man to judge tenderly of what he doth not understand. I may also note further, that of in the Ascendent, in Quartile of the Sun, doth aprly fignifie his being subject to Imprisonments, and to the Frowns of great Persons, &c. as it happened unto him in the late times of Usurpation and Tyranny; of which himself hath largely made men-.noir.



His Nativicy was calculated by the Natives own Hand, (for he is Aftrologically , as well as Phylically, inclined) and some years fince given unto me by himfelf.

Herein we finde = ascending, and Q, Lady thereof, in Opposition of & in the Tenth: but by reason of the double Disposition that here is between the chief Significators, viz. & his disposing of Q, and D her disposing of d. and the common Amity that is between of and 2 naturally, the Effects of their Opposition are very much abated. Howbeit, of as posited in the Tenths will have his Signification; which is, (if we believe, not onely Authors, but Experience) to subject the Native many times to Hazards and great Dangers, tog ether with an eclipse of Honour and Estimation: all which this Native hath confessed to me to be true. And to add hereunto, here is the Moon in Oppolition of h, and both in Quartile of u; which in many respects premotice the Native in the course of his Life, and will not permit him (sed cum difficulture) to mount high in the World. Nevertheless, these Arguments of Unhappiness operate no manner of way upon the Noble part of him, although they do upon his publick Concerns, as Estate, &c. For here are feveral good Testimonies of Ingenuity, and of the Natives aptness to the Study and Practice of P vsick, Oc. viz. The Ascendent fortified by the presence of a Noble fixed Star. (2.) 14. Lord of the Tenth by Exaltation, his Time to the Ascendent, and Sextile to the Sun, who to be olds the Ascendent likewife. (3.) The Moon, Lady of the Medium Cali by House, posited in her Exaltation, (though in the Eighth) thence catting a Trine to Q, who is Lady of the Ascendent. (4.) A fortunate Sextile between hand g, being posited in the third House. All which are proper Arguments of Ingenuity, and a ni nble active Fancie; both of which, this Native hath a very good title unto.

I could have he'e presented unto the Reader several Accidents of this Natives, and the Reasons of them from Directions, &c. in his Nativity; but I onely take Cognizance of Generals: and conclude herefrom, That bad Testimonies in a Nativity, in relation to Honour and Fortune, cannot enervate the good ones that are therein of Ingenuity and Study; and of this I could give a

His Native hath been fubject to Variation, and manny and eminent Troubles in the whole course of his Life; as Cauda Dra-

plainly portends. But notwithstanding his many Missionenes, Imprisonments, Law suits, &c. that he hath been extreamly subject unto, yet still in the end he hath met with Assistance convenient to draw him out of those troublesome Wires: and this may be portended very well, by the San his being in exact Sextile of 4, and in the same A pect and Reception of h, who is Lord of the eleventh House; as also the Moon her being in Trine of q.—

For it cannot be, that that Native can long mant Friends or Assistance, who hath in his Geniture both the Luminaries befriended by the Beams of the Fortunes.

To descend to particular Accidents. About seven years of Age, this Native by a Blow had like to have lost his Right Eye: the Ascendent was then directed ad $\theta \odot$; and had not the same Promittor been at the same time directed ad $\Delta \mathcal{L}$, it's very probable that he might have lost it quite.

Aged 19 years, a deep Confumption, Scurvie, &c. which lasted with him a great while, viz. near a year and half: Ascendent then directed ad \square h, and a little before the \odot had been directed ad \square 1.


Aged 21 years, he married, (and that a confiderable Fortune:) the Sun was then directed ad & Q, cum Latitudine.

Aged 30 years of Age, he was imprisoned upon a publick Account, but soon released; and a little after, viz. about 31. being with a Company of resolute Persons, among whom there unfortunately happened a Man to be kill'd; this Gentleman, together with the rest, was said hold on, and put in Prison: but after much Trouble, Scandal and Cost, was acquitted. The M. C. was then directed ad & &, with and without La itude.

The Quartile of 3 and 2 with 2, and Sextile of 3 and 2, together with the Sun his Sextile and Reception with 5. Lord of the Tenth, might make him a Physician, and that an able one: but the Moonbeing in Opposition of 3, together with what was before urged, doth, in some respects, eclipse his Fame and high Deserts, and prevents his Merits shining.

Present the Reader with this Geniture, just as I received it from the Hands of the Native himself, he having been his own Calculator; and therein (as I

by enquiry have found) he followeth the Tables of David Origanus. This Native both been a Student in Astrologie, and in Physick; and is at the present a Member of the Inner-Temple, and a Student in the Laws. For to denote him inclineable to Sciences, he hath in his Nativity a Sextile of & and \$, and a Trine of \$\pm\$ and \$\pi\$; \$\pi\$ being in exact Sextile to the Ascendent. and 2 (who is Lady of the Ninth) in the same Aspect with h. Lord thereof; as also an admirable Recept on between of and q. Greater and more numerous Testimonies of a sharp Fancie, and an active Understanding, are hardly among an hundred Nativities to be found: and had this Native had ut Education, suitable to his Inclination, (for you must know, he hath been his own Guardian and Appointer in the several Studies he hath followed) he might have proved an abiolute Encyclopadian. But this is an umans in Reason onely, and not to be cirectly favoured by Attrologie. For to shew that his Honour and Fame should not equal his Fincie and Inclination, we finde a malignant Square between the Lords of the Ascendent and the tenth House, and this nearly from the Eighth and Twelfth Houses of the Scheme; and the Moon is in Quartile of the Sun and a also, and the very Degree of the

These latter Configurations did not onely hinder this Native in his Education, and subject him to Employments Antipathetical to him in his Youth; but in his riper years hath occasioned much Prejudice, many Scandals, and Troubles in Law, and otherwise, to invade him: the Patticulars of which, he being so generous and free of minde to discover them himself to any one; I shall in this place forbear to mention any of them in particular; and so conclude what I have to say of this his Nativity.

THe Signe alcenaing the Ho olcope is ve, a Signe of Brevity; and h, Lord of the Ascendent, is in 8, a Signe of Brevity alio, and the Moon in the fixth House decreasing in Light: all which are Arguments of a middle Stature, and somewhat a spare lean Body : Complexion darkish or swarthy; hair dark brown; Visage more long then round: Eves quick and piercing, &c.

And the Person of this Native was exactly such. He was also sull of Agility, very active and nimble: which I presume was occasioned by the Moons Position in the House of g in Sextile to 3, and h in the House of g, having South-Latitude.

His Temperature, according to Astrologers, should be Melanchely, Cholerick, as is plain by an earthy Signe ascending, and he's Position in an earthy Signe also, and the Moon being among Marcial fixed Stars, and Stars of the same nature in the Ascendent, are very strong Testimonies of Choler prevailing over this Native. But the greatest Argument of Choler predominating, I take to be the Suns Reception with &, from violent Signes; which seems to signific that Choler should over-power the Humour of Melancholy, notwithstanding an earthy Signe ascending, &c.

He was indeed of such a Temperature: I remembred to have heard him confess, that Melancholy was an extraordinary Enemy unto him; so great at sometimes, that wanting Company he would seem like a dead Man; and at other times would his Choler macerate him very strangely; yea, more oft then the Distemper of Melancholy.

g, the Patron of Ingenuity, & c. is the most potent Planet in the Figure; and he being in m, the House of &, and so near the benign Beams of Q, argued the Native to be of an excellent Wit, sharp Fancie, admirable Conception, and of an active Understanding.

For proof of this, let his many worthy Works now extant, be summon'd to give in Evidence: viz. (1.) His Translation of the Dispensatory, so exquisitely done, that the best Physician need not be ashamed to own it. (2.) His English Physician: a Work of such ratity, that never any Herbarist before him durit adventure to do. (3.) His Astrological Judgement of Diseases from Avenezra and Durret: in which he hath so ingeniously solutioned the Text of his Authors, that if any Copies may be presumed or thought to improve, or excel their Originals, this very Book of his doth so.

He was very eloquent; a good Orator; spoke both freely and fluently. And if I shall speak the Truth in all parts, he was very conceited, and full of Jests; as the Quartile of 3 and 2 aprly denotes: but the Knack of Jesting was so inseparable to him, that in his writing things of most serious Concern-

ment, he would mingle matters of Levity; and extreamly pride himself in so doing; as is evident in all his Writings; but the Poets excuse is sufficient:

Quadam cum prima recensentur crimina barba, Indulge veniam Pueris.

"Some Faults with our first Beards are shav'daway;
"And Youth (if any) pardon mesit may.

The fixed Signe zer is on the Cusp of the second House; and the Moon His Estate, and the casting their friendly stays thicker, and the spin the House of the visit.

The Lord of the Second is Retrograde upon the Cusp of the Fourth, in Quartile to the second House; and a his Dispositrix Combust in Quartile of S, and in Quartile to the Second also; which plainly portends a Consumption of Riches, and a Deltraction of what Partimony should descend unto him from his Parents. And S afflicting Pars Fortuna, in in obscure House of the Heavens, and opposing the Second; and the Sun, Dispositor of the Part of Fortune, in Opposition of E₂, caused him to squander away his Estate both carelestly and negligently, and sometimes by reason of restraint or imprisonment.

It is most true, that he was always subject to a Consumption of the Purse, notwithstanding the many ways he had to assist him. Indeed he had a Spirit so far above the Vulgar, that he contemned and scorned Riches any other way then to make them serviceable to him. I could parallel this his Generosity with Arguments of the same stamp, from some Genitures very eminent; but I am confined. I shall close my Discourse of his Estate with this:

Had not he had Caput Dracons in the Second, he would have been perpetually poor: for the Arguments of Povesty in his Radix are sich, that had he been born to Crasum Estate, he would have made it like to that of Diogenes.

The third House hath Signification of Kindred in general, and short Jour-Kindred nies; and &, Lord thereof, in & in the eighth House, the most unfortu-and short nate place of the whole Heavens: as saith Ludovicia de Rigis, — Nusta Journies, divisio Circuli time pessional, tamque crudelis in omnibus quam uttava est. And he being there in Quirtile of four Planets, viz. O, & hand &, is an Argument of great intortunacie to the Native from his Kindred, and indeed no great happiness to him in his Inland Journies. Besides, who being on the Third, and & in a sterile Signe, portends very sew, or no Brethren or Sisters to the Native: and in this case the sewer the better.

It would be too tedious to make repetition of the many Mif-fortunes this Native hath a ffered by his Kindred, and the Perils and Dangers he hath escaped in travelling or going short Journies. It is confirming enough of the Art, that he never gained good by either. Nor had he ever any Brethrens of c.

h the general Significator of Fathers, and Q the particular in this Nativity, are in Opposition; and S. Lord of the Tenth, in Quartile to both, and that from fixed Signes, together with Q her being Combust: all which clearly

denote, that the Parents of this Native should die before him: but had they lived, I cannot see in Art how he should have been bettered by them, their Significators are so squaring and opposing his. He hath often averred that his Father, according to report, died before he was born; and his Mother lived till the twenty third year of his Age: and a good Estate he acknowledged that they did leave him; but he was cheated thereof.

wife and Children.

D, Lady of the Seventh, in a double-bodied Signe, might feem to denote two Wives: but Q, a general Significatrix of Wives, being Combutt, and in evil Aspect of the Infortunes, seem to contradict it; and that to strongly, that did she not cast a friendly Beam to the Alcendent , and another to the Seventh, he would hardly have ever married: but that is an Argument that once he should.

Q being Governess of the fifth House, and in m a fruitful Signe, irradiating both the Ascendent and Seventh friendly, signifies that the Native may have many Children : but Caput Medufa being upon the Culp of the Fifth. and 2 Combust, and in Opposition to It, that Enemy to Nature, and all natural Existencies, and in Quartile of &, a Planet posited in the House of Death, prefages that very few of them (if any) shall be long lived.

This Native had but one Wife. (viz. Mrs. Alice Culpeper, now living, and Wife to john Heydon Eiq;) and by her he had ieven Children, (although himself died your g) but they are all dead but one, which is a Daughter.

His Enemies, both publick and private, are fignified by 14 and the Moon; publich and but principally 11, because he hath great Dignities both in the Twelith and Seventh Houses. & also will have a share in Signification of his Enemies. because he is in Trine of 11, and Sextile of the Moon, and beholds the Lord of the Ascendent with a Quartile. Now if the Quetion be demanded what kinde of Person these Planets signifie? & will signifie Physicians, Apothecaries, &c. and & Divines. And those two kinds of Men and Professions should be his most potent Adversaries, both publick and private; & the most publick.

It is notoriously known, that his most publick Enemies were Physitians, and his most private ones Divines. The first hated him, and made their Hatred publick, for his discovering the use of Medicine in his Mother-Tongue. The second did disgust him for his studying Astrologie: but neither of them durst to enter the Lists of Dispute with him, albeit I remember he hath made publick Challenges to some in print, who pretended to fault his doings. Whereby it appears, that the Doctors questioned not, or cavilled at the matter, but the manner of his Writings: They were not simply forry that fuch things were done, but that he that did them was not one of the Colledge, a Brother of their Order. And the same may be said of his other sort of Enemies: but well said Invenal,

> Refert ergo quis hac eadem parit, in Rutilo nam Luxuria est, in Ventidio laudabile nomen; Sumit, & a censu famam trahit.-

- "Much odds in Men, doing the felf-same thing,
- "Feasting in Rutilus is rioting:
- "But in Ventidins brave Munificence,
- "And gains him Honour by his great Expence.

The Saying needs no Application; from his Enemies I will therefore deficend to his Friends,

And those should not be many: for &, Lord of the Eleventh in Quartile to four Planets, denotes the Natives Friends, or at least such as pretend Friendship

Friendship unto him, to be hypocritical and deceitful; and of such coverous Reserves, that he shall seldom be bettered by them. His own acknowledgement was, that he had divers pretended Friends, but he was rather prejudiced then bettered by them; and when he most stood in need of their Friendship and Affiltance, then they most of all deceived him. But this was not to him alone, 'tis generally Morbus Mundi, the Diftemper of the whole World; like that of the Poet:

> Rari quippe boni, numero vix sunt totidem, quot Thebarum porte, ant divitis ostia Nyli.

- "So rare true Friends, and fuch in number few,
- "That scarce so many can be found below,
- " As Gates of Thebes, or Ports of wealthy Nyle.

Origanus, fol. 699. tells us, that the Sun in the Tenth House, (as in this Honour an Nativity) is a certain Argument of Honour and Preferment and Q, a ge-Prefermen neral Significatrix of Honour, being in the Tenthalfo, portends the same. D in Sextile of S, and O in Reception with him, he being Lord of the Tenth, are certain Arguments of Honour, Fame and Renown: and indeed had not h, who is Dominus Ascendentis, been in Opposition to the Sun, the general Significator of Honour, &c. and in Quartile of &, the particular Defigner thereof in his Radix, the Native would have obtained a far higher Degree of Honour and Preferment then he did; but he was an Fnemy to his own Preferment: Yet neverthelets he did in the latter part of his Life increase very much in his Reputation, and his Honour and Fame were generally taken notice of. If you would know by what means he should attain Fame and Credit, &c. Dbeing in Sextile of &, Lord of the Tenth, and Q, Lady of the Ninth, locally in the Tenth, thence cashing a Sextile Aspect to the Ascendent, and Q. Lord of the Sixth, there also, being the strongest Planet in the Figure: All which Arguments hid together, prefage his Fame and Honour to come by fludying Arts and Sciences; and that he should rife in the Opinion of the World, chiefly thereby: but this not without tome difficulty, as & his Quartile to 2 aprly fignifies. It is very well known that he gained his Honour by Arts and Sciences, but chiefly by Phylick; in the knowledge of which, he was most excellently skilled: and it was purely by that alone Study and Practice that he hath left a Name behinde him, which will remain until time shall be no longer.

The fiery Planet & in the eighth House, in Quartile to h, Lord of the As-what death cendent, and three Planets more, seems to portend a violent Death: but he might die the Sun being upon the Cusp of the Mid-heaven, near the Body of Q, and in Reception with of and the Moon in the Sixth, in Sexile to him alto, takes off the edge of that suspition, and abates much of the Fury of &, and seems rather to portend the Native to die of a Consumption, or by a decay of natural Strength at the Heart: (& is in A.)

I have heard it credibly reported by some that were with him at the time of his Death, and constantly in his Sickness, that he died of a Consumption which had been long upon him; and much Means (and that of the better fort) was used to enervate it, but it still prevailed upon him, wasting and consuming him by degrees, until it reduced him to a very Skeleton, or Anatomy; and afterwards, viz. on Munday the tenth of January 1653, released him, and gave him his Pasport to a better World: The Moon then being in Quartile to the Radical place of &, and the Sun in Quartile to his own, and to the place of h in his Nativity; h and 4 being then in a direct Opposition.

Nor was it truely reported, that some Physicians designed his Death, by ferting their Engines at work to poyson him. I do believe they were Enemies great enough unto him; yet I am confident, by this Report, they are egregiously scandalized, it being customary for Ill-will to speak the worst.

The Accidents by which this Nativity was verified, are these:

Aged 18 years, he went to the University: O to the Body of &, and the Ascendent near the Sextile of the same Promittor by Direction, caused that. 1634. He being bred up a Scholar, and fitted for the University in his younger years, upon the M.C. ad & g, and D ad Q.

Aged twenty four years, began to study Physick, the D being then directed

to the A of & her Dispositor in the Radix.

Aged twenty seven years, he then went for a Souldier, and was wounded by a small shot over the forepart of the Body, which he never recovered of 1643. till his dying day; and then the Ascendent came to the of of and presently after to the of h by Direction. Directions of so evil Tendencie and Import, that might very well have ruined any Man.

. Aged 38 years, he died. The Ascendent then coming to an Opposition of of with Latitude. The Revolution it felf being the same with that of the Radix; h passing by the Radical place of &, and & upon the Ascendent , O and 1 in [], and 14 upon the opposite place of o, and in [] to h's place also: which ill Revolution agreeing with an ill Direction, necessarily portended Death.


NATIVITIES

ci. OLIVER CROMWEL, Of 2. RICHARD CROMWEL, 2. MASSIANIELLO.

Artificially and Historically confidered.

I. Of OLIVER CROMWEL.

Liver Cromwel was born at Huntington in England, on St. Mark's Day, at 46 m. 49 fec. past three of the Clock in the Morning, 1599. after our Vulgar way of reckoning: but Astronomically, on April 24. 15 h. 46 m. 49 sec. Post Meridiem. The Heavens then being as fol-



IN this Genience we finde the Regal Signe V ascending on the Eastern Finicor, as a most certain note of this prodigious Natives Defire of Soveraignty and Rule, and of the Tyranny he used when he ruled : ir being the Delight of of and Exaltation of the Sun. Next, we finde the three superiour Planets essentially dignified, and the other four in a friendly Trine of

each other; and both the Luminaries, and the greater Fortune, in Sextile. Which eminent and remarkable Testimonies , most plainly argued the greatness and miraculous Honours and Atchievements of this notorious Person. And if these Arguments be but duely and seriously considered, the Actions and Attempts of this Native, need not amaze or amuse any one, he being from his Birth ordained for prodigious and mighty Attempts in general, and to be a Scourge to England in particular. And indeed whoever he be, that hath h in 12, in Oppolition to of in γ, he may, it's true, be fear'd by England, but never lov'd; and let his Pretences be what they will, his Actions

must prove destructive toit. But this obiter.

Altrologers tell us, - Folicissima erit Geness, in quatres Planeta fuerine in fuis domibus, aut Exaltationibus, &c. "That cannot but be a most happy "Nativity, in which three of the Planets [much more the three superiour Place nets are found, either in their own Houses or Exaltations : Vid. Astrol. Aphorist. p. 305. In this Nativity this Aphorism is most exactly verified : and in truth, his Nativity was most happy to himself, though dettructive to many others. It is a general Rule also among Artists, That in what Gentlare soever Cardinal Signes possess the Angles of the Figure, that Native is egregiously eminent, and violent and tyrannical in all his Attions: The truth of this was verified in the Nativity of Carolus Gustavus King of Sweden, as welland as largely as in this Natives.

Had this great-spirited Person (for such a one he was; and as it was said of D' Amboyse in the Tragedie, Nature had breath'd a Minde into his Entrailes, to swell into another great Augustus Casar! had he, I say) been any thing but English, he had been the most accomplish'd and to be admired Perfon in the World! (as he was , he lived not onely the Wonder , but Terrour of it.) But for a Subject of England, (so born, and sworn to Obedience and Allegeance) not by Degrees, but by prodigious Leaps, to attempt the Soveraign Rule thereof, and this through the deepest of Difficulties, viz. the bleft Blood of his facred Soveraign; whose Priviledges he had vowed to defend, and Person he had sworn to preserve; leaves such a scar upon him and his most daring and adventurous Actions, that the Canker-worm

of Kero will never be able to eat out, nor the Mois of Time of Quantity sufficient to cover.

Presuming that divers Artists will be curious in the scanning and perusing of this Geniture, I shall, for their Assistance, and prevention of Trouble, present them with a Catalogue of several Accidents of his Life, and the Directions, &c. that were (in an Aftrological sence) the proper Occasioners of them: and (with no small pains to me) they are these following.

1. In the year 1640, this Native (in hopes he would have proved honester then he did) was by his Countrey elected a Member of that terrible long Parliament: and this was his first visible step M. C. ad \ Directio to Honour and Preserment; and the Direction that occasion'd felicitatem delignat circa Negotiationes, & in omnibus actionibus fortuna- this, was the Medium Cali ad Caput Draconis. He had then

alfoa good Revolution, and 11. (though but weak) was then tum, &c. Orig. upon the Mid-heaven of his Radix.

2. In the year 1642, being adjudged by the Rebels a fit Villain to fink the

Oath of Allegiance in opposing his Soveraign, he was made a Colonel of Horse; having some short time before discovered Dad Corm, natoaliquam affignat dignitahis rebellious Heart, by raising a Troop of Horse at his own temaquæ tandem mali a-Charges, under the Command of Col. Sir Philip Scapilton : liquid inimicitia ac forthe Moon was then directed to Antares, or the Scorpions midine junctum appor-Heart; an eminent Martial and Jovial Star. tat. Orig.

3. In the year 1643. he was (for his whining, diffembling and villanous Zeal to the Cause) elected Lieutenant-General to the Earl of Manchester : he now began to be a Rebel in good earnest: the Moon was then directed ad

Trinum Martis.

4. In the year 1644. this Native quarrels with the Earl of Manchefter ; and the Earl, believing himself to be the better Man, prefers divers Informations against his Lieutenant-General in Horosc, ad t. &, efficit Parliament; but to no purpose: for Crommel quickly acquitnatum Cholericum, teted himself; and in despight of the Earls Teeth, he would ride merarium, & variis generibus scelerum & flathe Fore-horse; and did. To occasion this Trouble, he had h gitiorum fese implican-

all that year upon his Ascendent, being the Radical place of &, and his own opposite place : he had also then the Ascendent di-

rected to the Terms of d.

5. In 1645. this prodigious Native was made Lieutenant-General to Sir Tho. Fairfax; and now his Trophies begin to spread apace: Dad * h. natum po- the Moon was then directed to the Sextile of h. Lord of the tenth House in his Nativity; and under this Direction, he at tentibus viris profpera

& fœlici commendatione last routed Fairfax.

notum facit, Magnos etiam gloriæ & honoris actus discernit, &c. Orig.

> 6. In the year 1648. he contends with the Parliament, and contested with the Levellers; by which means he underwent much difgrace: he also now laid the Plot for the Murther of the King. An eminent Lady hearing of which, (as I have been credibly informed) went unto him, and defired him to forbear so vile an Action, for the Judgements sake it might bring upon the Kingdom, if not for the Perjury himself might be guilty of, and the whole Parliament also: unto whom he angerly, and like a Tyrant, reply'd, Madam! forbear to move me inthis matter; for by the Life of GOD he must die, and the world cannot fave him. He had now the Sun directed to the Quartile of h, and his Part of Fortune to the Opposition of Q.

7. In the year 1649. having done his Villany in England, and hearing of fome Matters that might prove Impediments to him and his defired Soveraignty, in Ireland, he in haste marches over thither to allay the Fury of what

that Opposition portended. He was fortunate in that Undertaking more from his general then particular Fate: yet he was fick in Ireland of a Flux and Fever; the Moon being directed ad Quartilum proprium, and Contrantisci on of 11.

8. In the years 1050, and 1651, having been glutted with Success in England and Ireland, and his Irch of Soveraignty still prevailing, (being drunk with the same Ambition as was Rollo Duke of Normandy, (and in some sence a greater Pride) who was always crying, (as rendred by the Tragedian) A Crown , a Crown ; O facred Rule now fire me!) he marched into Scotland to subdue all Opposition theres that endeavoured to confront his Aims. And having struck through the Life of his Soveraign Lord King Charles the First, before, is resolved to ride thorow to his defired Stage, mangre all Opposition; and at Worcester now Arikes at the Life of his present sacred Soveraign: but Go D preserved him from his infernal Claws, for England's surure Happiness. Howbeit, Crommel came off a Bloody Victor; having then the Sun directed to his own Sextile; and the Re-

volutional Figures of those two years, most singularly fortunate

in all things as to his own particular Interest. 9. In the year 1653. this Saint in Grain, (after many religious Quackeries, Chears, Villanies, and bloody Actions by him committed in the fear of God) he made himself the usurping Protector of England; dissolv'd the Parliament, o'c. It is observeable, that when he came to turn out his Masters, the Rumpers. (such was his then hatred to Superstition, that) he cayed out at the fight of the Speaker's Mace, Away with this idolatrons Bable! yet

afterwards held it no Vanity to have three such carried before his Tyrantship: He had now the Sun directed to the Body of 11, and to the Sextile of the Moon, and the Part of Fortune to the Sextile of Q. I need not tell you how this Villain made use of the basest of Instruments in the best of Professions, to uphold this his usurged Dominion: viz. both in Law, Divinity, and Astrologie; allowing them liberal Pentions for their Services performed on his behalf.

10. In the year 1654. the better to fix him in his Chair of Usurpation, (as if he had been a lawful King indeed) he concludes a Peace with France by the Means of Cardinal Mazarine, and patches up a League with Sweden, by the pains of Mr. Whitlock a tum, Martialium perfo-Lawyer, (afterwards one of his Lords) whom he fent Ambassadour to Smeden: the Part of Fortune was now directed ad Trinum Martis.

11. In the year 1656. (being jealous he was not fast enough rivetted in this his usurped Power) he calls a counterfeit Parliament to confirm him in the same; and by this Convention he was sollicited to have taken upon him in Name, what before he had boldly affumed in Substance, viz. the Title of KING; but he refused: so they confirmed him in Westminster-Hall (but what he was before) an usurping Protector. Fortune was now directed to a Sextile of b, Lord of the Tenth; a good Revolution, &c.

12. In the year 1657, this politick Native, intending to grasp as much as he could, and hoping to make the Country of Flanders partake of his pious Parts, he fends a bleffed Bird of his own hatching over thither, viz. Sir John Reynolds, with fix thousand Men; and this valiliant Person takes Dunkirk from the Spaniard: but Sir John,

knowing his Friend Oliver's Wiles, was unwilling to undertake this weighty Affair, until he had been advised by Lilly what the Success thereof would amount unto; and therefore gives him his Nativity to direct him by. But Lilly being Sir John's Masters Creature, viz. Oliver's, would never predict any thing contrary to his blessed Patron's Undertaking: and so deals by Sir John, as in the Swedish Business he did by Sir G. A. one lost his Life, the other his Honour. Howbeit, Oliver's Designes went on somewhat the better for this Parasites Knavery: for he had now the Sun wire eted to a Sextile of \$2.5 a sit time to advantage himself by Traytors and Tepanners.

13. In the year 1658. upon the third day of September, this Troublet of England died at White hall in London; (a Palace never butle for him.) This was a day remarkable with him; which he idolizing in his Mock-thanks to God Almighty, it pleased God to give Satan leave 400 put a Period to his Tyrannies: which he did, having before fent him a Monition of his intention, by a strange and prodigious Storm of Winde, the like hath seldom been known. But he whose Head and Heart were full of the Tempest of Tyranny, Murther, Dissimulation, Perjury, &c. in his Life-time, it could not be expected but Nature should give a Groan to be delivered from him at the last. The Ascendent (which is Hylech or Giver of Life in this Nativity) was then directed to the Quartile of the cruel Planet Mars in Cancer his Fall; and

this in the fourth House of his Radix, viz. the end of all things. For a Proof of the Concurrencie of Revolutional Figures with Directions, I shall present you with his last Revolutional Scheme: which (because it is eminently considerable) take as followeth.


N this Revolutional Figure, we finde (as most ominous and fatal) Treturned to his Radical place, in Opposition to the Afcendent of the Radix. and the Lord thereof; and in of 1, and this in the fourth House, viz. the Grave, or the end of all things. And as a fit fecond to fo remarkable and cruel a Pofition, here is &. Lord of the Ascendent of the Radix, in Conjunction of 4. Lord of the Eighth thereof; and

that

that upon the Cusp of the Fourth of the Nativity, though twelfth House of this Figure.

All which dangerous Configurations, Positions and Transits, concurring with such malignant and cruel Directions, as before I have largely noted, might very well (as indeed it most seasonably did) proclaim a most fatal year unto the Native, and happily put a Period to his Life.

At the very moment of his expiring, the Sun, who is Fons Vitalis, and Lord of the Sixth in the Radix and Ascendent in the Revolution, was in Conjunction with &, Lord of the Ascendent of the Radix, in the eighth House, viz. the House of Death, near unto the Radical place of the Moon; and \(\varphi\), their nimble Dispositor, in the Radical place of the malignant Planet \(\varphi\); and the Moon in the Radical place of \(\varphi\), in Opposition to them both, as may be seen by the following Figure.



THus much for the Nativity of this eminent and prodigious Perfon; whose Resolution was fuch that he never attempted any thing but he accomplified it, though furrounded with a multitude of Difficulties. And now I am mentioning his Resolution . I remember a Comical Story of a Scotch Minister concerning him, as (I have heard) was delivered in a Pulpit; which for the

Jests sake I shall relate, but not commend such Doctrine in a Preacher; The Minister being in the midst of his Sermon, makes a start therefrom, and accosts his Auditory (after a Rabble of News) with this wild Question, viz. Beloved, ken ye Cromwel? ken ye Cromwel the English General? Marry Ise tell ye what he is; he is one warfe then the Devil; and Ise prove it too: for the holy Scripture saith, Gif ye resist the Devil, he's stee from ye; but gif ye resist Cromwel, marry he's slee in your face: therefore Cromwel is warse then the Devil. Indeed he was a Person of a mighty and undaunted Resolution; and (as by his Nativity appears) had more thereof then he had Reason: yet Success often-times made his Resolution seem Reason. He was always a Victor; was never conquered by any Opponent, save that, which Hercules himself could not withstand, viz. his last Antagonist,

Observations Astrological from the Schemes of his beginning and ending.

1. δ in γ , is an affured Argument of a Victorious Person, and of Valour alio; but more especially if γ shall ascend in the Nativity.

2. The Moon and g in Trine and Reception, (as here in his Nativity it is) makes a Man a Turner up of Councils by the root, and a Destroyer of them at pleasure.

3. Sand hin Opposition, makes a famous Rebel, (Seeing Lord of the Ascendent:) and both in Square of 4, makes him observe Law and Religion for his own Ends.

4. All the Planets under the Earth, (as here they are, except 3) when they promife Honour, Dignity and Renown, they generally perform it in the latter part of a Mons Life.

5. The Lord of the Eleventh stronger then the Lord of the Seventh, the Native overcomes his greatest Enemies: here it was so. This was verified also in the King of Denmark's Nativity. See Nuncius Astrologicus.

6. The Returns of the superiour Planets to their Radical Places in any Revolution, portends a faral year to the Native. If an ill Direction concurs it is unavoidable; unless by Prayers and Tears prevented.


7. The Lord of the Ascendent and Lord of the Eighth of the Radix, in Conjunction, is dangerous, although the Lord of the Eighth be a good Planet: for every Planet performs his Office according to his Relation, and the Power he hath in the Figure. Thus 4 and 2 may be Infortunes per accidens, and 5 fortunes; though per se they are otherwise.

8. The Curp of the Sixth of the Radix ascending in a Revolution, and the Lord of the Sixth thereof in the Fourth, are Arguments of a dangerous year.

II. Of RICHARD CROMWEL.

Ichard Crommel was born near Huntington, in the year of our Lord 1626. on Ottober 4. 13 hours, 57 minutes, Post Meridiem. The Heavens were then posited, as by the following Figure is represented.

THis is the Nativity of Richard Cromwel; a Person who had the Impudence to precend a Right to the Government of England, Scotland and Ireland . upon no other score but because Goodwin, Owen and Nye, (Oliver's Creatures) swore it was his Fathers Will upon his Death-bedsthat he should succeed in the Government. It is very probable

the old Gentleman might be prodigal enough, to give that away which was none of his own; and these Men might swear the same truely; but yet methinks Richard might have considered what had been his Fathers Right to have given him; for he could not but know, that his Father was never born to the Crown of England; nor himself neither, which in some fort was the better and more deserving Gentleman.

But now to the Figure Astrologically. To be plain, it is one of the meanest and poorest Nativities that ever I yet saw or beheld (and I have seen five thousand) for a Person that was a Governour or chief Magistrate over three Nations especially. For here is not one Planet essentially dignified in the whole Figure; scarcely one of them truely in his own Terms; which is the very meanest of Essential Dignities. And if the Fortifications of the Planets promise Happiness, their Debilities must necessarily shew ill success.

But then divers will be apt to object, --- If his Nativity be so bad , how came he to so great a Fortune? I answer: What he enjoyed was rather a Mis-fortune then a Fortune; for he was but a Pageant or Stalking-horse to the Pside of others, and onely served their Ends and Aims, as a Protector of Clouts might have done. Howbeit, in a qualified sense, I allow his titular Honour was very great; yea, so great, that you see it quickly sunk the Ship of his waning Fortunes: but I deny that this titular Honour was an Effect of his own Nativity, but of his Fathers. As Maximilianus Stampa attained all his Honours, Dignities and Preferments by the Grace and Favour of Sforza, Duke of Millain, he taking a more then ordinary Affection unto him: fo this Native came to be vested with the Government, and the Honour of supreme Magistrate of these Nations, not by any particular Configuration, Polition or Aspect in his own Nativity, but onely as he was the Son and Favorite of Oliver his Father; who did what he could to leave him a friendly Legacie. Indeed he happened to have about that time some good Directions operating, and that hope to make amends for his ill Radical Pofitions.

Now, that you may know this to be the true Nativity of this Person, take these

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these following Accidents, as compared with Directions, and they prove the true Rectification thereof.

1. When Richard Cromwel was 31 years of Age, viz. in 1657. being then a Hunting, he had the Mif-fortune to break his Thigh by a Fall from his Horse; of which he ever after continued lame, and is like never to be cured. He had then by Direction the Ascendent to the Body of h. Lord of Fifth and Sixth in his Nativity.

2. Being aged (as before) viz. in July 1657. he was (with no great Affeation of the University) elected and installed Lord Chancellor of Oxford:

but, Poor Man! he understood but little of Latine, notwithstanding Needham reported him to make an elegant Return to the Vice-Chancellor's Latine Oration to him: which could be indeed no other then the Mute to Morois in the filent Woman, viz. by Signes with his Leg, and an infolent Nod or two, to inform them of his impudent Acceptance. But to bear him out in a greater piece of Confidence, (had a greater matter been offer'd him) he had now the Medium Cali ad Trinum Solis per Directionem operating in his Nati-

3. In the 32 year of his Age, viz. in September 1658. after the Death of old Oliver his Father, he was proclaimed (in his flead) Protector of England, Scotland and Ireland, &c. and had many Addresses from all parts presented unto him in a Congratulatory way, (asir was then sycophantickly worded) all promiting to live and die with him, they acknowledging him to be the undoubted Heir to Englands Crown. And to add to these Ignes fathi, out comes a quacking Aitrologer in his May's Observations 1659. (at what time poor Richard was turn'd out of all) and predicts like a fawning Parafite, ___ That the English Lord Protector now enters upon the Stage and manifests himself to the whole world, that he bath sound Abilities to govern, and found Judgement to distinguish both secret Enemies, and sneaking Friends : he is abundantly courted from leveral parts of Christendome, &c. - Richard Lord Protestor of England Stoops not, is not terrified with words, provides for all occaffons. And towards the months ends ____ Is made happy with welcome News, &c. And in his general Prediction of Lyes, he writes, ____ Let no mans heart fail; the Sun feems to us to thine as well on the prefent Lord Protector his Attions, as on his deceased Fathers. Thus did divers parasitical Wretches chant forth their Fictions and lying Elogiums to this their new Saint Richard: all Functions and Arts, &c. were made Hackney-Heraulds to proclaim (what the Heavens were totally against) the Continuation of this Pageant of Regality. Upon which I remember a learned English Artist thus Poetically writes:

Coptain Wharton's Calend. Eccles. 1660. in March.

But where be those fine Juglers did Address Such sugred Phrase, such smooth Obsequion fness: That vow'd to live and die mith Richard, yet Ne'er blemisht, when they saw his Glory set? Such Hypocrites, run with the stream of things, And will keep Time whatever dance begins.

At this time Richard Crommel had no Direction but the Part of Fortune ad Trinum Veneris, and the Medium Cali ad Trinum Solis in Gemini, London's Ascendent, (not fully over;) which in divers respects were good, but I deny that they were of force to make him so noted a Spectacle: and indeed,

had not his Happiness (if so it may be termed) in that Action been dependant upon his Fathers Fate, nothing in his Nativity (as I faid before) could ever have brought such a thing to pass.


4. Being aged near 33 years, he presumed to call a Parliament: but when they met, they thought him a little too bold, and therefore begin to question how he came by that Power he had; and finding no fatiffactory account thereof from him, they call the Power into their own hands, and so eased him of the Burden of being chief Magistrate of England. He was now overtaken by a Direction of the Medium Cali ad Quadratum Saturni; a Direction of most cruel import, as by the Text out of Origanus de Effectibus, & c. appears .- Ac in specie Medii Cali ad corpus Saturni

F we confider this Revolution never fo seriously, we shall finde it a most malefick one to all Intents and Purpofes. Forbesides the beforementioned Evils, here is the Moon with Cauda Draconis in the Twelfth, and the place of Canda in the Radix culminating: all portending plainly what then befel him.

Upon the Confideration of all which fad Significations, I took the Liberty in the time of this Rebels Reign, (as hundreds

are able to testifie) to prognosticate his Downsal and Ruine. At which my Opinion, many learned and ingenious Persons seemed much to wonder. Unto whom I constantly replyed, "That it was more my wonder and altonish-"ment that ever young Richard should have an opportunity convenient to " climb up to such a monstrous height of Honour, then that at such a maliti-" ous and direful time he should loose or be deprived of the same.

The Head of Medula in the Medium Cali, and Q, Lady of the tenth House in the Fourth, in Conjunction of Antares, or the Scorpions Heart, and in Square to the Ascendent; and 2. Lord of the Ascendent, in Conjun-

ction of S in \approx ; and the Moon in A. (though in Conjunction of Cor Leonis) and void of course in the twelfth House in the Heavens; are no singular Testimonies (by the Consent of the the most Learned in Astrologie) of an illustrious or Princely Nativity! Indeed they signifie the quite contrary; as unto this Native hath been sufficiently made appear.

Seeing the Luminaries in friendly Aspect of each other, and u in good Position of the Ascendent and Part of Fortune, and none of the Significators

Position of the Alcendent and Part of Fortune, and none of the Significators of Life afflicted by the Beams or Bodies of the evil Planets, either by Direction or Configuration; it is probable he may live to an indifferent Age. The forty second year thereof will be dangerous unto him, in respective via e for then the Moon (the Fountain of all Natural Power) will be directed to the Body of harpoonup points of the Moon in the Radix, who is the Signification in the Direction. And so we mildly take our leave of Richard Cromwel, as himself did of

his Protectorship and Honour.

Astrological Observations on the Scheme of Richards Nativity.



III. Of Massianiello the Fisher-man's Nativity.

Assimillo the Fisherman of Naples, was born near Naples, in the year of our Lord 1620. on June 19. five hours, twenty nine minutes after Noon, under the Latitude of 41 Degrees; and the Figure of Heaven is as followeth.



His Gentleman in the beginning of the feven and twentieth year of his Age, (notwithstanding his poor, obscure, nay, scarce known Original) begins to oppose the Power of the King of Spain, under pretence of crying down the Gabels and Taxes: (as Cromwel did the King of England, by perswading People to labour after Liberty of Conscience, and a Free-

dom from Tythes.) And in few days had so ordered his business, that he was become the Head of an innumerable factious Multitude; who being at his beck and command, followed him at the heels of every Undertaking: and to satisfie the people, would not directly in words oppose the King of Spain; but as if they intended as religiously as the best, their common Cry was, Viva Dio, Re di Spagna & Massianiello: Let GOD live, and let the King of Spain live, and Mathaniello live alfo. By which Means he encreased his power dayly; and as his power encreased, his Commands issued out accordingly: Some of which were, That the People under pain of Life and Firing, should have Lights (every night) in their Windows: so that he made streets as light by night as by day. And that all should go en cuerpo without Cloaks, and the Bishops and Priests without Cassocks; and Ladies and Gentlewomen were commanded not to go abroad in wide-hoop'd Gowns or Kirtles, because they might not convey Arms underneath them. At length, Massianiello concludes a Peace with the Vice-Roy, and thereupon becomes his Companion, having his Wife cloathed in Cloath of Gold, and himself as rich: all Tribunals were shut up, and no Person was obey'd but Massianiello, who did even what he pleased: commanded Gibbets to be set up in divers places of the City: which struck great Terrour into the Hearts of all people. While Massianiello was acting these unparallel'd things, he had the Medium Cali directed to the Trine of the Moon, which occasioned the Rabble-Rout so to adore him; as

also to the Virgins Spike, a most glorious fixed Star: but as Ptolomy himself saith, Although the fixed Stars do defigne admirable Preferment, yet the Honour they bring, ands in unusual Calamity, &c. And thus it proved with Massianiello.

For after all his great Acts performed, and the Peoples honouring and adoring him; the raising of his Kindred, suppressing and destroying of his Enemies, and doing whatsoever he would; behold! a Company of venturous Blades hearing he was in a Church, went thither, and found him airing himfelf, and there they surprized and dispatched him, and cut off his Head: at which Action of theirs, and unfortunate end of his, the people never grieved in the least, but dragged his Body up and down the City, with great Acclamations of Joy, that so famous a Rebel was departed; and afterwards they intert'd him in a Dike. He had now the Ascendent directed to the Opposition of L.

Thus fell this bold Fisher-man of Naples; a most unparallel'd Fellow, and of as egregious a Fortune. He Reigned (saith my Author) as absolutely as any Soveraign in the World, for the space of eight days and eight hours; and we may say, more absolutely then any Kings use to do; for they are restrained by Laws, but Massello was beyond the bounds of any: for during this short time, he caused to be kill'd by his own Order two hundred and fifty persons, and that suddainly, giving them onely time to confess; and unto some he would give none. In sine, he was thought to be more then a Man; and that what he ordered, was ordained by God himself. See Mr. Home's History of him.

Thus much in brief of the famous Rebel of Naples.

Observations on his Nativity.

1. Eminent fixed Stars on the Angles of a Nativity, declares prodigionfly ambitious Persons.

2. The Lord of the Ascendent weaker then the Lord of the seventh House, chiefly if the first be Cadent, and the last Angular, is a most certain Note of the Natives being overcome and ruined by his Enemies, let him be never so potent and mighty in Friends.

3. Directions to Planets in the descending part of Heaven, although they argue and procure the highest Felicity imaginable to the Native, yet it is not long durable. I could give infinite Instances of this truth; but this one being very remarkable, shall serves

4. Those Persons that have crowds of Planets in Angles; have at some time or other of their Lives, most remarkable and unexpected Fortunes or Mis-fortunes, according to the Nature of the Directions which happen.



Here present the Reader with one of the most remarkable Nativities I ever yet mer with (of a Su jeet's) in the whole course of my Stu lies; it is not indeed com-


monly to be parallel'd among the most illustrious Radixes: the nearest that I finde unto it, is that of Gustavin Adolphia the great King of Sweden; and that, Consideratio Consideranais, is not in many things so excellent a Geniture as this: as may be seen in the first Part of this Book.

In this Nativity, the Regal Signe & afcends the Horoscope, the last of the fiery Triplicity: 4, Lord thereof, is the most potent Planer in the Figure; he is posited in X, his own House, in Conjunction of the Moon, and both of them in Trine and Reception of the fortunate Planet Q: Q, the natural Par on of Ingenuity, &c. is not onely in II, but in Cazime Solis, and Angular: o, the Lord of the Eleventh and Fourth Houses, is posited in y, his greaten Dignities. But besides these singular Positions of more then ordinary Signification, it is very remarkable, and worthy to be noted, that in the whole Figure, --- There is not one Planet in his Detriment, Falls Peregrine, Ret Ograde, Combust, or in an ill place of Heaven. Which being told to an Artill in London, with a defire of his thoughts thereupon, he replyed hyperbolically, — That the Native must expett the Effetts of fuch Noble Significations in the other world: for he thought that this World could not afford him them. But certainly if the Stars have Influences upon humane Bodiess (as ellewhere I have sufficiently proved) they must be known before the Bodies Annihilation, and in the time of its combating with Mortality, or not at all.

I thell next celcend to some particular Accidents herein: as, (1.) When this worthy Native was aged five years, he had the Measels: the Sun was then cirected ad [] &. (2.) Ar eleven years, he was invaded with an Agne and Feven : [] wasthen directed ad & d', cum Latitudine. (3)) At 18 years old , he took a Voyage to Holland; which was the meldeut of attaining great Honour, &c. Medium Cali was then directed ad Q, Lady of the Tenth; and the next year following, he had @ ad \u24.

Divers other things may be observed from this Nativity; but having no particular Licente either for this have done, or for more, I shall forbear. I have advenuered to publish this, it being a Nativity so remarkable, and

fo worthy to be transmitted to Posterity.

His is the Nativity of that molt lea: ned Knight and Philosopher, Sir Christopher Heydon: the Author of that incomparable Defence of Indicial A-

strologie, written in answer to a Book published against Astrologie, by Mr. John Chambers: in which Defence, this learned Knight was to exact in his Responses, so satisfactory and full in his Arguments, so strengous in his Proofs thereof, that when once M. Chambers (who no queltion was a great Scholar) had seen and perused it, and found the same unanswerable, and his own Arguments fo fully refuted and retorted, he for very grief died. Divers others ince Mr. Chambers's time, have pretended to answer this unanswerable Work; as Vicars, Rowland, &c. who have fo far failed in their Enterprize, that they have (in flead of proclaiming themselves Scholars to the World) made themselves the very Pageants of Envy, Ignorance and Folly; and are gotten within the reach of learned Cardan's Lash before they knew where they were: - Stulti negligunt & contemnunt Aftrologiam, qui contradicit, ambitiofus est : qui maledicit, fatuus. Seg. 1. Aphor. 24.

The Book it felt is of such excellent Use, in that it answers all O jections brought against the Art, from Reason, Scriptures, School-men, Fathers, Councils; and that in so plain and familiar a way of Reasoning, that I should advile every young Student to acquaint himself therewith: that by it, he may be enabled to understand, first, what it is he would study; and secondly how to defend the tame against the malitious and ignorant Oppugners of the Art.

In the Figure, we finde II (the latter part thereof) ascending the Horoscope; and p, Lord thereof, in me his greatest Dignities, there in exact Trine to 1, and Sextile to 2: Arguments of very great Learning, Ingenuity, Sagacity and Prudence. The Moon is in a, in Conjunction of that Noble Star called Spica Virginis, and in exact Trine to & and the Medium Cali; which denoted in this honoured Native, not onely a sharp and active Fancie, which quickned him in his Studies; but gave him great Courage and Reso-Intion, &c. For you must understand, he was as well a Souldier as Scholar: and both by Sword and Pen did purchase himself such lasting Honour and Fame, that time will never wear out.


This worthy Native died in the year 1620. a little before his fifty ninth year of Age began; he had then operating by Direction the Ascendent ad

His Nativity was given me for the true one of this worthy Person : but any Accidents belonging thereunto, I could never obtain, excepting this, That he had

the hard hap to be engaged in Duels often; in which Engagements, three Men were flain by him. It cannot but be ill provoking him, that hath many Planets above the Earth; especially if they shall be in the Dignities, or in any Aspect of &, or near eminent fixed Stars; as most of them are in this

Geniture.

Geniture. Howheir, this worthy Native should by his Nativity have been a Person of a Noble Nature, hating to do or commit any dishonourable Act: for he hath &, his chief Significator, in the House or &, and in Platique Conjunction with her in the ninth House, in Trine to the Ascendent. It is true, the Moon in 2, in Trine to 1 her Dispositor, and to the Spin in w his Exaltation, and the House of &, might denote him of Spitit and Courage fo great, that he would fcorn to pass by Injuries or Affronts without taking notice of them: but that is an Argument of an Inclination and Minde rather honourable, then unworthy or low-orbed. And indeed in all his Geniture, there is not one Argument of an Inclination in him to Fiomicide, though it was his grand Mif-fortune (molt prob bly through high and insolent Provocations) to have his Hands stained with the Blood of three Men.

Having not other Accidents to verifie this Nativity by in particular, I shall



His Revolution for the year of his Death, was most ominous and cruel: for therein h was upon the opposite place of the Sun in the Radix, and that from the Tenth and Fourth Angles; the Figure it felf (almost) opposite to that of the Radix; and the fiery Planet & in Opposition to the Ascendent thereof, and very near the Ascendent of Birth; the Moon (also) was in Quartile to the Revolutional Ascendent. All which concurring with two such dangerous Directions, have a most apt and proper Signification of the time of this Natives Death, and of the violencie of it also.



Anno 1657. on May the 4th, this Native found to what purpose he was Knighted; for then he went General over 6000 Men into Flanders: the Effect of that Undertaking is known notoriously to have been mischievous; most of the Men were lot, and himself, with Colonel White, and others, as they were returning for England, on December 5. (the same year) were drowned.

On the day he went forth, viz. May 4. It was (almost) Stationary upon the Quadrate place of the Moon. His is the Nativity of a Gentlèman, whose Fate hath been (confidering his Capacity) as prodigious and remarkable, as ever any Mans is.

or was, or indeed is like to be. For he hath been employed in the great Bufiness of Drayning in Hampshire, and the Isle of Wight: in which as he hath had more then ordinary good Success, so he hath had more then common unhappy Fortune. He hath also had to do with the great Affairs of two eminent Kings of Europe, viz. those of Denmark and Sweden; and in the thirty fixth year of his Age compleat, and thirty feventh current, had a Commission as Colonel to raise a Regiment; and he did so: the Medium Coeli was then directed ad & . and the Ascendent ad Sextilum Saturni. But in this Undertaking he was also unfortunate; and by Treachery had his Regiment taken from him, when he had been at the Pains, Care and Charge to transport them: the Sun at the same time was also directed ad & Saturni, sum & fine Latitudine: which Direction being of more mischievous rendencie then ordinary, did not end its Effects here; but a little after he came over into England again, was engaged into a Law-Controversie for 200 % of his own money which he had made over to a Person in trust; which said Person for his defence, pretended a Bond of a thousand pounds which was forged against this Native, for payment of 500 % to a third Person; but after a year or two's Contest, he cast them all in Chancery, &c. and recovered his monies: he had then + directed ad Cor A, & Ascendentem, and a good Revolution to affift him.

Now, if you would know, why a Person of private Fortune should come to such publick Honour and Preferment; you must take notice that all the Planets in the Scheme of his Nativity, are, not onely (upra terram, above the Earth; but in the Tenth and Eleventh Honfes posited; and the Moon, 2 and 12 effentially dignified, and in good Aspect to each other. It is true, Cauda Draconis its Position in the Tenth, doth eclipse the Honour and Eminencie the other Politions so aprly denote; and h in the Eleventh, makes his Friends false-hearted, and his greatest Hopes oftentimes to faile him. And thus we see a Harmony between the Effects of Directions, and the Influences of general Politions.

His is the Nativity of Major General Lambert, as given unto me by a Gen'l-man that attended on him; and it is (I date be confident) the true one;

because it so exactly agrees with several eminent Accidents of his Life. As, (1.) In the year 1648, he received great Addition of Honour in the Army : Medium Cali was then directed ad Trinam jovis; an excellent Direction to lignifie the same. (2.) Being aged 26. he was made Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports: Medium Cali ed Q. (3.) Aged 37. he was made Chief Justice in Eyre, within the Forest of Dean: D directed then ad Trinam Maris. Aged near 40 years, he was made General against Sir George Booth : the Moon was then directed ad A Jovis. But this Direction happening in the seventh House, denoted the Honour it portended to be of no long continuance; nor was it. (4.) Aged 41. he was imprisoned in the Tower for being not conformable to the Rump-Parliament's Defignes: A little after escaped from the Tower, was proclaimed Traytor; and in Northamptonshire taken by Colonel Ingoldsby, and committed to the Tower again. He had then the Ascendent ad | Martis by Direction , and the Medium Cali directed ad & Luna, & Saturni, cum & fine Latitudine : which molt aptly fignified these Unhappinesses unto him. (5.) Being aged near 43 years, he was (with Sir Henry Vane) brought to Tryal at the Kings Bench Bar ; was found guilty of the Charge exhibited against him, and condemned to die for the same : but our gratious King reprieved him immediately, even as soon as his Sentence was past. He had now to prejudice him . @ ad & & by Direction; but to affilt him, the @ was directed ad Sextilum proprium. It is observable, when he escaped from the Tower, that h was upon the Cusp of the Medium Coli in his Radix , and of upon the Quadrate place of his Sun : and D in the Eighth, upon the Quadrate places of the Moon and h in his Nativity: then the which (together with the Directions before remembred) there can be nothing more plain to denote the Infelicity of that Undertaking.

And now (before I conclude this Nativity) to fhew the ingenious Artist a more eminent Proof of the Effects of an unfortunate Election. I shall prefent him with the Figure of Heaven, under which this Native advanced towards the North, to oppose General Monck; it being an Observation worthy to be known to Posterity. It is true, the Directions before noted, did generally

generally portend the unhappy (yet happy) iffue of that Undertaking. But the Minute of his advance being known; is a more particular Radix for then particular Action; and therefore more particularly to be confidered.

His was the true politure of Heaven , at what time Major General Lambert put his Foot in the Stirrup to march toward the North, to meet the valiant Lord General Monck, then advancing out 'of Scotland towards London; and a most sad Position it is, and exactly agrees with that Mijor General's Success he had by that unfortunate Underraking. As the Moon is in a Watry Signe, in exact Conjunction

of h, the cruellest and unfortunate of Planets, he had like to have been drowned in Tork shire, riding through a River toward his Army; where his Horse less than the mercy of the most merciles of Energies, the Water; from whence he with much ado, escap'd. Thus was his Beginning ominous.

mes, but on the countary, at such a time when the Lord of the Ascendent was
not onely in Darnissent; and in the eighth House, the most obscure place of
the Heavens; but was in Dos d'also, the natural Significator, and grand
Patron of War.

The learned Guido Bonatus, fol. 459. Saith, ——If he that sets forth to Battel, intend to obtain the Victory over his Adversary, he must either have one of the Houses of Mars ascending, or Mars in good Aspect of the Moon, Ascendent, or the Lord thereof. But in this Figure, there was no such thing: Ergo, it could not be expected otherwise, then that he should be worsted, and come off with loss in that Undertaking: chiefly, in that the Lord of the Ascendent is Cadent, and the Lord of the Ascendent Angular in domo Martin.

There are divers eminent Persons in London that have heard me relate the Miss-fortune that happened upon that Expedition. long before the Conclusion thereof; even as soon as the March it self was beginning. And indeed, had I considered nothing but the Moon her Conjunction of h in decima do-

mo, and Cauda Draconis in the Fourth, together with the Angularity of 2, and ill Location of 11, it had been easie to have pronounced (as then I did) No great Felicity or Pleasure in the beginning of that Undertaking; and nothing but bitterness in its end.

Should any enquire into the reason of this Major Generals coming off peaceably, and without any questioning in that Designe, (for so he did, though he was therein unsuccessful) it is eminently considerable, that the Lord of the Tenth applies ad Dom. Ascendentis, doubly; first, as he is a lighter Planet; secondly, as he is Retrograde; and the learned Haly says, sol. 85.—Si dominus Medii Coli applicuerit domino Ascendentis, juvabit, eum libere, & sine petitione. All England remembers, that while this (then) eminent Person was in the North with his Army, the Parliament at London voted him Indempnity, without the least request or desire from him, but freely of their own accord; being (it seems) willing to obliviate his present brillings, and force committed upon them, and indulge him a free Pardon, in Compensation of his former Adventures on their parts. This very Example may be of good use, and serve to instruct others,—That it is ill to strive against the Stream; and that no Man can thrive by fighting against the Fates. Beginnings are always deemed ominous.



By the Figure it felf, any Artist may discover the Native to be ingeniously Capations, and of Courage and Resolution convenient; yet most urbane, facetious, and civilly

disposed. For here is =, the Signe of Justice, ascending; Q. Lady thereof, between the Sewiles of the Sim and M. and almost in Reception with
the Sun; & (though in the Twelfth) is in m; (his House and Exaltation) in
Trine of the Moon, and in Sextile of 11 in & in the Tenth: these declare his
Ingenuity and Urbanity; and for his Courage and Valour, the Moon in
Trine of S. is of most eminent Signification. These things (1 say) are
plainly to be seen by the Figure it self: but I have a particular knowledge
of the Gentleman whole Nativity it is, and thereby have the advantage of a
more absolute knowledge of them, and can experimentally prove the Rules
of Astrologie (herein) to be good.

For his Courage and Valour, I can give a more then ordinary instance thereof: In the 26 year of his Age, viz. Anno 1648. he being then a Captain of a Troop of Horse in the Army, and observing the grand Villanies that were then a hatching among them, as the Black Remonstrance, and other to-be-abhorred things, he opposes the grand Ingineer Cromvel, therein, and publickly protests against such their Proceedings: for which they send him to Windsor Castle; where many years together he was kept close Pri-

There is another thing which I have been acquainted with, that in a great measure declared his Loyalty, and (the time considered in which he agitated it) his Courage also; and that was a Designe to surprize Windfor Castle, wherein he was Prisoner, and rescue his then sacred Majesty from the bloody Designes of his Enemies; of which I have heard it reported that Sir Richard Brown knew, who was then a Prisoner in the same Castle with this Native. But, poor Gentleman! his Designer sailed him, by the Treachery of some employed therein, to his unexpressible grief; yet it is no wonder; for he had now operating Medium Cast and I, cam of line Latitudine, a Direction of most cruef rendencie, and under which he hath laboured ever since and I am suspensible the year 1667 at white time the Sun will come ad I I, and D ad II; which will be the forty fifth year of his Age.

The Direction of the M.C. to T; was fo cruel to the Earl of Strafford,


King Carolus Gustavus of Smeden, and others, that their publick and prodigious Ends were occasioned thereby: and the Reason why it fell not out so with this Native, is this; He hath no Testimonies of a violent Death in his Nativity, and they had. (He hath but two of Imprisonment and Restraint, but those are unhappy ones; viz. D in Dh, from fixed Signes: the O, who is Lux temporis, is posited in the Twelsth.) Besides, it may be termed as mischievous unto him, as if it had the same Effect with him, as them: for notwithstanding his being both Gentleman, Scholar and Souldier, and a Person fit for any honourable Undertaking; yet such hath been the craelty and sorce of its grim Effects rowards him, that to all intents and purposes higherto, it hath prevented his rising to any Preferment.

If any defire to know the reason why Crommet and this Native should be such procisious Enemies to each other, (for without question had it been in this Natives power, he would not have favoured Crommet, any more, then he bestiended him) it proceeds from the Antipathy of their Genitures; for their Nativities are directly opposite to each other: 3 in Crommet's opposing (nearly) the Degree ascending in this, and him the Ascendent of it; and 3 in this Nativity, upon the place of Crommet's Moon; and Cauda in this, upon the place of his Sun. It is indeed such an Antipathy, that a greater

can hardly be found.


The Arguments of Blindness in this Nativity, are in general these: (1.)
The Infortunes afflicting the Sun within Orbs. (2.) The Sun entring the Milky-way, and with violent fixed Stars; and the other Luminarie being in via Combusta. (3.) The Conjunction of hand d with the Pleiades in the

Argol fays,—The Pleiades with the Moon in the Ascendent denotes great Defects in the Eyes; & aliquando etiam fine Luna; they also significate same (sometimes) without the Moons presence there, Ptol. Parvus, Lib. 2. If at any time they have such Signification without the Moons being with them there, certainly it may well be then, when both the Insortunes are not onely there, but there afflicting the Sun. It is such a Nativity, that I am not able to parallel with Example: I insert it, to the end it may be serviceable to others, that may occasionally meet with the like Nativity; as certainly the moneth June 1646. may afford many, and June and July 1676. may produce many more.

The Native was a great Precisian, and very violent in any Opinion that he espoused: that I conceive may be occasioned by the great Reception between D and B. Lord of the Ninth, and the Platique Trines of D. D and L: and the Conjunction of B and S in his Ascendent, being in Platick D of L; as also the Lord of the Ninth his Position in the Ascendent. These are Arguments that may well denote an Enthusiast, or an obstinate Person in every Opinion he shall take a liking unto.

Merchant, or Trader, &c. and doth declare the Native to be eminently profoerous and successful in all his Undertakings, except at such times when ill Directions occur; and then he, as the greatest Potentates, must submit to the unkind stroaks of Fate. Besides these happy Positions, we may further observe, (as an Augmentation to their good Significations) the Virgins Spike is upon the Cusp of the Mediam Cali; the Sun and of are in Trine to the Ascendent: Which declare him to be of a generous Minde and Disposition, being answered with a convenient Resolution and Ambition; for to the Sun and & , their Trines to the Ascendent, do very aprly denote : as also of his Quartile to 11, it happening from Cardinal Signes. 11 in Platick Trine of 2, Lord of the ninth House, and 2 in Trine of h. Lord of the Second, should make his Profession not onely credible and delightful unto him. but gainful alfo. And so it doth, notwithstanding the Moon her Opposition to g: for although that Aspect of it self be ill, yet g, Lady of the Tenth, and Dispontrix of the Moon, collecting both their Lights by friendly Aspects; makes amends sufficiently for the ill Signification there-

This Native is also inclineable to the study of the Mathematicks; (as is aptly denoted from the Partile Trine of h and of from earthly Signes) and in Astrologie (a principal Branch thereof) he is so well acquainted, that he both Calculated, and gave me this Scheme of his Nativity himself. Thus from general Observations, I proceed to some Particulars.

Anno atatis 12. he was put an Apprentice first of all : he had then the Medium Cali directed ad Opposium Mercurii: but he tarried not full two yearsthere. Thus we see Directions of the Hyleshs to the Opposition of a Planet will have its Effects; but it will then be of a shorter and more tronbled continuance, then unto the Trine or Sextile. Of this I could give many Instances.

Being aged about 19 years, and upward, the Native had an Ague, and some Derriment ad point of Reputation, Co. He had then the Ascendent directed ad Corpus Sarurni, cum Latitudine, which plainly borrended the fame : but at the fame time the Ascendent was directed ad A g, and not past the Sextile of Q., which greatly meliorated the Fury of that Direction; otherwise it could not but have been much more mischievous and cruel.

In the years 34 and 37 of his Age, upon the Effects of M.C. ad Qu. and @ ad * 12, the Effects of five Planets being effentially dightified in his Radix, may appear to purpole: their Significations must be good, and that in a great Degree ; but the particular kinds thereof , I refer to time to difcover. 

of Age, he was not less worth then 16000 h which himself had increased by his Industry in Merchandizing, from less then 500%. Stock, left him by his Friends; as I have often heard him to acknowledge; but upon a firict Examination, we shall finde not a few Arguments to declare increase of Riches. C. was directed ad II h, and the Alcendent to his Body, with and without Latitude: Directions most malicious, that would indeed have ruined him, both in Health and Honour, &c. had not M. C. been at the same time directed ad Q. and the excendent ad * 1, which preferred him both ways. To was at the fame time transiting his Mid-heaven, which mightily aggravated the Mischief.



THis is the Nativity of that excellent Mathematician and Aftrologer, Regio - Montanus, (as Origanus hath it, fol. 724. de Effe-Stibus) who framed those excellent Tables of Directions. for all manner of Latitudes: before which time, Aftrologers were at fuch a loss a that they could not direct one Nativity then , in that space as now they may do ten.


To denote his Ingenuity and Excellencie in those Studies, he hath \$\pi\$ in \$II, and the Lord of his Ascendent also, together with both the Luminaries: nor is the Ascendent it self, (it being the House of o) to be noted for other then an Argument of Ingenuity likewife, it being befriended by Caput Draconis his presence there.

Origanus brings in this learned Natives Geniture, as an Example of a violent Death; which it is most true, he unhappily suffered : he urges the Rule first, and then compares it with his Nativity, thus :- Dominus Horoscopi in Octava natura maleficus & damnatus, vel alter utrum Luminare affligens, morte violenta periturum natum significat, &c. As in the Figure of Regio-Montanus, Qui à Pontifice Sexto accersitus Romam, dum liberibus versionem Trapezontii undans ovrigeG, Ptol. taxaret, à Trapezontii filiis veneno propinato sublatus est. Habuit enim Martem natura maleficum dominum Horo-Scopi una cum Luminaribus in 8. domos que & ipsa à Saturno ex quarta Dradio affliguntur. He might have added also, They had all been posited near, or with, violent fixed Stars; as those of Orion, Auriga, and the Bull: as may easily be seen by Hartgil's Tables of the fixed Stars.

For the time of his Death, we may relie upon the Authority of Rantzovius, who in his Collection of the Names of fuch as died in their fixth Hebdomatical year. saith, __ Fohannes Regio-Montanus, Mathematicus Roma, Obiit atatis 41. Ergo peritt annum agens 42. At that time the Ascendent was nearly directed to the Opposition of the Moon with Latitude; the cruel Planet h having but newly passed the Opposition of the Sun, Moon and Mars.


His is the Nativity of that famous Perfon, Erasmus Rheinholdusthe Author and Publisher of the Prutenick Tables: who (confidering the rawness of Altronomy in his days) made to near a Compendium of that Art, that hardly any (then) were able to equal, much less to amend; and the world (at least so much thereof as understands Gratitude) must remain Debtor to his worthy pains.

That he should be a Person curious and inquisitous after Astronomical Truths, is obvious from my ascending in his Nativity, and y. Lord thereof, being not onely in mathe House of 3, but in * and Reception of 3 also: which Configurations, gave Origanus occasion to stile him both Ingenious and Noble, (as without doubt he was;) and, to parallel his Geniture with that of the most Learned Joachimus Camerarius. Vide Orig. de Effectib. fol. 598.

A Collection of divers choice Nativities.

The learned Rantzovims, fol. 179. tells us, he lived 42 years, and then died: his words are these: Erasmus Reinholdus, qui tabalas Prutenicas edidit, & Mathematicus excellens fuit, obiit Salveldie in patria 19. Feb. anno atatis 42.-Let this suffice for a Remembrance of this worthy Person; and for a fit and proper Example of a Nativity of an ingenious Scholar and Artist.

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His Nativity I finde Origanus hath borrowed from Cardan: it being the second Example of his hundred Genitures. Origanus brings it in. to verifie an Aphorism relating to the Manners and Dispofitions of Men; which Rule is this: Quando nullus Planeta in Horoscopo aut signo intercepto versatur, videndum est num Luna & Mercurio aliquis Planetarum jungatur , & secundum



naturam ejus Mores nati dijudicentur .- I do allow (with Origanus) that by reason of the Conjunction of & and \(\times \text{in } \gamma \), and \(\times \text{his being Combult.} \) and? its being in his Ascendent, he might have been sometimes rash and cross-natured enough; yet certainly he could not but be a person ingenious and learned: for of adds fire unto 2, and makes the Natives Understanding the more sharp and active. But that he should be Villanous, Inconstant, Fraudulent, Quarrelsome, &c. as Origanus and Cardan report, I cannot altogether believe; because there is a Sextile and Reception between the Moon and Q, and both of them in good Aspect of the Ascendent. Indeed, by h's presence in the Eleventh, and I's in the Ascendent, and I her Quartile to 14, Lord of the Twelfth, I should adjudge him blest but with few (except treacherous) Friends; plagu'd with many Enemies; and subject to many, and most notorious Scandals. And by reason of this his unhappy Fate, he hath a fault laid upon him, from his Stars, which they cannot be wholly compell'd to own. He might perhaps be constrain'd in his Life-time to cope with more Enemies, and ill Reports, then he was willing; and thereby have occasion to vent his Choler somewhat more then ordinary: but it doth not follow, that he must therefore be so evil-minded and disposed, as reported; for a Man may sometimes be sharp and contentions in a just and honourable Cause, and yet neither fraudulent or villanous, &c.

That he was both a Scholar and Artist, let his Commentarie upon Ptolomy's Centiloquium testifie: it is printed in Oltavo by it felf, and also at the

latter end of Guido Bonatus his Treatise of Astronomy.

Rantzovius faith, fol. 192 .- Georgius Trapezuntius , qui in senetta omnium litetarum oblitus dicitur , moritur Roma , 90. Which was in his Enneatical year, of Ten times Nine. He had then the Ascendent (with a small Remove) directed ad Oppositum Saturni.

Hat this Native should be a good Artist, the Sextile and great Reception between of and g under the Earth, aptly denote. It is the fame Configuration (though from

different Signes) with that of the learned Rheinholdus, whose Nativity, for that very Significations sake. I have published from Origanus. He was indeed

deed one of the best Astrologers that lived in his time, and most industrious and laborious in the Science he practifed. I have feen of his own hand-writing, a Collection of four hundred Figures, erected upon especial Occasions, with ludgements Aftrological thereon, by himself most admirably performed : by him it was intended for the Press; but nescio quo fato, it was prevented, as well to the prejudice of the worthy Author, as to Posterity; who thereby might have been made happy with many choice Prefidents in the practick part of this Study: which now they most unhappily are deprived of.

Divers Accidents there are by which this worthy Persons Nativity was ve-

rified; but I shall select onely two or three of them: viz.

Anno atatis 44. he was afflicted with a Burning Pestilential Fever: he had

then by Direction, the @ ad corpus Martis.


Anno atatis 75. he died: the Ascendent (which is Hylech in his Nativity) was then directed ad corpus Martis. That he should be of great years, is plainly seen from the Ascendent its being no way vitiated; and h. the Lord thereof, (who is Alchocoden, or Giver of years) is strong in me his

own greatest Dignities.

He was necessitated to many Troubles and Unhappinesses in his Life-time, chiefly in our late times of Confusion; when for his Loyalty to his Soveraign, he was Plundered of all he had, and compelled to flee to Oxford for Refuge: he had then (it being the 64 year of his Age) the Medium Coli directed ad Quartilum Jovis, and was not quite free from the Effects of the Mid-heaven to the Body of h. But the general Cause thereof, was, the Sun in Quartile of h, and in Opposition of 1; one being Lord of the Tenth, the other of the Ascendent in his Nativity.

In his Revolution for the year he died, viz. 1654. he had h Stationary upon the Opposition of his Ascendent, and the Sun going to his Quartile.



His is the Nativity of Mr Edward Gresham, a most ingenious Person and good Artift, as the feveral Almanacks he wrote, fufficiently testifie : as also

by him was never published; but since his Death, printed by another, under the Title of England's Prophetical Merlin: and that Book-pirate, which published the same, hath never so much as once named Mr. Gressam therein; but after an usurping of his Pains, hath endeavoured to obliviate his Name for ever. Of which Injustice and Plagiarism, unless I would consent to, and wink at, I could not but give the World notice; that the Ashes of this worthy (though much abused) Person, might not rise up in Judgement against me, for my tilence therein.

To denote this Native an Artist, we finde γ , the House of δ , ascending; and the Moon in m, in Trine to the Lord of the Ascendent. The Sun in the Ascendent, is in Trine to \mathcal{U} , Lord of the Ninth, from earthly Signes; (\mathcal{U} being just entring m) and \mathcal{U} and \mathcal{U} both in Trine to \mathcal{U} , Lord of the tenth House: All which are eminent Arguments of Ingenuity, and a sharp active Fancie. Wanting Accidents to verific this Geniture, I shall forbear all o-

ther Discourse thereof.

He D transferring the light of g, (who is in me his House and Exaltation, and in Cazime Solis also) unto Soby a friendly Aspect, declares this Native to have been of a

large and capacious Ingenuity and Fancie, apt and inclineable to most witty and curious Inventions: and this I have heard divers to affirm of him, that better knew him, then my self did. These Significations could not but be much heightned by the Sextile the Sun and & casts unto the Ascendent. Fohames Angelus saith, The of of and & in the fourth House, makes the Native

skilful and studious in Occult Arts. Cap. 25.


This Native married Doctor Le Neve's Daughter, being aged near 28 years: the Moon was then directed $ad \triangle h$, Lord of the Seventh: some three years before, he was married unto another, (whom he buried;) then was the Sun directed $ad \times Lana$, Lady of his Ascendent. Many may wonder at first, that this Native should marry twice, h, Lord of the Seventh, being in γ , a barren Signe, and Retrograde there: but if they shall consider, that the Moon is nearly in Sextile of Q, and posited in Signum Bi-corporeum, and that her Dispositor is located in m, a fruitful Signe; and the Sun and Q are

in Platick Trine of &, they will conceive there is reason enough Autologically for the same.

Being aged 31 years, anno Christi 1646. October, he died of the Plague: the Sun was then directed ad 63, cum & sine Latitudine; and the Ascendent ad 12; in Cancro; a Signe representing the most Vital Parts of a Man.

h in v Retrograde, and he Lord of the Eighth, and the Moon in 2, near violent fixed Stars, in Quartile of the Sun and v. &c. might very rationally portend the kind of Death by which this Native expired.

His is the Nativity of my goodFriend,
Mr. John Booker, who hath near 40 years wrote Almanacks in this Nation; and it is aRadix apt and fignificant enough for to make a very good Ar-

tist; which all Astrologers must acknowledge him to be. (1.) Here is II, or the Colettial Twins, Horoscopating; an Ascendent that seldome fails of making him an Artist Naturally, that draws his breath under it. (2) II. Lord thereof, is in γ , the House of δ , nearly in Conjunction of the Suns Moon and δ , and three of them in Sextile to the Ascendent. Although the Figure be not the same, yet these Positions have nearly the same Signification, as those in the Genium of the learned Trapezantius; and to my knowledge, give this Native a competent share of Choler; which indeed makes his Fancie, and the rest of his Intellectual Faculties, the more active and industious.

The Figure is as himself did it; onely the Latitudes of the Planets I have taken from the Ephemerides of David Origanus; whom I perceive this Native hath not followed in their Longitudes; nor yet Stadius, or any other old Ephemeridist Master, as I can finde. I believe therefore he hath Calculated them de novo; and it being for himself, I presume he would be so much the more curious. I could verifie this his Geniture by Accidents; but his particular Fate being of no eminent concernment to any but himself, I shall forbear. I onely desire to let Potterity know (by my publishing this Nativity) that there was once such a Champion for Astrologie, as Mr. John Booker.

His is the Nativity of my loving Friend, Mr. Vincent Wing; a Person by his many and painful Labours, very well known unto not onely the English Nation, but se-

veral other parts of the World. He is a Man so industrious in the Mathematical Studies, that thereby he hath not onely brought Honour unto himfelf, but Fame unto the English Nation: so curiously careful hath he been in the framing of his Altronomical Tables, and that by the best Observations, [without wresting, or false reducing them, as some in theirs lately have done] that I dare affirm they will not in many Ages be bettered. Nay, such pains hath he taken in the Motion of &, and so exact is he in the Tables of Equations, &c -- that both our Universities (wherein are many excellent Aftronomers) have not onely commended, but admired his Pains and good Success therein. And, I have heard divers of them to say, (and am confident thereof my felf) he hathbeen so happy and fortunate in what he hath done therein, that (were it possible) he hath surpassed the Learned, and to be admired Kepler; unto whom the World, for hisskill in Astronomie, are continually paying Thanks.

This our Native (not ashamed of the Stars, unto whom, as second Causes, he oweth his Skill and Credit thereby obtained) at my Request, was pleased not onely to permit his Geniture (in his Life-time) to be printed, but to fend it me calculated by his own Hand, in a Letter inclosed; part whereof was

SIR, __I have received your Letter about a week since, and take it as a signal Kindness; and more especially, that you have me in remembrance, as to insert my Nativity: to which end (though I have been from home all this week) I have here inclosed the Figure, which is set-to April 9. Hor. 5. Min. 48. P. M. 1619. I have calculated the Cusp of each House, according to the Dottrine of Spharical Triangles, for the Latitude of N. Luffenham, g. 5 2. 40m. but being aestitute of time , I have taken the places of the Planets from Keplers Ephemerides, as the best extant, &c.

In this Nativity, afcends the Horoscope; and Spica Virginis, an eminent fixed Stat, is Horoscopical: Q. Lady thereof, is in X, in Trine of the Moon in & in the ninth House; and in (an unusual) Reception with 4: E, the Patron of Arts and Sciences, is in v, in a great Reception of o: and there are in the Scheme no less then four Planets essentially dignified:

viz. O, 14, 9 and D; two of them in their Exalcations, and two in their own Houses.


Which Testimonies are of admirable Signification and Tendencie; and do norbarely procure Credit and Fame unto this Native, but that which is the natural and proper Support thereof, viz. a competent Fortune and Estate. And to denote that the more eminent and durable, the Sun casts an amicable Africa to +, and the Moon and 2 the fame to the Cusp of the second House. This Native hath acknowledged unto me, that G o p hath bleffed him with a moderate Fortune; and hath made his Studies and Endeavours

happy unto him that way.

All the Angles of the Nativity are possessed by Cardinal Signes: and in that respect his Geniture is equal to that famous Physician's, Sir Theodore Majern; who for Skill, and happy Success in his Profession, was esteemed the Wonder of his time: and there was reason sufficient for the same: for all the eminent and famous Actions of the VVorld, depend upon the Equinoctial and Soltificial Signes; as all Astrologers consent: if so, then certainly that Person that shall have them all upon the chief places of the Figure of his Nativity, must (naturally, and of consequence) perform some more then ordinary Action in his Generation. But this quoad, as the Native shall either be Scholars Souldier or Arriff.

VVhen this Native began first of all to write publickly, viz. in the twenty fecond year of his Age; he had the Sun directed ad Sextilum Veneris, Lady of his Horoscope, and this in &, her great Dignities: an eminent Argument of the happy (and deserved) Entertainment his VVritings have met with in the V Vorld.

Many more things might be observed in the Figure, and in the Effects of Directions happening therefrom; but my Defigne is onely to be an Obiervator in Generals, and therefore I shall forbear all further Disquisition.

His Mr. Sabre was very well versed in Astrologie, and understood some other parts of the Mathematicks competently well. And here feems to be very

good Signification thereof in his Nativity, there being (1.) a great Recepthen between 14. Lord of the Ascendent, and 2, the Natural Significator



of Arts. (2.) A Trine of d and y, which gave him not onely a Mathematical, but a Logical Brain; still aiming at the substance of things, and slighting shadows. I remember very well how serious he was, when he first began to study Astrologie, (it being my good fortune to read to him therein) he would admit of things very slowly, (which I conceive was occasioned by the Moon her Quartile to y and b) but when once he had thorow satisfaction therein, he never forgot them: his Memory was so good, and his Delight was so great in the Art he studied; that in three moneths time he was able to defend a Thesis in Astrologie, against most Rational Opposers. (3.) The Moon in Sexile of 4. Lord of the Ascendent, from the Dignities of 3 and y, is another eminent Testimony of an ingenious and active Understanding: Not is the Reception of the two Luminaries, less then an eminent additional Testimony unto the rest, notwithstanding their being in Quartile from Cardinal Signes.

He died in the year 1656. about Michaelmas, of a Surfeit and Dropfie, having some two years before had the Dropfie hanging on him: the Ascen-

dent was then directed ad & h, cum & sine Latitudine.

Four Planets in the eighth House; in a VVarry Signe, might well denote the Native to die of a Dropsie: D, Lady of the Eighth, in \square of them from γ , the House of δ , and δ himself in Aspect unto them all likewise, might portend a Surfeit to accompany it. Thus much for this Nativity.



All which are Arguments of an ingenious Inclination and Fancie; which this Native is conveniently possessed of: for his Acumen is such, that to my knowledge, in less then ten weeks time, he conquered the whole Genethliacal part of Astrologie, both Calculatory and Judiciary. The Affliction of 2 doth aptly denote him slow of Speech; and so he is.

In this Nativity, all Directions hit ad unguem. For when he was fix years and a half old, he had the Small Pox; and that to purpose: he had then the Ascendent directed as O. Both the Luminaries, you see, are in Opposition to the Ascendent from γ , the Dignities of O; and that is the reason the Directions unto their Bodies or Aspects, are the more violent.

At 11 years of Age, he was brought near Death by the small Worms: the Ascendent was then directed ad & D, sine Latitudine.

Being aged 21 years, he had both Surfeit, Fever and Ague; which, because no Direction happens then, must be occasioned by the Revolution that year, and the cruel Planet has passing over the opposite places of the Luminaties in the Radix.



N this Revolution, the Moon is in ve her fall, in Quartile to her own, and the Suns Radical place, and in Quartile of h, who afflicts the Ascendent in the Figure. The Sun is in the fixth House, and handhe both applying to an Opposition, one by Retrogradation, the other by Direction: 2 more unhappy Revolution reasonably cannot come, and the Native escape without danger of his Life. It is also observable, that

h. was Stationary upon the opposite place of the Moon in the Radix, in June following the Revolution; and just about that time of the year his Sickness was the most violent. It had been upon his Ascendent, and the opposite places of his Luminaries, most part of the latter part of the latt year, which might give a minute or small beginning to his unhappy Effects; but could not shew his Cruelty till this unfortunate Revolution began: Besides, Cardan tells us, Corpora Coelestia, non agunt in instanti, sed cum tempore.

Hence I should advise all Students in this Art, before they adventure upon the Correction of a Nativity, seriously to consider the force of Revolutions, as they may concur with dangerous or happy Transits: for many Errours in the Judiciary part of this Art, are committed through the neglect of a proper and due Correction, before a proceeding to Calculation.


Anno atatis 24. this Native highly contends with his Friends; wastes and looses part of his Estate, and somewhat of Office and Preferment; in all things he was unhappy: he had now Medium Cali directed ad & To, cum & fine Latitudine, and a very ill Revolution: and had he not had the Ascen-Bbb

dent directed ad Spicam Virginis immediately upon it, I do not see how (without a more then ordinary Providence of GoD) he could have escaped Ruine. But that Direction, as foon as he had lost one Preferment, gave him ano-

ther: as himself hath acknowledged to me.

This Native being a lufty, portly and tall Man, puts me in minde of an Aphorism I long since read in Ptolomy's Centiloqui, viz. The Lords of tall or great Mens Genitures, are in their Sublimities or Exalications; and their Horoscopes in the beginnings of Signes, &c. Which in this Nativity is most admirably verified; the Ascendent being in the beginning of 12, and 2, Lady thereof, in & her Exaltation.

This Native is a Student in the Mathematicks, and hath published many excellent Pieces therein; which declare his Judgement and Fancie to be sharp and active enough: for you must know, it is impossible for any Man, without an excellent Understanding to be a good Mathematician; the Study

is so large and various.

That his Elocation is but indifferent, (although the matter of which he speaks be always substantial) I know to be true, the Native being my Friend and Country-man: and it is no wonder at all; (neither is it a disgrace or shame, for him, or any Man, to wear the Livery of the Heavens!) for it is not onely where a in X is afflicted of h, but where he is beheld of him: asir happened in the very last Geniture.

This Native when he was near 21 years of Age, he had like to have died of a Calenture: the Moon was then directed ad & Martis, cum & fine



When he was aged 26 years and ten moneths, he was preferred to an Office confiderable: the Medium Cali was then ditected ad Trinum Solis, & Sextilam Jodie; and this in the tenth Houle; ergo, the more confiderable and eminent. Being aged 30 years, and seven moneths, this Native married and

that formewhat fortunately: the Ascendent was then directed ad A Luna, and Part of Fortune ad Sexislum Solis , & Trinum Jovis: all fingular good Directions.

It is to be noted, this Native applyed himself to the Study of the Mathematicks, without much (if any) Affistance therein; and onely by his own Labour and Industry, hath (for the advantage of his Country) published, (1.) His Settor upon a Quadrant: (2.) Geometrical Dyalling, or Dyalling performed by a Line of Gords only (B) The Marriner's plain Scale, new plain'd.
All which; by the ablelt mathematicians, are, for their Facility and Plainness, held the best of their kind extant.

His Native is a Student in the Mathematicks, and hath published feveral Books therein, viz. his Arithmetick, Compleat Surveyor, &c. And to denote him fo

(in his Nativity) he hath Q, the Lady of his Ascendent, in Sextile of Q, over whom the hath a Disposition; and the Moon is in Trine of p, and in Sexule of Q : besides, there is a very great Reception between h and 2; and h is in Trine to the Ascendent. All which are singular good Testimomes in the Geniture of a Mathematician, and in our Native have a perfect and true Signification. He is also of a very facerious, pleasant and cheerful Disposition; which is notably portended by Venus, Lady of his Ascendent, being in Sextile of the Moon, and in the same Aspect with Mars and Mercury.

This Native (my very good Friend) gave me freely his Nativity to publish; and with it, these several Accidents, by which I have verified it.


Anno atatis 4. he had a Fever which had nearly kill'd him: this was occalioned by the Suns being directed ad \[Luna.

Anno atatis 24. he had another violent Fever and Ague : the Ascendent

was then directed ad Quadratum Saturni.

Anno atatis 25. he was married: the Sun was then directed ad Sextilum Lunic. All which Directions were seconded and made stronger by Revolutions and Transits; which any that pleases to take the Pains, may readily finde, by confulting the Ephemerides of those years in which they happened.

I am of Opinion, he hath not the Moon in X, but in w; and therefore believe this to be his right Nativity: the rather, because my loving Friend Mr. James Blackwel, hath proved it so to be; by 12 several Arguments or Accidents; printed a year and half since by it felf. In which little Tract, the ingenious Artist may meet with a concise Method for the Calculating and judging a Nativity; and unto which, I refer the desirous Reader for further satisfaction in his Geniture. The reafon why I am no larger herein, is, Because I would not be esteemed either Envious or Partial.

N this Nativity.II ascends; and v. Lord thereof, is in a firong Reception with the fortunate Planet Q, who is posited in the As-

cendent; he is also in exact Sextile of the Moon: all which denote him a Person ingenious, apt and inclineable to the Study of many commendable Arts, and to learn any thing (almost) without a Tutor. I can aver on my own knowledge, that this Native is a fingular good Artist in Astrologie: 2 Demonstration of which, he hath given the World in his Calculating and judging the Nativity of Mr. W. L. so accurately and sharply performed, that a Student of double his standing, could not have done it better. I know also that he understands Physick and Chirurgery competently well, and therein hath good fuccess; and that seems to be well denoted by the Moon her Trine to Mars, there being a small Reception between them, and Mercury his Sextile unto them both. He understands Musick moderately well: nor is he a stranger to Tachigraphy, or Short-writing. Thus we see his Inclination is exactly pre-fignified by the Positions of the Planets at his

Here are no less then five Planets in laudable Reception, vie. h. 11. 63 9, 9; and the Moon (in some respects) may admit of such Dignities: and accordingly this Native is beloved and respected by all forts of Perfons. I do not know above one that bears him any ill will; and that is for his Zeal in maintaining the Honour of Aftrologie: but there is an Antipathy in their Genitures. In that envious Person's, Saturnis upon the opposite place of the Lord of the Ascendent and the Sun in this: Mark in this, upon the opposite place of the Moon in that, and Saturn in Loco For vis: the Figures themselves are in Quartile ; and the Ascendent of this is the place of Cauda Draconis in that. An Antipathy as great (almost) as that between Captain Bray's and Cromwel's.

This may be noted as an Aphorism in Astrologie, That he who hath many Planers in Reception in his Geniture, shall be beloved and respected of many forts or kinds of Men: and in cases of necessity, shall meet with Friendthip or Assistance from those he least of all expects it. 



Here are many Perfons pretending to Altrologie; that are either afraid or afhamed that any should fee or know their Nativities; but themfelves. To acquaint

the World I am none of that number, I have not onely here, but in my Dattrine of Marivities at large b published my Geniture: Were there danger in to doing; as some pretend, I am fire I should speed none of the best; Lagring as wanty Enemies (for my time) as any Man living; and some of them: Aftrologically inclin'd. But Reason teaches, no concly me, but all Mena to defic fach, Augury. For a Mans Fare must be either certain, or nor certain; if it be certain, (as there is no doubt it is) the obscuring of his Nation with neither addeth nor abstracteth therefrom; if it be not certain or the knowledge thereof hurrerh hori My Enemies can rejoyce at my Mil-fortimes at any timer without their knowledge of my Nativity, or any bad Directions therein scand by their knowledge thereof, more then that they cannot do. Those Persons that are the most opposite hereunto, cannot by their nescience preventithe Effects of abad Direction in their own Nativities; nor Dakea good one ofigreeved forotisthen naturally it is: nor yet can their Undefitanding, when another hash a bad Direction's give them an Opportunity to heighnen its Effects upon him!. So then we see the timorous Man, Who is like a Coward that winks when he fights) cannot make better or prevent his own Face by non-knowledges: nor the envious Man, encrease the Unhappinels of anothers, although he foolishly perswade himself he can, by

being acquainted therewith. We are govern'd by a Power (faith one) that we cannot but obey; and our Minds are wrought against our Minds, to alter us. If my Adversary arm himself to do me an Injury, he cannot put his Resolution into act, but by Divine Permission: and if my Friend designe a Kindness to me, he must wait for a Post-motion of his Mind, and thence receive a time to friend me with it. It is not in our Power (in all respects) to do what we will; either for a Friend, or against an Enemy. There is a kinde of Mundane Predessination, that Men are generally ignorant of; it being writ in such Characters that very sew can read. Let this therefore suffice, that God in his Providence hath so ordered our happy and inauspicious Fates, that it is not in the power of a Friend to assist or an Enemy to hurt us; but as the grand Guider of our Fates, [GOD] shall please to direct. No Man therefore need be afraid or assamed of having his Nativity known.



Hat this C HILDE fhould not live long; is applied rent from the Coarbuftion of the Luminary of the time, and also her Con-

junction with that Enemy to Nature, the cruel Planet Saturn; and this in Leo, the principal part of the Zodiack that represents the Heart and Vital Spirits. He lived onely one year and forty three days; which ended on September the 23. 1654, and then expired of violent Convulsion-Fits, which held him near a Fortnight together: most miraculous in a Childe to behold. He was first taken with a Deep Melancholy somewhat near six weeks before he died; attended with an Ague, having Fits both Hot and Cold. At that time Saturn was upon the place of the Sun, and Mars up-

on the place of the Moon in the Radix. Physical Means was used for his Recovery or Ease; but neither could be effected: indeed his Fate was too strong to admit of any Competitor; for he had not onely the Radical Infortunacies as I have related, but at the time of his Death, the Moon was directed to the Body of Sasarn; as here appears:

N this Revolutional Figure, the Sun (who is Lord of the Ascendent at Birth) is besieged by the Infortunes near the Ascendent of the Radix, and the Dragons Tayle is there also; besides, one Infortune herein, revolves to the place of the Sun, and the other to the place of the Moon in the Radix: then the which, there can be nothing more plain to evidence the year to be fatal; chiefly in concur-

ring with so ominous and cruel a Direction, as before was remembred.

And to shew you that Directions are as well to be heeded in the Revolution as Radix (as the leatned Johannes Baptista Morines hath ingeniously demonstrated) we shall finde, if we will take the pains, that the Ascendent of this Figure at the time of Death, was directed to the Quartile of Mars, and the Moon nearly unto his Opposition: perhaps a grand Reason why the Childe contended with his unknown Adversary at so violent a rate, before his departure.

D bring in Conjunction of 11, and 2 heing in friendly Afpect of the Affection and his Lord, were Arguments to thould recover: For, it is al-Ways to be observed, that where such adjuvant Testimonies happens of or h their Quartiles or Oppositions never kill in Youth, although they shall be Lords of the Eighth or Fourth Honles; for the good Significations of the Fortunes, so eclipse and darken the ill portents of the Malefiques, that their Effects cannot then hurt morrally.

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





Nevertheless when the Moon comes by Direction to the Opposition of h, this Native will also die; which will be about the twelfth year of Age, the Moons Circle and Latitude confidered. Were I here minded to be Critical, I could in few words refel Mr. Chamber's Stories of Munster's Maids joyned together by the Fore-head; and Buchanan's two Boys upward, and but one downward, by whose different Deaths, (though born at once) he would make an Argument against Astrologie. The Maids (saith he) lived till ten years old; one then died; and to fave the other from Death, they cut her away from her dead Sister: of which wound (faith he) the suddenly died also. A most ridiculous Argument against Astrologie! and fit rather to be hissed at , then replyed unto: the one died a Natural, and the other of no Violent, Death; except Mr. Chambers or his Friends will fay, That the striving to preserve her, was an intention of murther against her. But these Scioli, like to an angry Mastiff, run after the Scone, but minde not the Hand that throws it. They commend the Maids Friends care they took to preferve her, but condemn Aftrologie she died not with her Sister: albeit, the Influence of the Stars was instrumentally made good by the Maids death, in her Parents Endeavours.

The Boys (saith he) lived until 28 years of Age; one then died; and the Stink thereof, was the cause of the death of the other. These two, saith he, syet most improperly and impertinently called two, because they had not the parts of two in all respects] were born at once; why not die at once? Mr. Chambers, though a Physician, certainly never heard of Bed-rid People, or any troubled with the Passie, &c. which have continued dying a long time together. Let us admit this but one Birth, [though monstrous] although he captiously and most untruly called it two, and it will readily result, that Death must seize on some one part thereof first. But he trislingly demands, why should one die by Disease, the other by Stink? I will not urge against him, whether Stink be Ease or Disease. But this, he still beggeth the Question, and takes that so granted, which doth remain to be proved, viz. That

his

this monstrous Birth, may properly be said to be Two! He proceeds: They should have agreed well, as having one Constellation; but they did often wrangle, &c. Mr. Chambers it seems never experienced the jarring and contending of one Humour or Passion with another in himself; for had he, such a trivial Objection had never escaped his Pen. Hath not sometimes one fore Finger brought Anguish upon the whole Body? But against this, he may urge their Speech, &c. I answer: The Difference upwards, and Duplicates of Organs and Facultities sit for Speech and Reason, renders the Birth onely monstrous, and not two Births: Ergo, no Argument at all against Astrologie, or the Doctrine of Twins held and maintained by Astrologers. For what hath that Art, which is sounded upon Natural and Demonstrative Principles, to do in Judgement with Births that are Monstrous and Prodigious?



N the next place I shall present the Reader with the Nativities of two Ladies, which. were born within leis then half an hour of each other, and Twins likewise: and tiey were to alike both in Shape, Stature, Feature, and Habit of Body and Minde, that it was (and yet is, for they are still living) a hard matter to distinguish the one from the other, although one should not onely see them.


He Directions of the Luminaries in these Nativities. as they happen in both alike, fo the Effects in each Native have followed. For instance: the Sun in their 17 year of Age, was directed ad Oppolium Luna: they were then both afflicted with violent Fevers, and many other Unhappinesses befel them equally; their Mother died. &c. In the 18 year of their Age, the Sun


was directed to the Sextiles of 21 and 2; they had each of them then a very confiderable Fortune left unto them by the death of an Uncle: they might then also have married well, but the death of their Parents was yet too fresh in their Memory, and their Sickness of Body not throughly removed.

But now, although the Directions of the Luminaries operate equally in both Genitures, yet those of the Ascendent and Medium Cæli do not: for the second was much sickly and Aguish in her first year, as he's exact Quartile to the Ascendent denotes: the first was not sickly till her south year, at which time she had an Ague; then the Ascendent was directed to the Square of he which it could never be in the seconds Nativity while she lives. Then the Medium Cæli in the Nativity of the second, was directed ad corpus Jovis, at twenty three years of Age; she was then eminently married: the same Direction happeneth not in the Nativity of the first Lady until the 28 year of her Age, ergo she cannot be married until then.

Thus we see the Reason why two born near at a time, (although alike in habit of Body and Minde, in shape and seature, &c.) enjoy not exactly the same Accidents of Fortune at one and the same time; and why also they do enjoy some Accidents equally, and alike, and others unequally, and sour or sive years time distant. Had the Ascendent of these Genitures been in & &, Y, Y, B, the Accidents thereof might have differed nine or ten years; but the being a Signe of long Ascention, although the Primum Mobile run about very swift, it can differ no more in 19 m. of time, viz. the distance between these two Twin-Ladies Births, then sour years, as I have before sufficiently proved.

Ishall next insert the Nativities of two, born (as I was informed by their Parents) just half an hour distant the one from the other: the one is dead, the other yet living; and (by the Canons of Astrologie) likely yet to live.



His Childe was exceeding fickly for the first half year; perplexed with Convinous, and fore ityes, and Ague also, informuch that its death


was expected and feared very often. I confidered what might occasion inch Unhappinesses; and finding & and & in the Ascendent, with many violent Stars, and h in exact Opposition of the Sun, according to Latitude, from the Sixth in the Figure, I conceived it to be reason enough in Astrologie for the misery the poor Childe sustained: yea, the Arguments of themselves are so cruel, that had not the Sun been stronger then h, and the Luminaries in exact Sextile to each other, and the Moon in Trine to h from the Tenth, (the House of Physick) and casting the same Rays to the Ascendent, the Childe could not have withflood the violence of his Distempers. Howbeit, he died in the fourth year of his Age, (supposed by Poyson) the Ascendent was then directed to the Dragons Tayle, and the Sun ad Oppositum Saturni, without Latitude. A Question may be raised by tome, Why this Native should expire upon the Sun to the Opposition of h without Latitude, and yet survive the cruel Effects of their Opposition with Latitude? I answer to any that shall so demand, thus: - That the Sun in a strict sense was past the Opposition with Latitude; there could therefore be no Direction of that nature, unless we admit of converse Direction, which doth not consort either with Resson or Experience. (2.) That the Sun ad & h, fine Latine dine, could not of it self be powerful enough to kill; but co-operating with so mischievous a Direction as that of the Ascendent ad Caudam Draconis, it might : fo that per fe such a Direction is seldome (I may say, Never) found to kill; but per accidens it may. And of the truth of this, you may finde other Experiences in this Book.

This Native was also fick most of the fitst fix moneths after birth, for the same Reason as was the other; and in the fourth vear of Age, was taken with a Quotidian, and the Rickets, and thereby brought very low; at which time the other died. Sol's & to h by Direction, (fine Latitudine) was now operating, (which proves a force in fuch Directions, al-

though nor equal to those cum Baninaline.) But here was no Ascendent directed to the Dragons Tayle, as in the other; which was the onely Cause (next to the Divine Cause) that this Native did not then die, as did the other. And although divers Persons have pretended to cavil at the Effects of such Directions to the Nodes, we see Experience to resute them, as in these, and some foregoing Examples; and Reason also: for it cannot be conceived that the two giest Luminaries suffer their Deliquiums, in or near these points for nothing. Let the sober Artist accept this Listay, and thereby proceed to the persecting his Jaugement of Twins.



Ccording to the Polition of 14 and the Dragons Head in the Ascendent, this Childe was most healthful and vigorous, as by his Parents is attelled: yet it lived not above 1,2 days, and died suddenly, viz. on August the 23. at which time the Moon came to the opposite place of & in the Nativity. That it was not long lived, is apparent by

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the Figure: For the Moon is in exact Quartile of h, Lord of the Fourth, from fixed Signes; and Q, Lady of the Ascendent, is Combust, in her Derriment in the twelfth House, and in Quartile of &. Whether & or b be 'Apalernes, the interficient Planet; or whether both be Destroyers of Life, is a Quettion worthy to be confidered by Artiffs. I confess with the learned Cardanus, --- Seg. 3. Aphorif. 108. Difficillimum omnium est (cire locum interfectoris; nam ex hoc habetur & tempus Mortis, &c. I was almost at a stand in my Judgement, when I first considered this Figure, to think the Native should die suddenly: but endeavouring to satisfie my self. I was relieved with an Aphorism in Albubater; which I, in my Doctrine of Nativities, (treating of the eighth House) had translated, thus: -- If the Lord of the Eighth be infortunate, and the Lord of the First shall be in the earthy Triplicity, and in no good Aspect of the Fortunes, the Death of the Native will be sudden. Vide Dolt. Nat. Pars 1. fol. 148. Which Aphorism takes full place in this Infant's Nativity: for Q is here Governess both of the Eighth and Ascendent, and in the earthy Triplicity infortunate; (viz. in Detriment, Combust, and in Quartile of d) and is in no Aspect of 4 at all.

When this Native departed, there was not the least strugling or symptome of Death perceived, as fay its Parents: but it was in perfect health one mi-

nute, and fully dead the next.

Hat this Child could not be of any long Life, is plainly to be seen in the Nativity: for, here is the Sun in Conjunction of To (fine Latitudine) and he Dominius



The Moon (who is Donsina Vita) is in exact Opposition of 14, Lord of the fixth House, and both in Quartile to the Ascendent; and the Moon is in exact Quadrate of &, secundum Latitudine, who most malitiously opposeth the Ascendent with his hateful Rays. Accordingly the Childe did die on December the 18. 1657. of the Small Pox, having before been much afflicted with Convulsions, and Pains and Gripings in the Bowels. About the time she departed, the Sun was under the Direction of h's Body in me; as may appear, thus:

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


Lithough the Lord of the Ascendent (which is 3) be the most potent Planet in the Figure, yet was this Native but of short Life: for it died on the 23 of February following, 13 h. P. M.

The Reasons in Astrologie, I conceive very plain:

(1.) The Luminaties are both afflicted, and they with the Lord of the Ascendent are out of

all Aspects with the Fortures. (2.) That grand Satellitum of h, d, O, and 3; (who is Lord of the Eighth) in the Ascendent, denoted a trange kinde of Intemperature which always prenotes a short Life. (3.) The Moon in d of them all from Angles, and fixed Signes, is a very eminent additional Testimony. Whence we may note, that not the Lord of the Ascendent, but the Horoscope it self, bath chiefly to do with the Life of the Native, and all Actions relating to the Body, and the other to Accidents, and Assections of the Minde and Inclination.

At the time of Death, the D was in her Radical place, in & of E, & c. as at Birth; and & was in exact Dof the D, and of the Ascendent also.




Ere we find the Male-I fick Planer h in exact Onposition of the Afcendent cum Latitudine; and he (as Lord of the eighth House) in this Nativity, is Abfaillor vita; and therefore an eminent Argument of fhore Life. 2, Lord of the Ascendent Retrograde, and in Detriment in the feventh House, is another Testimony of short Life: the Moon within O bs of h Quartile, doth not meanly strengthen these Significations, nor yet the violent Stars on the Ascendent, and those with whom h is conjoyn'd, in Opposition thereunto.

To be brief: This Infant lived but ten days; and on December the 25. at four a Clock in the morning, died of a Diarrham or Looleness; and this without much strugling or screaming, &c. The Moon was then in Opposition to the Sun in the Eighth of the Nativity; and 2, Lord of the Alcendent, was then Stationary.

2, Lidy of the Sixth, in Conjunction of the Moon, and 4 in the Sixth in m, might occasion the Diarrhea or Looteness.



His Twin, although it was born first, survives its fellow-Twin. Indeed, here are no Arguments of a short Life in the Geniume.

Ascendent hereof is happily fortified by the presence of Caput Draconi; and the Lord of the Ascendent is strong by being posited in his own Mansion, in Conjunction of Pars Fortuna; the Moon being in Sextile of him, and the Sun, and Pars Fortuna, and also in Trine of S: all which, are proper and positive Arguments of Vitality. There is a Negative Argument of the same likewise, which is very considerable: (i. e.) The Ascendent or Lustine unfortunate Planets.—— It is no Wonder therefore that this Twin e-Vital.



A Lthough these were Twin-Children, yet you see here is a vast difference between the Figures of their Nativities, as well significations. In this, the Lord of

the Ascendent is an Infortune, and in a Signe contrary to his Nature, Retrograde, and in Q artile of \mathcal{O} , who is the Moons Dispositor; and made the more unfortunate (in this case) by being in Conjunction of a violent fixed State (2.) The Sun is in Conjunction with the Lord of the eighth House, near the Cusp of the Sixth. (3.) The Significator of Death, is much stronger then the Significator of Life. (4.) The Moon is in \mathcal{V} , in Quartile to the Ascendent; a place she most perfectly hates; she receiving her greatest Debisities there, viz. her Fall: therefore is her Square the more cruel. (5.) \mathcal{O} is in exact Quartile of the Lunar Horoscope from Angles. All which denote short Life; and this Childe accordingly did die within an hour after it was born.

It is to be observed, that the Ascendent of the first Twin, is the Cusp of the Eighth in this; and the Lord of Life in that Geniture, is Significator of Death in this.

His is the Geniture of a Gentle-woman of good Birth, who hath (for her time) been fibject to the greatest Unhappinesses imaginable, both in publick and noto-

rious Scandals, Imprisonments, Controversies with Friends, &c. And these Missortunes continually attended her from the 18. unto the 25 year of her Age; and yet is she not totally free therestom. In those seven years space, she hath been in Prison eleven times: a thing not common for a Woman to undergo. But indeed so cruel and unhappy hath been her Fate, and such a continued Scale of malitious Directions, she had, between those years mentioned, that when the ingenious Artist shall have once read and considered, he will esteem this Natives several Sufferings, no Miracle at all. At the 18 year of her Age, the Ascendent was directed ad Oppositum Solis; then began her Missortunes: she was not then sick; and the Reason I conceive, was, because the Sun in hath not power enough to do prejudice to the Body by Diseases; or else, the Direction falling in γ his Exaltation, a place he much delighteth in, he was like a Noble Enemy, and would not prejudice the place he respected, although his Enemy was there.


But befides these Directions, she had many Radical Infortunacies which portended the several prejudices she underwent: as h in the tenth House, in Quartile of the Moon from the seventh House. (2.) The Dragons Tayle upon the very Cusp of the Seventh; which denotes many publick Enemies, prodigious Calumnies, Scandals and Disgraces from them, and that constantly, &c. Vid. Doctr. of Nativities, Patt 1. fol. 56. And the Conjunction of 11 and 6 so near the Cusp thereof, makes it so much the more mischie-

yous.

Then H, quaterus H, is not onely located in the Mid-heaven; but as he is Lord of the twelfth House; which always denotes Damages and Difficulties to the Native in Reputation; &c. many Oppositions and Defamations in every Action:

Divers other things I could observe from this Nativity; but these already mentioned, being sufficient to shew, not onely the Effects of the Directions above remembred, but of the Radical Politions of h in the Tenth, in of D, and Jon the Seventh, nearly in d of H and & there, I shall desist from all further discourse hereof.

N this Nativity, a Signe of Brevity, ascends the Horofcope; and h, Lord thereof, (being a Planet Cold and Dry) is posited therein, in Conjunction of g, who disposes of the Moon: of from a Signe of Bre-

vity, beholds the Sun in a Signe of Brevity, by a Sextile-Aspect: all which are proper Arguments in Aftrologie of a Dwarfish or short Statute. The Sun in of 1 from brevous Signes, may be admitted as an additional Testimony of a Dwarf, or little Person. Indeed whoever hath an earthy Signe ascending, and two or three Planets Posited therein, cannot ut be of a short or low Stature, chiefly if h be there; for a Cold and Dry Temperature is contrary to the growth of any thing; as we see it by Experience in the Autumnal Season.

Thus much for this Geniture; and for a Conclusion to the Third Part of my Cellection of Nativities.

A CENTURY of choice Rules or Aphorisms, fit to be considered by those that practice the Genethliacal Part of Astrologie.

F all the Parts in Astrologie, the Genethliacal is the chief; for therein is consulted the whole progress of a Man, (who is the Lord of all Creatures) from his Birth to his Burial: and by that alone, we are enabled to discover the times of his happy and inauspicious For-

2. Those that are born under such a Position, wherein b beareth the chiefest Rule, or if he be in the Ascendent, are melancholy, envious, yet timorous Persons: If d or \(\frac{1}{2} \) be in \(\propto \) of him , they turn Enthusialts, or Mad-men.

2. Men born under the Government of 11, are generally Nobly minded: aiming to do good to others, thinking no ill: But if either of the Luminaries shall be in Dor & of 4 or b, and & in the Ascendent, or in & therennto, the Native will be villanously minded; rash, head-strong, and rebellions; treacherous to all: friend to none but from the teeth ourward.

4. If under &, and he effentially powerful, the Native is full of Courage; proves a good Souldier; attains to great Honour thereby: & also maketh

good Chirurgeons, Physitians, Apothecaries, &c.

5. He that is born under the Rule of the O, and the O royally dignified, is alrogether aiming at Soveraignty, Rule and Dominion; and (quoad Capax) will be very famous. The same, if any of the three fiery Signes Horoscopize, and the Sun fortified as aforesaid.

6. That Man which is born under 2, and the Nobly fortified, is a great Lover of Delights and Pleasures; of an upright Minde, nothing distruttful: but if she be ill placed, and in bad Aspect of h, he follows Sentuality, and Beastial Pleasures: if of 3, he is subject to many notorious Scandals and

Difgraces; seldome free from Venereal Diseases.

7. 2, Lord of the Alcendent in a Nativity, well dignified, shews the Native to be of a most admirable Fancie, and great Elocution: makes famous Orators, by being in good Aspect of D or Q, or in Reception of them: excellent Divines or Philosophers, by being in good Aspect or Reception of b or 12: the best Mathematicians or Astrologers, when in Reception or good Aspect of 3.

8. When the Moon governs the Horoscope, and she well placed, the Native is a great Lover of Novel things; subject to Mutations; of a gentle Nature and Ditpolition; timorous; often desirous to travel and see strange Countries: if she be in Aspect of g, he will be apt to learn many Languages.

9. of strong in a Nativity, and Lord of the Seventh, and in no good Aspect of the Luminaries or Ascendent, the Native is subject to Mis-fortunes in War, or in any thing of Controverse; for the seventh House signifieth his Adversaries: and in this regard they will be too powerful for him to contend with.

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10. All the Planets (or the most of them) above the Earth, be the Native of what Capacity he will, makes him eminent and famous beyond it : but if they shall be in their Dignities so posited, the Native (like a Comet) shall out shine all others in that place or part of the World where he shall be born.

11. The Infortunes afflicting the Luminaries or the Horoscope by Body or Partile Aspect, declare him that is then born, to be of a very short and fickly

Life.

12. The Sun in the Ascendent, makes eminent Boasters, and very proud Persons. of there, makes notorious Lyars, and Inventers of Fables, and great Contrivers of Mischief; perjur'd, turbulent, and cruel-minded Men.

13. Eminent fixed Stars upon the Angles of a Nativity, do give the Na-

tive eminent Honour and Fame.

14. P in Cazime Solis, and in his own Dignicies, makes the Native not onely a famous Orator, but an excellent Counsellor; and for his Ingenuity and great Parts, he will be admired, and had in much esteem.

15. It in the tenth House of a Nativity, deltroys the Natives Honour and Fame, let it be never so great : if " be there under good Directions, he may preserve it cum d'fficultate; but in the end, it will be absolutely shipwrack'd.

16. If h in the Nativity of a King, or other less famous Person, shall be in & to the Medium Cali, although the Geniture be otherways fortunate, yet the Natives End will be most inauspicious and cruel.

17. All the Planets in a Nativity Retrograde under the Earth, though the Native be of illustrious Birth, denote him to be of a falling Fame or Fortune.

18. Cardinal Signes possessing the Angles of a Nativity, makes the Native (of any Concition or Capacity) most eminent and famous in his Generation; and to do such Acts that after-Ages shall admire him.

19. & in the tenth House, brings Scandal and Dishonour to the Native in

many things, whether he be deserving thereof, or no.

20. The Sun or Moon in Dor & of of from Angles, chiefly the Tenth and Fourth, declare a violent Death: if it be to donely, and in humane Signes, the Native will be flain by the Hands of his Enemies: if to h, he may be poisoned or starved to Death in a Prison.

21. Those Persons (let them be Kings, or of amean degree) are beloved of all fores, that have Q or 11 Nobly posited in the Ascendent or tenth

House, and those Angles free from Affliction.

22. The Mid-heaven famously fortified, gives the Native not onely eminent Honour, but such as shall remain and be durable, though at some times (upon ill Directions) it may be subject to interruptions; as in the Nativity of Fred. 3. Rex Dania.

23. When in a Nativity h is in the Tenth or Eleventh Houses, and the Medium Cali comes to be directed to his Body, the Native loseth all his Honours, Offices, &c. and never rifeth again to Preferment. If in such a Nativity there be a violent Death threatned, that Direction puts a shameful period unto the Natives Life.

24. The Dragons Tayle in the tenth House, and & afflicting both Luminaries in a violent Signe in the Fourth, portends a fatal End to the Honour

and Life of the Native.

25. The Lord of the Ascendent stronger then the Lord of the Seventh, the Native always overcomes his Enemies. Et è contra.

26. Sin V, mor win the Ascendent of a Nativity, makes the Native invincible; chiefly, if other ways well Aspected of the fortunate Planets, or the Luminaries.

27. d in d, or d of the Moon, and h in the same Aspect of the Sun from Angles, portends a violent Death: if they shall be so posited in violent Signes, though not in Angles, the same. 28. ¥

23. p in □ or of of of, gives a sharp, but a most turbulent and troublesome Wit and Understanding.

29. ♥ in ×, in an Angle afflicted of of or ⊙, and Din an Angle afflicted of h, makes an Ideot, Phanatique or Phrenetique Fellow; for his Brain, like a crackt Looking-Glass, will represent a thousand several shapes.

30. Eminent fixed Stars upon the Angles of a Nativity, chiefly the Medium Cæli and Horoscope, declares eminent and prodigious Persons; such that shall make the World admire them, if the Planets therein shall but mo-

31. Both the Luminaries afflicted in Watry or Aiery Signes, bring to the Native an unremoveable Gour.

32. The Moon in 6 of the Pleiades, and [] of 6 from an Angle, denotes great Defects in the Eyes, if not Blindness.

33. He that hath any of the fiery Signes ascending, and the Lord of the Horoscope in the tenth House, will be always aiming at things beyond the Capacity of his Birth, let it be what it will.

78. Aftrologers may eafily miss of the measure of time in Directions, if they hall omit the Confideration of eminent Transits; for good or bad Directions may be both anticipated and continued, as happy or unfortunate Transits occur.

79. The Din via Combusta, and the Oin via Lactea, denotes great danger to the Eyes: if the unfortunate Planets shall be in the Ascendent, or in

& thereunto, it presages blindness.

80. In the Nativities of Children, (I mean in such as are vital) the Afcendent or Sun to the Body of &. produceth the Small Pox or Meafels: in grown Men, the Plague or Pestilential Fever : in elde:ly Persons, Death.

81.
